full of remakes and endless sequels as proof. Juggernauts like *Jurassic World*, *Fast & Furious*, *Star Wars* and the Marvel Cinematic Universe are fun, critics concede, but where are the original stories? Since 2008, those four franchises have spawned a staggering 45 films alone. And in 2021, just three movies that weren't sequels, spin-offs or adaptations managed to crack the top 25 highest-grossing list at the US box office: computer game caper *Free Guy* and two Disney

animations, Encanto and Raya and the Last Dragon.

When Spider-Man: No Way Home swung into cinemas in December, it was the ninth Spidey film to hit screens in under 20 years. But don't let the fact that we've had more Peter Parkers than UK prime ministers this century fool you – recently, we've started to see signs that audiences are craving original stories. In 2022, non-franchise blockbusters are officially back in demand. At the time of writing an impressive 11 original movies currently sit in the list of this year's top 25 biggest box office draws so far. Robert Eggers' brutal, brilliant new Viking drama The Northman – available on today's in-flight entertainment – is just

Sandra Bullock adventure-comedy *The Lost City*, Michael Bay thriller *Ambulance*, bonkers cosmic disaster movie *Moonfall* and heartwarming canine road-trip drama *Dog* are just some of the other non-IP-based successes this year. Add well-received Jennifer Lopez romcom *Marry Me* and Nicolas Cage comedy *The Unbearable Weight of Massive Talent* to the mix and original stories well and truly seem to have made a comeback. But what's behind the shift? Are audiences suffering franchise fatigue and demanding something new?

Huge box office returns for recent superhero sequels *The Batman* and *Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness* – plus the inevitable success of *Jurassic World: Dominion* this June – suggest franchises aren't going extinct any time soon. But with further original titles like *Bullet Train*, from *Atomic Blonde* director David Leitch, still to come this year, it looks like Hollywood is finally finding more room again for fresh stories and characters. What's Viking for "it's about time"?

THE PUERTO RICAN ACTOR IS ON HER WAY TO HER LATEST PREMIERE - RALPH JONES TRIES HIS BEST TO KEEP UP

ADRIA ARJONA MAY have travelled the world and appeared in Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU) and Star Wars projects, but she has never come across the phrase "hen do". "A hen? Do?" she asks, incredulous at each word. "I lived in London some time, I've never heard that in my life. Ooh, I'm gonna use that. 'I'm gonna have a little do.' That sounds like I'm gonna go to the bathroom..."

Arjona is speaking from a taxi on her way to a flight for the Mexico premiere of Father of the Bride, the second remake of the 1950 film starring Elizabeth Taylor. Indeed, she's been attending a lot of "dos" lately - it's all flights and premieres

for the actor at the moment: not just Father of the Bride, in which she plays the bride, Sofia, but also an intriguing new HBO series called Irma Vep. which debuted the day before our call. Before that. there was Morbius, in which she held her own in the MCU opposite Jared Leto.

But soon Arjona won't be starring opposite big names, she'll be a big name herself.

Tell me about Irma Vep. It looks fascinating.

It's about this actress [played by Alicia Vikander] who's been doing Marvel movies and wants to do a real auteur movie. It'll give the audience a couple of episodes to go backstage and see what filming a movie really is like. We had our own crew and a fake crew on set. I mean, I got confused all the time.

And Father of Bride - how does this version compare with the previous two?

I think we're so used to seeing a woman and a man get married: the woman stops her life and her education to support the man and see him shine. In this case, [groom] Adan is doing the opposite and sees himself as equal to Sofia, as it should be. That's the reason Ingrid and Billy [Sofia's parents] are going through this divorce because he's so old-fashioned that he didn't realise she was also worthy of having her own life without having to stop it in order for his dreams to be obtained.

compare with your wedding? The similar aspect was that I had

How did the fictional wedding prep

two cultures come together at my wedding, and that can always be really terrifying, and funny and scary. And it was amazing, they loved each other. I lost my rings right before walking up the aisle. I was like, "Mom, I gave them to you," and she said, "I know you know you didn't give them to me." But we ended up finding them. I was also filming Morbius while I was planning this wedding so it was really chaotic.

Speaking of *Morbius*, what was Jared Leto like between takes, given that he went "method"?

He would stay in character and he would sort of go into his own space. He would live in his own sort of bubble. I'd never watched someone

work the way that he works. I think as actors we have to be forever adapting. I loved working with him.

Can you tell me about your audition for Morbius?

I first met with the director and he was like, "I feel like you might be too young." "Ugh, can I please just audition so you can see what I can do?" He texted Ryan Reynolds, "Is she nice?" And Ryan

said nice things about me because we had just worked together, and then it was like, "OK, we're casting her."

In the film industry, do you think it's as important to be nice as it is to be a good actor?

I think the most important thing is that you're the best actor you can be, and you tell the story right. But at the end of the day you want to have fun. Making a movie feels like you're going to camp. We make these movies, where we're away from our families for three months. sacrificing time with our loved ones. I don't think that you should be a dick at all or that you have the authority to be more egotistical than any other career.









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

FOR NIGH-ON 100 YEARS, the Gleneagles golf resort in Perthshire has been a byword for prestige and charm. Can its impressive standards be transplanted into a city-centre setting? Apparently so. There may not be a golf course at Gleneagles' new Townhouse outpost in Edinburgh's St Andrew square, but this lavish Neoclassical pile boasts 33 rooms blending old-world grandeur – ornate cornices, leather-bound books, canopy headboards – with 21st-century amenities. Take the so-called Telling Rooms, a cosy snug named after the building's former life as a bank headquarters, where

GEEKING OUT IN SEATTLE

Dragon dens and gamer gatherings make it natural to nerd out in the Northwest, says local **Naomi Tomky**

S

eattle upends the classic teen movie dynamic, showing what happens when the geeks get the upper hand. In the Emerald City, it's hip to be square: the cool kids collect comic

books, hang out at video game cafes and keep a full calendar of tech conferences.

Microsoft and Amazon both started here and continue to be two of the city's largest employers,

feeding Seattle a steady flow of smart people. In return, the city offers space and support for all kinds of quirky interests. This year's festivities cement Seattle's status as the geekiest city in America - from

Emerald City Comic Con (1) in August to gamer heaven PAX West (originally called Penny Arcade Expo) in September, and femme-centred GeekGirlCon in November, nerds are

Foraged wild mushrooms and fresh salmon bring visitors to Seattle, but the flavour of local geek culture can be sampled at Dungeons and Dragons-themed coffee shop **Distant**

well catered for here.

Worlds (2), where lattes are sweetened with flavours inspired by books, movies and shows. Or, for tea-loving geeks, Friday Afternoon Teas serves custom fandom-themed blends, like full-bodied breakfast brews inspired by Battlestar Galactica

Less than 500m from the offices of Google, Adobe and Tableau, three robots dance over the bar at **Add-a-Ball**

Amusements' kitschy vintage arcade game emporium. The maze of rooms off a Fremont alley holds a 1966 *Batman* console, foot-operated pinball and an old-school cigarette machine, while

the bar serves modern drinks like natural wine and IPAs from the many nearby craft breweries. Neighbouring **Outsider Comics and Geek**

Boutique highlights local, independent and queer creators >



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in their zine collection, and sells size-inclusive, gaming convention-ready 'fits.

One neighbourhood over, in Ballard, wizard-themed bar **The Splintered Wand** serves Harry Potter fan fave butterbeer mead on tap. Competitive spellcasters can get extra practice around the corner at **Mox Boarding House (3)**, a store and restaurant where punters can play all the newest board games. Find higher-tech fun at nearby **Portal Virtual Reality**, where solo visitors or groups immerse themselves in new worlds.

The iconic **Space Needle** is a relic of Seattle's original geek gathering – the 1962 World's Fair, which showcased optimistic predictions of a tech-centric 21st-century world. At its feet, a shimmering, abstract Frank Gehry-designed building holds the **Museum of Pop Culture (4)**, which houses more than 80,000 items, including one of rock band Devo's "energy dome" hats from 1980 and an animation cel from the original *Sailor Moon* anime series. This summer's exhibition takes a look at Afrofuturism through the costume design of Ruth E Carter, including her pieces from *Black Panther, Coming 2 America*, and *Selma*.

In the adjacent Armory building, the Book-It Repertory Theatre (5) turns literature into live performances, like their take on Beowulf, which runs 22 July to 7 August. Though the Armory also holds a food court, the **Taylor** Shellfish Oyster Bar across the street makes for a better pre-theatre dinner, featuring local seafood from its fifth-generation family-owned farm. The explosion of geek culture in Seattle is the latest evolution in the city's accepting culture, which has previously given rise to iconic scenes like indie DIY and grunge. In the words of one of Seattle's most famous -

T

he grand Los Angeles mansion of Loretta Powell - Miss United States 1959 - no doubt saw many parties, but none quite like this. Crowds of people buzz around piles of

homeware and clothing dotted around the Rococo-style gold and baby-blue bedroom, their frenzied hunt reflected in the mirrored ceiling. A young brunette sweeps through the room, her phone held up to her face in selfie mode. Filming herself, she launches herself straight at the heap of clothes on the bed.

"It's truly beauty queen vibes!" says the effervescent Macy Eleni, aka @blazedandglazed, to camera. She pulls out a cute retro gold top. "This sweater was meant to be mine!"

Macy calls herself a "thrift queen". On TikTok, where she has close to 400,000 followers, she posts vintage hunting tips and shows off her latest scores. Lately, she's got into a rather niche pursuit: scouring the estate sales of Old Hollywood icons for unique vintage pieces.

The fusty old mansions of departed Hollywood stars may seem like a strange place for a Gen Z thrifter to shop, but she's far from the only one - in LA, a surprising postpandemic trend has seen young fashion influencers descending on the city's estate sales. Using sites like estatesales.net or handledestatesales.com, TikTok accounts such as Macy's have clocked up hundreds of thousands of followers for documenting these everything-must-go events. They are showered with "hearts" when they show off their hauls, which often include glitzy ball gowns, chintzy furniture and rare memorabilia that make up part of LA's rich pop culture history.

"The best-ever estate sale
I've been to was last year in
Calabasas," says Macy. "It was the
home of a couple who had been
prominent members of the adult film
industry in the 1980s. The walls were lined
with a pink, pillow-like fabric. It was
impeccable." Her other top finds from
previous estate sales include a chair that
belonged to the former mayor of Beverly Hills
and "a massive, life-size giraffe sculpture".

Quinn Garvey (@vintageonq) is another TikTok magpie who's obsessed with trawling old houses for the best knick-knacks in the county. "Estate sales will give you the biggest range of everything from pristine vintage Chanel suits to closets full of old fishing merch T-shirts or even old circus

How hard is it to catch a bank robber?

IN MICHAEL BAY'S LATEST MOVIE. AMBULANCE. JAKE GYLLENHAAL MAKES OFF WITH \$32 MILLION, JUST DON'T TRY THIS FOR YOURSELF, SAYS RALPH JONES

ilm and TV might lead you to believe that robbing a bank is the quickest shortcut to

a windfall. In Ambulance, Michael Bay's latest film, adoptive brothers Will and Danny (Jake Gyllenhaal and Yahya Abdul-Mateen II) do it for Will's wife. who needs hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of surgery. The stick 'em up trope is a cinema staple -Bonnie and Clyde, The Dark Knight - but are you really likely to get away with the crime?

Bank robberies actually rank among the crimes most easily foiled by the police. It is "extraordinarily easy" to catch a bank robber says Dale Carson, a former police officer and FBI agent. This is for various reasons: the proliferation of cameras in the bank; because money takes a while to physically shift; and because of the existence of licence plate readers and red-light cameras (cameras at traffic lights that photograph a vehicle that has sped past).

In Ambulance, Will and Danny are trying to make off with \$32 million - an amount that would weigh around 320kg. When the money weighs more than a horse, police have a long time to arrive on the scene. Carson says, "I often laugh at these movies where the guys are getting gold, and a guy just reaches and picks up a bar of gold, which you're not gonna do. It's extraordinarily heavy."

In reality, even if they make it out, a typical bank robber might have nabbed not \$32 million but around \$3.000. In the cash, however, there would be a range of dye packs, set to explode all over the bills when they leave the building. "It's indelible," says Carson, "so you can't show up later and say, 'It wasn't me."

Police actually want the bank robber to get out of the bank before confronting them. This by innocent people and because they might be in a vehicle. "Vehicles are much easier to stop,

> identify and control," says Carson. "You would blockade an area, saturate it with law enforcement so they really can't get away." If the vehicle gets onto open roads it can be a problem because the robber can travel far and fast. But people fleeing a crime scene often give themselves away to police officers on standby, since "driving down the road very quickly" is a major tell that you're guilty.

And, even if police let the bank robber get away, he can still trip up. Carson was once part of a team hunting Willie Sellers, a notorious American bank robber. They knew he had a moped that he carried on the plane he flew around. Because mopeds like that often break, they contacted the manufacturer and asked to be alerted when someone ordered a specific new part. "When Willie came to pick up the part he'd ordered," says Carson, "we just put his ass in jail."





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CONGRATULATIONS ARE IN ORDER FOR BILLY PORTEM

Two days before he speaks to *Vera*, the 52-year-old won his second award for his work as a producer on the musical *A Strange Loop*. "Two-time Tony winner, ho-ney!" he trills. When I ask where he has put his second Tony – mantelpiece, shelf, toilet? – he says they will send it to him in six months, mainly because it needs to be engraved, and jokes it's better than him trying to get it home on the night itself. "Don't leave it in the car, girl!" he booms, pretending to warn himself. "Do NOT. Leave it. In. The. Car."

Porter speaks only in declaratives – his voice is a silky thing and his years on Broadway have given him the gift of clear diction and rafter-grazing volume. Every sentence, thought and utterance has such a wonderful cadence to it. Even his umms and ahhs are pitch-perfect. His aura, even through

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a laptop screen, is one of absolute self-assurance (he's talking to me on Zoom from his house on Long Island, New York). But it's a hard-won confidence. Porter has been acting since he was a teenager, growing up in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He's become a fixture in the world of theatre and has released four studio albums. He's filed for bankruptcy and written a best-selling memoir, *Unprotected*, detailing instances of sexual abuse by his stepfather and his HIV diagnosis in 2007.

He hit what we might call his imperial phase around 2019, when he was cast in Ryan Murphy's show *Pose*, set among the ballroom scene of 1980s New York. As Pray Tell, the commanding emcee and costume designer, he was sharp-tongued and smart, but audiences responded just as powerfully to the wounded pride, the hurt, the agony behind the sass and smarts. The same is true of Porter in the flesh – yes there's theatricality and wit (the comic timing, eyebrows with the dexterity of an Olympic gymnast), but he has faced trauma and hardships dead in the eye. He is an open book and he has given us everything.

When Porter started hitting the red carpet, he blew people's minds with his genderless styling tough and soft, masc and femme, weird and fun. Conservative pundits freaked out. He didn't care. During this period, Porter didn't so much steal the show as commit a series of fabulous red carpet heists. An embroidered suit with Barbie-pink cape ("Billy Porter's Golden Globes Look Just Changed My Life", gasped one fashion magazine) or his hybrid Christian Siriano tuxedo gown (think: a tuxedo, but also a gown), which is considered so iconic it's currently on show at the V&A Museum in London as part of an exhibition looking at the intersection of fashion and masculinity. For this magazine he sports a sparkling and effortlessly glam garment from his own Billy Porter x KAFTKO Pride Collection.

Some people think the Timothée Chalamets, the Harry Styles and the Kid Cudis all owe a debt to Porter, who was shattering conventional style rules before everyone else. I tell Porter I recently went to see the outfit in person at the V&A. He nods, sagely. "At the end of the exhibition, it was supposed to be only me," he explains – meaning the garment – "but you know, they had to make room for Harry Styles [his outfit] too, I suppose, so they put us together. Everyone wants to give him the credit."

Now, he's directing his first feature film,

Anything's Possible, a high-school romance inspired

Born

Billy Porter was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, on 21 September 1969.

Education

He graduated from the prestigious Carnegie Mellon University with a bachelor's degree in fine arts and drama. He is now adjunct professor at Carnegie's School of Drama, where he has directed productions of Company and Letters from 'Nam.

Fun fact

He made a cameo in the video for Lil Nas X's That's What I Want, handing Nas a black guitar while the rapper wears a bridal gown. Porter has previously heaped praise on the singer saying, "He is my baby, he is one of my descendants."

In 2010, Porter was cast in the 20th anniversary stage revival of Tony Kushner's Angels in America as Belize, a compassionate nurse known for his unwavering commitment to treating AIDS patients.

Kinky Boots (2013–15)

Three years later, Porter starred as Lola in *Kinky Boots*, the musical with songs by Cyndi Lauper, based on a 2005 British film. He went on to win his first Tony and a Grammy for his performance. Last month he won his second Tony for producing the show, A Strange Loop.

Pose (2018-21)

As emcee Pray Tell, Porter became a household name on the FX show about ball culture. He brought fire and sharpness to the role, and gained critical acclaim, particularly for his work during the show's third and final season, where *Pray* confronts his alcoholism.



by 80s coming-of-age movies. He says he has wanted to direct for over 20 years – he even went back to school, studying screenwriting at UCLA, because he wanted to learn. It's been a long time coming, this opportunity, but Porter believes in manifesting, the Oprah Winfrey-backed practice of believing in something so powerfully that you force the universe to make it happen.

He says the script "literally fell out of the sky" (in reality, producer Christine Vachon, "the



godmother of queer cinema", reached out to him) and 25 pages in, he clicked that it was set in Pittsburgh. A light bulb went off. The film had all those gorgeous John Hughes touches but it was radical in its depiction of queerness, too.

The film's lead, Eva Reign, a trans woman, plays Kelsea, also a trans woman. It's a meet-cute between her and a handsome, artsy, goofy hunk played by Abubakr Ali. The premise is simple: what

The quietly revolutionary part is that Kelsea's identity as a trans woman isn't the engine pushing the story forward. It's like a lot of other coming-ofage teen films, with the added benefit of being gently trans-inclusive.

"My intention is based on service," Porter says, launching into a honey-coated sermon. "I learned that from Oprah. And Maya Angelou. When you shift your intention to service, everything else will work out." He

credits everything in his imperial phase, from *Kinky Boots* and *Pose* to directing this film, as a direct result of giving himself over to the universe, all-in. "For a long time, I thought my queerness was my liability. That's what people said to me. And now it's not."

As a child, the Pentecostal church he attended worshipped his beautiful singing voice, but condemned him for being effeminate and gay. The impact of that tore him in two and he says



that he shied away from harnessing his true self for a long time. He was ashamed. But by embracing his sexuality he's been able to get the things he wants out of the universe. It took a while for him to figure this out. He sees it now.

Anything's Possible was his chance to direct a love letter to Pittsburgh, a city I had never thought about in my entire life until watching the film myself. "I wanted to smash the stereotypes that it's in the dark ages, it's now a wonderfully young, queer, artist city," he says. "Did you know Obama brought the G20 summit to Pittsburgh?" The city had weathered the 2008 financial crash and the President wanted to know why. The why has to do with the way Pittsburgh, which was once a steel-industry hub, pivoted into the technology sector.

"They call it the East Coast Silicon Valley. Uber is there, testing their stuff. Google is there. The arts scene is major, and the medical [institutions are ranked among] the top five in the world.

"My sister, she has a medical condition called Chiari malformation, where the brain grows larger than the skull. Nobody was able to diagnose it around the world. She went into the doctor's in Pittsburgh and they figured it out. That doctor devised the surgery to help her. So the man who created all of that s**t to deal with this rare condition that my sister has lives in Pittsburgh and works at UPMC, the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center." He pauses for a well-deserved dramatic effect. "Major."

Though his upbringing was traumatic, it's clear he hasn't turned his back on home. Anything's Possible reframes Pittsburgh in Porter's mind, and writing his memoir, he says, was a way to unload all the horror, in an attempt to make peace with it.

"I'm still trying to figure out boundaries, especially post-Covid," he says. "I'm trying to figure out how to take care of myself in a different way." He and his husband, Adam Smith, got a labradoodle in quarantine, called Lola, who pops onto Porter's lap. "I'm choosing joy. I had all this time off during the pandemic, and I worked on my psyche. I went to trauma therapy and I learned there that depriving yourself of joy, or not experiencing it, is a trauma response. It's a huge component

of my healing. Going forward, all the art I make, it has to come from a space of healing, not running away from something."

Billy Porter is brave enough to have found his bliss. I ask him what he does for himself, to feel joy. "I cook, I watch my mindless TV shows," he says, with a cackle like rolling thunder. "I bought this house, and sometimes I just walk around, taking it all in, you know? He pauses and stares around his home office as if he's gazing at the stars. "I sit on my porch, or swim in my pool, and I just try to remind myself: I did my best, and sometimes that's all I've got. But now I know it's enough."

NSE SEE.

The spiny leaves of jujube trees offer little shade against the North Indian sun, hot even at the hour we're here, a groggy 7am. As the day heats up, the cicadas begin their deafening morning chorus. Out of the corner of my eye, I spot sudden movement in a nearby bush, which causes a couple of grey francolins - plump ground-dwelling birds - to let out aggravated squawks. Minutes later, I see why: a blue bull (actually a type of large Asian antelope) steps out from

behind the same bush. It gazes at us, ears alert, then ambles along the thorny bushland to the waterhole ahead, invitingly cool under the forest canopy.

"We've been seeing two leopards visit regularly and suspect they might breed here," says Sohail Madan, our guide for the day. "Look,




there are pugmarks." He examines footage from the camera set in a strategically placed trap and my heart skips a beat. A young leopard stares directly into the camera, eyes widened in surprise.

We could be lost in a jungle, in a remote corner of the planet. But Asola Bhatti Wildlife Sanctuary, a rewilded sanctuary covering 33km² of bushland where I find myself today, is technically within Delhi city limits.

"Few think Delhi has jungles or even natural habitats," says Madan. "Yet Asola Bhatti is spread across almost the same area as New Delhi, to give you a point of comparison." For an urban forest, it's massive - and its size may increase still, thanks to a major rewilding push that means the jungles on the edge of India's megatropolis are making a quiet comeback.

The Delhi government's plans to develop and conserve its 26 "city" forests - small remnants of the Aravalli forest surrounded by urban sprawl began in the early 2000s. The proliferation of mining and stone crushing in the area meant the jungle lay silent, dry and pockmarked, wiped of the diverse wildlife it was once home to. Now, thanks to a long and tireless conservation effort led by people like Madan - who is currently assistant director at Bombay Natural History Society, a Mumbai-based research and education outfit that's been heavily involved in rewilding efforts - diverse species roam freely again. These include leopards, striped hyenas, golden jackals, >



blue bulls and palm civets (cute, shaggy-haired mammals with curious eyes).

Delhi's green development is also essential to its non-animal residents: at a time when Delhi is battling typical urban problems including pollution, embracing its wild side could prove essential to the population's long-term health.

When Madan - an engineer from San José State University, California, who switched careers because of his interest in butterflies and wildlife photography - first saw Asola Bhatti, he says he wasn't fazed by the devastation but excited by its rewilding potential. "Parts of the forest remained intact," he explains. "I thought that there's so much wildlife in Delhi - birds, mammals and so on - that there was bound to be a lot of it here also."

Coming to the project, Madan and the team had to take on the difficult task of clearing the forest of


the invasive species of fauna that had flourished in ill-conceived tree plantation drives and reintroduce native species to the area.


As the forest regenerated, the jackal and civet population grew, and birdlife became more diverse (Madan and his colleagues have recorded 200 bird species). Eventually, leopards - whose population dwindled from the middle of the last century on due to habitat conflict with humans - returned. "We've been able to photograph and identify five leopards," Madan says. "I believe there are more."

While Asola Bhatti was being restored, another kind of rewilding effort was taking root on a

different section of the Aravallis. Near the suburb of Gurgaon, a fast-developing corner of Delhi where gleaming high-rises jostle with five-star hotels, the mining of gravel and quartzite stone had laid the forests bare. "But unlike Asola Bhatti, where patches of old growth existed, here the land had been completely stripped of vegetation," conservation expert Vijay Dhasmana says.

Commissioned to take on the project in 2010, Dhasmana developed a plan to not rewild, but replant and restore nearly 162 hectares of barren land with native trees, shrubs and grasses. They compared historical records of the area with present-day landscape surveys to plant microhabitats of forest, shrubbery and grassland with the help of nearly 20,000 volunteers. "We decided to irrigate every newly planted section for three years," Dhasmana says, "then let nature take over." Today, the Aravalli Biodiversity Park has distinct forest sub-types, verdant valleys and swaying grasslands.

"SEEN FROM MID-AIR, THESE FORESTS SURROUND DELHI IN GREEN AND OFFER THE CITY A BREATH OF COOL, FRESH AIR" I walk through the park with Dhasmana, feeling like an interloper as peacocks, mongooses and grey francolins scurry for cover. In the distance, the overhead metro snakes repeatedly on the Gurgaon-Delhi line, transporting well-heeled Delhiites south to shopping malls with their luxury clothing shops and ice-skating rinks – a popular activity in the summer when outdoor temperatures soar. The scent of jasmine and frangipani intensifies at dusk as we pass gossiping evening walkers and young couples strolling hand in hand.

From the vantage point of a hillock, the surprisingly dense expanse of rewilded forest blends perfectly into the landscape, barely 12 years after being planted. "Native plants have a way of doing this," Dhasmana says, as he points out a flowering shrub used in traditional Ayurvedic medicine to treat stomach issues that has now propagated naturally into dense clumps in the park. "Seeing them develop a life of their own gives me so much joy."

Look down from the window of your plane just before it lands in India's capital and the impact of these rewilding efforts in the Aravallis becomes apparent. Seen from mid-air, these forests surround Delhi in green and offer the city – often affected by poor air quality and heatwaves – a breath of cool, fresh air. "These forests act as a sink for pollution and noxious gases, retain moisture and create a possibility for cooling the heat island effect," Dhasmana says.

Delhi's – and indeed the Aravallis' – future is likely to be greener. Working with local charity I Am Gurgaon, Dhasmana is also busy with several other eco restoration projects in Gurgaon. He says his biggest reward is to see plants that had disappeared from the Aravallis decades ago



propagate naturally in the wild following replanting. "It's an amazing feeling," Dhasmana says, "to see seeds we've collected from distant forests in the Aravallis germinate, flower and, ultimately, create their own colonies in the park." It is as if they have finally come home.







IS THIS THE DEFINITE ARTICLE?

The Batman does it. The King's Man does it. The Ralph Jones considers why films are gaining the "The"

WHEN IT COMES to making a good film, you needn't worry too much about the script, the concept or even the actors. It seems like the most important quality of a big film these days is that its title begins with one word: "The".

It's a small word, "The", but it packs a punch. When director Matt Reeves wanted to convey that he meant business with his new Batman film, he called it The Batman. In doing so, he put any future Batman directors in a bit of a pickle: how do you have a more definitive take than The Batman? Will they need to call theirs The Batman (He Hadn't Quite Finished)? Or The The Batman? Or maybe The Next The Batman?

There's a precedent here. After Kingsman: The Secret Service and then Kingsman: The Golden Circle, the third instalment in the Kingsman

Q: What does the autopilot do?

A: Modern commercial aircraft are highly automated, so the crew can focus on the broader task of managing the flight safely and efficiently. The autopilot doesn't replace the crew. but functions a lot like an additional crew member, so they don't need their hands and feet on the controls for the entire flight.

Like picking a speed on the cruise control in your car. crew will select an altitude, a heading and how fast they want to climb or descend. The autopilot executes that plan.

Advanced processors take inputs from a range of sensors, determining the exact current position, speed, altitude and attitude - position relative to the horizon - of the aircraft. The autopilot takes these inputs and determines what control movements are necessary to follow the plan. It then manipulates control surfaces - the rudder, for instance - with hydraulic and electronic actuators.

Airliners are often landed manually, but modern autopilots are capable of this too. This helps planes touch down in low visibility, as the autopilot is capable of flying accurately by following electronic signals. The pilots remain in control of the decision to land and will take over once the aircraft has touched down to taxi it safely off the runway.
