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

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A BIG FAT GREEK PLAY IN LONDON

After 10 years of development, immersive theatre gurus Punchdrunk have finally launched their biggest production yet. *The Burnt City* is a retelling of the Trojan War legend and is currently being staged in a vast site at London's Royal Arsenal, a former munitions factory. Around 600 theatregoers can roam freely through the palaces, inns and gardens of Troy and Mycenae, recreated in "future noir" style as dystopian playgrounds full of eerie theatrical goings-on. Not bad for horsing around,

FIRST TAKE THE RISE OF THE OF THE META MOVIE

From *The Matrix* to *Scream*, the latest blockbusters are getting all self-referential, finds **Al Horner**

hings can only get meta, as 90s pop sensations D:Ream so nearly sang. If you've been to your local multiplex recently, you may have noticed that mainstream movies have taken a

trippy turn towards the knowing. From *Scream* through *Spider-Man* to *The Matrix Resurrections*, blockbusters have been playing on their audience's knowledge of the franchise as part of the viewing experience – with intriguing results. In *The Matrix Resurrections* (available now on Vera), Keanu Reeves plays the inventor of a video game called *The Matrix*, tasked with creating a follow-up to that mind-bending sci-fi tale because his company's parent company, Warner Bros, is making him. *Scream*, meanwhile, sees characters openly discussing the fact they're in a soft reboot of the beloved slasher series, while everyone's favourite web-slinger was joined by a host of familiar faces in the box-office-breaking *Spider-Man: No Way Home*, getting meta in ways it'd be too spoilery to outline here.

This sort of twisty storytelling used to be the preserve of indie movies like Spike Jonze's *Being John Malkovich*, but has now spilled over into billion-dollar franchises. It's a trend that seems set to stay: later this month, Nicolas Cage will play himself in *The Unbearable Weight of Massive Talent*, riffing on his reputation as a screaming madman, thanks to YouTube compilations like "Nicolas Cage Losing His S**t" (five million views and counting, at least three million of which this writer is personally responsible for). Also on the horizon in 2022 are *Doctor Strange in the* "Nicolas Cage Losing His Sh't" eatures standout clips from Bad Lieutenant to 2006's The Wicker Man.

Multiverse of Madness and Spider-Man: Across The Spider-Verse, which promise to be similarly self-referential and loopy.

So where did this trend come from? Well, it's actually been bubbling to the surface in Hollywood for a number of years. The Black List - an annual compendium of the buzziest scripts in Tinseltown, and a good indication of emerging trends in the movie biz - has been increasingly full of meta movies in recent years. One recent winner was an as-yet-unproduced film about the real-life actor who lost out to Michael J Fox for the part of Marty McFly in Back to the Future travelling back in time to assassinate him, for example. Some may argue it's illustrative of Hollywood running out of ideas the snake eating its tail. The arrival of The Matrix Resurrections, Scream and Spider-Man: No Way *Home*, however, suggests it might in fact be a new form of storvtelling. Are we in for more outlandish tales of this sort, blending the border between fact and fiction? Like Neo, we're about to find out how deep the rabbit hole goes.

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RISING STAR

Friend in need Natti Shiner

AFTER A TOUGH BREAK-UP, THE LEAD SINGER OF BRIGHTON BAND FICKLE FRIENDS HAS A LOT TO GET OFF HER CHEST, SHE TELLS **CHARLOTTE GUNN**

IT'S BEEN ALMOST a decade since Natti Shiner formed indie-pop group Fickle Friends. She got together with mates Sam Morris, Jack Wilson and Harry Herrington in Brighton in 2013, when they were all university students. "I have such fond memories of those formative years," she says. "Booking support tours, staying on people's floors, hustling so hard. I can't believe I've been able to do music as my full-time job since then, making my art and seeing it resonate with people. That's what music was always about for me, rather than headlining Glastonbury or selling out arenas."

A regular on festival bills all over Europe since, Fickle Friends have just released their new album *Are We Gonna Be Alright?* It's a powerhouse record that's helping make indie-pop cool again, while also tackling themes of mental health, friendship and relationship breakdowns through a blend of anthemic grunge choruses and 80s synth-pop melodies. We caught up with her to hear more.

You'd been through a bad break-up when writing this record. How are you doing now and is it hard to listen back to some of these tracks?

I haven't struggled too much listening back to the songs because I found the whole process so therapeutic. But the break-up was horrendous, I really suffered. I'm such a creative person, I feel things so deeply. So I'm proud when I listen back: I'm proud of songs like *Not Okay* which are just so passionate. Compared to the first album [2018's *You Are Someone Else*], it's just so much more honest.

This album seems to move away a little from the indie-pop of your early years. Why the change? I feel we exhausted the indie-pop stuff. I knew that was what people expect, but I wanted to





explore a bit more. My favourite part of writing was when we would sit down and play each other all the songs we'd listened to that week. We were listening a lot to *Around the World in a Day* by Prince. That album is nuts! It's so intricate but also sounds like there's no thought gone into it! Loads of country music, like Sheryl Crow. Some 90s stuff, a lot of Garbage and – I know it sounds silly – that last Justin Bieber album has been one of our favourites.

You released *Are We Gonna Be Alright?* on cassette – why do you think these old formats are having a resurgence?

I've always loved physical mementos of things.

We live in this world where music is this digital thing, but with tapes, you can have them stacked up on your shelf and when I'm old, I can look back on them all. It's a nice way to support music, rather than just to say, "Yeah, I streamed that once."

Why is it important for you to sing about mental health in your music?

Being a musician is about connection. The main advice for all songwriters is always be as open and honest as you possibly can. The songs that resonate the most with me are the ones that make me say, "I feel so seen by this," so why not be

honest about your brain being an absolute s**tshow?

What's next for Fickle Friends?

We're writing a lot for other people at the moment, which is super fun. Our bassist is about to have a baby so we're trying to figure out what we're doing this summer and how to navigate that. Because it's been nine years, I'm interested in doing slightly different things. You can play [UK music festivals] Reading and Leeds a hundred times, which we've done and it's great, but we're booked for Rock for People in the Czech Republic this year, which we've never done before so that's cool. Being able to go to places we've never been to before is high on the priority list.



HYPERREAL FRUIT CAKES IN LONDON

New patisserie Cédric Grolet at The Berkeley is the trickster pastry chef's first location outside Paris

"DON'T YOU HATE it when you bite into an apple to find that it's filled with creamy ganache?" said no one ever. It may not count towards your five a day, but master pastry chef Cédric Grolet's (*left*) fruit-shaped cakes are deceptively delicious: photorealistic mangoes oze with fresh stone-fruit purée; leaf-tipped lemons hide minty citrus gel; and glistening cherries are brimful of, well, cherry.

But Grolet's sweet subterfuge doesn't stop at fruit: the roseshaped "vanilla flower" is made with vanilla praline petals and an almond biscuit base. You can even see how the trickery is done in the bakery's "pastry theatre" or just head straight to the counter at the patisserie in The Berkeley hotel, Grolet's first outside Paris. Be warned: one of the crafty cakes will set you back £25. Money, another thing that doesn't grow on trees.

NEW-WAVE Cinema In lagos


Nigeria's biggest city is also home to the continent's largest film industry. **Pelu Awofeso** turns the lens on his city's big-screen haunts



his month, the Pan African Film & Arts Festival (PAFF) – the largest celebration of African film from both the continent and the diaspora – will be marking its 30th year with a

stacked programme of virtual screenings and in-person events in Los Angeles. In a pleasing piece of historical symmetry, Nollywood is also in its 30th year, since most critics peg the birth of Nigeria's film industry to the 1992 release of Ken Nnebue's film *Living in Bondage*. Nollywood's impressive output means it always has one of the strongest showings at PAFF – last year Nigeria produced more than 400 films, placing it second only to Bollywood in the world rankings.

Nigeria's films are a window into the country; it's commonplace to hear Africans – from Sierra Leone to South Africa – talk about how Nollywood has shaped their perception of Nigeria and Nigerians. And while Nollywood's catalogue is a great introduction to the country as a whole, the industry's centre is

no doubt Lagos, where most local films are shot. A city of 20 million-plus, Lagos can be a hectic, high-pressure place, buzzing at all hours with its enterprising residents who rarely take a break and never sleep in. Most Nollywood films mirror the city's frenetic spirit, pulsating with colourful wardrobes, hip-shaking soundtracks and largerthan-life characters. Of course, Lagos is also the best place to spot the industry's glamorous stars, who hang out at swish haunts like the waterside **Sailors Lounge** or the **Túraká Rooftop Bar** & Lounge, with its stunning 360° views. As an island city, Lagos's coastline stretches for more than 100km, and is dotted with privately managed beaches that have backdropped many films over the years, from *Bar Beach Blues* (2004) to *Tango with Me* (2010) and *The Eve* (2018). Most are accessible by public transport, including **Landmark Leisure Beach** – the best beach on Lagos Island for its lush white sand and lively bar scene.

Recently, Nollywood has been fixated on the **Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge** – constructed in 2013, it links Lagos's affluent Ikoyi neighbourhood with the southern city of Lekki and has already made guite **>**

the outing: you'll find it in the background of *Fifty* (2015), *Alter Ego* (2018), *2 Weeks in Lagos* (2019) and *Namaste Wahala* (2020). West of Lekki, Victoria Island is home to another frequent Nollywood star: **1004 Estates**, an ex-public development built to house local dignitaries in 1979, often used as a place marker in Lagos-set films. If you're paying a visit to this colourful estate, be sure to drop in at nearby restaurant **NOK by Alara (1)**, another preferred venue for Nollywood's stars, serving the city's best pan-African food.

Back on Lagos Island, the modernist **City Hall** is a must-visit for architecture fans. Though the building that stands today was constructed in the 1960s, the secretariat was established during colonial rule in 1900, making it the oldest local government in Nigeria. You'll spot its distinctive, pillar-lined facade in *The Tribunal* (2017), which was also partly shot at **Freedom Park**, a former colonial prison-turned-leisure park two streets away.

North of Lagos Island and across the lagoon, the mainland is where, in the 1990s, the city's creative scene first gave rise to the now-multimillion-dollar film industry. Two landmarks stand out in that part of town: the **National Stadium** and **National Theatre** (2), both built in the 1970s when Nigeria was awash with petrodollars. The latter was the set for short film *Rehearsal* (2021). Stop over at the **Tea and Coffee Spot Café (3)** on Adeniran Ogunsanya Street, where you'll find creatives hunched over laptops.

Above right: Actress-writer--director Genevieve Nnaji was behind the first Netflix film from Nigeria: *Lionheart* Though most Nollywood movies take place in the present day, occasionally some hark back to the colonial era – and you're guaranteed to find the striking **Jaekel House** in any Nollywood period piece. Built in 1898 as the residence of former Nigerian Railway Corporation superintendent Francis Jaekel, the mansion acted as the main filming location for both *October 1* (2014) and *The Herbert Macaulay Affair* (2019).

If you're after a bit of quiet, then hop on a boat to **Badagry**, some 70km away from the capital. It's a town of two halves: both a historic centre for the transatlantic slave trade and chilled-out coastal village with peaceful resorts. Spend the day learning about the area's troubled history at the **Badagry Slave Museum** and the **Badagry Heritage Museum**. If you're staying for the weekend, bed down at the **Whispering Palms Resort**, which acted as the setting for 2016 romcom *Hire a Man.* Sunset at the resort's palm-shaded private beach? Nothing short of cinematic.



ince the #vanlife trend popped up online a few years ago, itinerant van dwellers have been stoking a lot of envy online. Videos tagged with the hashtag have been viewed over

8.3 billion times on TikTok – mostly by antsy, desk-bound city folk, no doubt.

A word of warning to those sedentary #vanlife voyeurs – photographer, writer and designer Kate Oliver's new book may make you explode with jealousy. *The Modern Caravan* showcases the next chapter in van living: super glam interiors that could stand up to any *Architectural Digest* spread.

Oliver is a proud caravan owner herself, and has been travelling full time for six years with her wife, Ellen Prasse, and daughter. a van renovation company, Oliver was inspired to pick up her camera to capture the lives and homes of her fellow nomads. The resulting photographs prove that you don't need very much space to live beautifully: meticulously designed homes are squeezed into 20m² and backdropped by burnished desert cliffs or pine-crowded forest.

As for those itching for a big escape, the book also includes plenty of practical tips for decking out your own dream van. Well, you can't hit the road without your own set of hot wheels, can you?

Stepping out in Brooklyn

Most of the musical numbers in Steven Spielberg's West Side Story remake are stompers - but the climax, where the rival Jets and Sharks face off in a deadly whirlwind of dance, is the film's emotional apogee. It's performed with the military precision you'd expect, given that it's filmed in the historic Brooklyn Navy Yard, an ex-shipyard-turnedindustrial complex in the borough's north-east corner. Formerly a Civil War-era military manufacturing site, these days you'll find more than 500 businesses headquartered here, plus loads of dining options. So don't worry: the only rumble getting settled is the tummy kind.

How many times can a man get hit in the groin?

THE RELEASE OF A FOURTH INSTALMENT IN THE *JACKASS* MOVIE FRANCHISE PROMPTS **RALPH JONES** TO ASK THE EXPERTS HOW MUCH PUMMELING HIS JIBBLIES CAN TAKE



f you were a rhino we probably wouldn't be having this conversation. When it comes to private organs, men's bodies are spectacularly badly made: their baby-making equipment

is exposed on the outside of their bodies because humans have learned to walk on two legs. Rhinos and other quadrupeds, by contrast, don't share stories down the pub about being kicked in the nardledanglers because, walking around on four legs, their bodies naturally protect them from genital disaster.

Most of us, therefore, do our utmost to avoid exposing our groin to pointless unnecessary harm. This is the polar opposite of the *Jackass* ethos, where "pointless unnecessary harm" is deliberately sought out. The gang's new film, *Jackass Forever*, is a catalogue of self-inflicted (sometimes bullinflicted) pain. One of these injuries involves Ehren McGhehey being pummelled in the plums by reigning UFC heavyweight champion Francis

Ngannou, who can officially punch harder than anyone else on this planet (and possibly others). So – how unwise was McGhehey? How often can a man get hit in the nads without sustaining permanent harm?

Most punches don't really cause any damage, says men's health expert Dr Jeff Foster – though of course they hurt. The reason that men feel a nauseous pain in their stomach, says Dr Foster, is because in the womb the testicles develop in the abdomen, before gradually descending and ending up outside the body.

In the dangerous world of sport between 2% and 5% of injuries are groin-centric, and the sports in which your groin is at most risk are ice hockey, American football and soccer, where the percentage rises a little. When something collides with your genitals at high speed, says Dr Foster, there are several genuinely serious injuries to watch out for – the details of which you might like to be spared, but I can reveal they include the word "rupture". Though Dr Foster doesn't downplay the risk of Ngannou's

punch – "The simple answer is he could kill you" – he says that you don't need to open your legs to a UFC champion in order to sustain a rupture. "If a child hits you at the wrong angle and hits your testicle hard enough, you can still rupture the capsule." Good to know.

Dr Foster's answer is that it doesn't actually matter how many times you subject your bojangles to punches, if they're low-velocity you can do it "indefinitely". What matters is the amount of force. And, as if it wasn't clear enough, another expert, pharmacist Giulia Guerrini, says, "My medical advice is to avoid being punched in the testicles by a UFC champion as much as possible." At last, something we can all agree on.

A few knocks to your groin, no biggie, but one huge one and your obituary could be deeply embarrassing.




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It's not the fuzzy kind of facial hair you'd expect from a meek British actor looking to rough up his image. This is

serious growth. This is aspiring to be Tom Selleck. This is a full-fat, all-American moustache.

Yes, it's for a role, but it also suits him. Stevens is famous for playing Edwardian dreamboat Matthew Crawley in stately juggernaut Downton Abbey, which required a stiff but largely hairless upper lip. When his character was killed off in dramatic and controversial fashion 10 years ago, it was a watershed moment, for the series and the actor. A career playing other affable, good-looking British people beckoned, but instead he chose to uproot his life and move Stateside.

This was a gamble. Many Brits before him have taken the same step and returned to the UK with their tails between their legs. But, like his good pals Benedict Cumberbatch and Eddie Redmayne - both veterans of British period dramas - he's found his own kind of flex. There's been unnerving indie thriller The Guest (2014), Disney's live-action remake of Beauty and the Beast (2017), and a memorable turn as a closeted Russian star in Netflix's Eurovision Song Contest comedy – a pandemic hit in 2020. Why take on these roles in particular?

"It was never a grand game plan," he says, between sips of coffee. "When I left Downton,

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people thought I had everything lined up and it was like, 'Oh right, you're going to do this,' but it was more, 'Well, no, actually, I just fancy exploring a bit.'"

It was a particularly bold move to depart *Downton* at its height, with the show drawing an estimated global audience of 120 million. "I felt like I hadn't really kicked the tyres of what I was about, and the things that I wanted to do," he reflects. "Not everything in the last 10 years has been wildly successful, but they've all had a nice lesson attached to them, and I feel like each thing has added on to the shape of things in an interesting way."

Stevens is sat on the deck of the home he shares with his wife and three children in LA's Eastside. He's wearing a casual floral shirt and seems extremely relaxed. I was expecting him to be more intense, more English (British actors in Hollywood can be quite earnest). But instead, he's laid-back and at peace with the world.

This is despite delving deep into one of the messiest, and still most prescient, parts of American political history for his latest role. *Gaslit* is a major new drama series, based on the hit podcast *Slow Burn*, that goes behind the story of the 1970s Watergate scandal to reveal the histories of some



lesser-known players. These include Martha Mitchell, the wife of the then attorney general, whose knowledge of events, and willingness to speak out, led to her being kidnapped and assaulted. Mitchell is played by Julia Roberts, and her husband, John, is played by Sean Penn. "There are certain people where you just think, 'That sounds great, I don't need to know much more than that,'" Stevens says of his heavyweight co-stars.

The eight-part series "looks at things that were traditionally footnotes and blows them up", explains Stevens, who plays "hugely ambitious young upstart" and White House counsel John Dean, a man who "gets in way over his head and realises too late what he's got himself into".

The story is so bonkers, he says, that, "if you were to write it into a political thriller, people would be like, 'I don't believe that at all.' The truth is regularly stranger than fiction, especially these days. I enjoy surprising an audience, whether it's with a project itself or something within the story, and I can't wait to see people's reactions. It's cool to be a part of something that makes people go, 'What?!'"

The very 70s moustache that Stevens is sporting was not grown for *Gaslit*, however, but for >

his upcoming role in *Immigrant*, a darkly comic US series from the creators of *Pam & Tommy*. Stevens will play Paul Snider, the club promoter who notoriously killed his estranged Playboy model wife Dorothy Stratten in 1980, before killing himself.

Although the two projects sound very different, both involve real-life subjects, and both examine toxic masculinity, which Stevens is fascinated by. "We look at the role of masculinity in society now and where that's come from and a lot of stories [around men] have come up from our parents' generation," he considers. "Snider, in particular, represents a certain kind of aspirational masculinity of that time, which was extremely destructive... He's a real piece of work. Not a nice man. As a character to inhabit he's not someone I want to live with for very long!"

There's an old Hollywood cliché that British actors make the best villains, and undoubtedly

there's something about an Oxbridgeeducated Englishman that pairs well with icv malevolence. Stevens is fast friends with Tom Hiddleston, for example, whose simmering inner conflicts have made the role of Loki, in the Marvel Cinematic Universe, a fan favourite. However. it was Stevens who really paved the way for Marvel's conflicted heroes.

and for the far-out TV shows and movies that now dominate all screens, big and small. Between 2017-19 he played schizophrenic mutant David Haller in Marvel's cult show *Legion*.

"The fact that we got to make *Legion* at all was a delight because it was so different and so challenging," he explains with almost geeky enthusiasm. "There was no precedent for a show that strange. Every single member of the cast was going, 'What is happening? What is this?' And after a time we got into a groove of, 'This is one of the weirdest shows on television, let's just enjoy that."

For Stevens, that role – like all others – was an opportunity for exploration. "Typecasting only comes from saying yes to the same thing too many

times," he says. "But that's not to say I won't revisit certain genres occasionally." Case in point, his leading role in the 2020 adaptation of Noël Coward's Blithe Spirit - a return to period hijinks. "If I'm entertained and stretched in new directions, I'll feel like I'm breaking new ground," he says. "And hopefully that will be received in a way that's entertaining."

As our warm and breezy chat comes to an end, Stevens lets me in on a theory: that audiences can always tell if an actor is having a good time. "I think you can read through a screen if someone is really going for it and having fun in a new field," he explains. "And I recognise that in other actors' performances; I'm like, 'Wow that person is having a great time doing something they've never been allowed to do before. This is so fun to watch."

It might be hard to define what "wildly successful" means, but it could just be a measure of the amount of fun you're having. In which case, Dan Stevens is at the very top of his game.

Save our soul foods

THE GULLAH AND GEECHEE PEOPLES OF THE SOUTHERN UNITED STATES HAVE DELICIOUS, BUT DISAPPEARING, FOOD TRADITIONS. **JEWEL WICKER** MEETS THE GEORGIA "CHEFARMER" PRESERVING GULLAH GEECHEE CUISINE IN MOUTHWATERING STYLE

When I arrived on his farm in Brunswick, Georgia, on a Monday night, he'd just wrapped a crab boil in celebration of his wife - and business partner - Tia's 50th birthday. The next morning, he's right back at it: tending to slow-cooked osso buco that has been going for two days now, falling apart with the slightest tug of a fork. The table that less than 12 hours ago held a mass of seafood now supports egg pie (a recipe Matthew got from his grandma), olive oil grits (a recipe Tia created after watching chefs add olive oil to polenta in Italy), and a sweet and savoury bacon jam. They also serve a hibiscus tea that Tia has been making using the plants they grow on the farm.

This high-level hospitality could exhaust even the most seasoned hosts, but Matthew lives to entertain: inside his mint-green home, he has fashioned a garage

space into a gathering spot where he cooks for friends, family and anyone else who is lucky enough to get an invite to Gilliard Farms (the couple welcome tour groups and overnight guests), where he and Tia live and work. Matthew is a self-proclaimed "chefarmer" – that's a chef-andfarmer. He is also Gullah Geechee, belonging to a group of people whose ancestors were brought from West Africa and enslaved in North and South Carolina, Georgia and Florida. The uniqueness of the group – which grew rice, cotton and indigo – lies in the fact that, as a result of their isolation along the coast and on barrier islands, they've

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been able to preserve much of their African heritage, passing language and other traditions down through the generations.

But, as with many indigenous groups, some things are in danger of disappearing. The Gullah Geechee are known for their unique cuisine, which is informed by traditional food practices like subsistence fishing and small-scale agriculture. But as more and more Gullah Geechee are displaced or willingly move to different regions, this cultural knowledge is facing an uncertain future, which is why the Raifords feel a duty to preserve it.

"We have an opportunity to shape a story," Tia, who is also a chef, tells me. "This is an overdue conversation. When assimilation was the priority in this country, what was lost?"

So far, it seems that the Raifords are managing to bring this conversation to the mainstream: Matthew was a James Beard Award semi-finalist in 2018 (Best Chef: Southeast), and last year he released a cookbook with Tia's help called *Bress 'n'*

Nyam (a Gullah Geechee phrase that translates as "bless and eat"). But, there's still way more they want to do. During my visit to the farm, a camera crew lurks around, hoping to turn the Raifords' everyday life into the next popular culinary docuseries (think Netflix's *High on the Hog*).

I get a glimpse at the vast property and the things that grow here, including some of the plants Matthew nurtures each year – rice, hibiscus, tomatoes, ginger, turmeric. He grew up here, visiting his grandma in the same house he now lives in. Since he returned 11 years ago to farm the land and manage the property with his sister, he's been relearning it all.

That Matthew and his sister are the sixth generation of farmers on this family-owned plot is no small feat, especially in a time and place where many people who look like them are losing their property. In the case of Matthew's family, his great-great-great-grandfather purchased more than 400 acres for the price of \$9 in property tax in 1874. Today, the two Raiford siblings own about 40 acres (16 hectares) of this, although Matthew says they hope to eventually repurchase some of the land they've lost. These days, Gullah Geechee face more barriers to cultural preservation than their exodus to cities: their traditional Lowcountry home means they're particularly susceptible to the ravages of climate change and rising property taxes mean owning swathes of farmland is becoming increasingly unsustainable. That's why being in Brunswick and growing their ancestor's traditional crops is a big deal for the Raifords.

"It feels monumental," says Tia. "Rice has as much of a significance with African-American ancestry as cotton."

EFFIE'S SHRIMP CREOLE

MATTHEW'S MOM'S RECIPE. SERVES 4

Melt two tablespoons of butter, and stir in a diced onion and three minced garlic cloves. Sauté everything until golden brown, which will take about five minutes. 2 Add chopped green, orange and red bell peppers (one of each); 16oz (450g) of tomato puree; a tablespoon of red pepper flakes; and two cups of rice, stirring until well combined.

Pour one quart (one litre) of stock in slowly, then bring the creole to a boil. Once boiling, stir, cover, then reduce the heat to low and simmer for 15 minutes. Remove the cover, add two pounds (900g) of large shrimp and give the rice a good stir.

5 Cook for five to seven minutes more, until all the liquid is absorbed and the shrimp have pinked and curled. 6 Season to your liking with salt and pepper, serve – and enjoy.



MESS O' GREENS serves 4 to 6

In a large stockpot, heat two tablespoons of olive oil over medium-high heat. Add two diced onions and sauté until translucent.

Add three garlic cloves and caramelise. Add red, orange, and yellow bell peppers (two of each). Stir around until they grow tender.

3 Add one pound of collard greens, two quarts of water, half a cup of apple cider vinegar, and some smoked paprika, steak seasoning and cayenne pepper.

Cook down for 15 to 20 minutes, then add another pound of greens, another half cup of vinegar and two quarts of water.

Just before they are done, stir in more seasoning and salt. Serve immediately, preferably with the shrimp creole featured on the previous page!



In spite of the resilient, remarkable legacy of the Black community in Brunswick, the city's racist history remains a dark cloud. Matthew left town as a teenager, swearing he'd never return to live, after he was denied access to a bathroom. Now an adult, he's concerned not much has changed. The Raifords currently live less than 10 minutes away from the place where only two years ago Ahmaud Arbery tried and failed to outrun the bullets fired at him by a group of men who felt he didn't belong.

Matthew says, even with the sense of purpose he's felt since returning to his family's farm, this is why he struggles when people refer to the region as the "New South" in an effort to distance it from its prejudiced past. "This is a reclamation," he says. "I have come home to a place that when I left was the Old South and now is being framed as the New South, and I'm doing the same things and having the same problems."

But, still, there is a sense of peace the Raifords have found here despite everything. We're not even done with walking the farm after brunch when Matthew starts thinking about what we should eat for dinner. By evening, the film crew has left, Tia has returned from a visit to the vet with the couple's puppy and Matthew begins to prepare our final

meal together. Over wine, roasted chicken and vegetables, macaroni and cheese, and brussels sprouts coated with leftover bacon jam, I ask him how much of his work is created in an effort to intentionally disrupt the narrow images we often have about Black chefs.

"I'm tired of people thinking they're not going to allow my authenticity to be disruptive," he says. "I mess them up because I'm all the things. I'm Gullah Geechee. I'm a cook. I farm. I do all of those practices the old ways. I can do it over fire,

charcoal, hot brick, induction..." Matthew has disruption in mind even when he cooks Black Southern food: his recipe for fried chicken takes two days to prepare, a nod to its traditional status as a celebratory dish for Black Americans, not something they regularly ate.

Time seems to be the theme of my trip to Gilliard Farms. It took Matthew and Tia about 25 years to reunite and eventually marry, following a brief romance in culinary school. Like this relationship, many of the projects I talk to the couple about will take a while to bear fruit.

If I were to come back to Brunswick in 90 days, I might be able to see some of the food Matthew is preparing to yield today. It'll take even longer for a docuseries on the Raifords to be completed and make its way on air. Similarly, the next cookbook that Matthew is currently outlining, which will explore how planting crops together can manipulate their flavours, is nowhere near ready to hit the shelves. Much of Matthew's work as a Gullah Geechee farmer is like this – growing, slowly, as a part of an established root system, ever-inching towards the surface.

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

But like so many industries, floristry is rethinking its impact, not just on the planet but on people too. A new bunch of budding entrepreneurs is pioneering a more thoughtful approach, putting themselves at the centre of their communities and doing good with every bouquet. We spoke to five florists to find out why they're branching out. >

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Flower power

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Lewis Miller's top tip

FLORAL DESIGNER LEWIS MILLER has

created bouquets and installations for some of New York's most rich and fabulous, but it's his altruistic Flower Flashes that have caught the imagination of the city. Creeping around in the middle of the night, Miller and his team use leftover flowers that would otherwise go to waste to create spectacular public installations in sites as incongruous as street dustbins and cordoned off roadworks. "Like all public street art, they are meant to bring strangers together," says Miller. "Some people are surprised and delighted, others are confused, but everyone feels something. It is a shared experience." These guerilla-style arrangements are usually dismantled by passers-by who take the blooms as they go, leaving little trace of the event by the end of the day. "New Yorkers can be a jaded bunch, so if we

can remind them that there is beauty in this world and that they are deserving of it, we've met our goal!" You can only visit Miller's floral studio by appointment, but keep your eyes peeled as you travel through the city and you may just spot something blooming lovely.

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Flower power

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For flowers with a purpose FRIDA PICKLES, LOS ANGELES

"THRIVING THROUGH FLOWERS" is the

strapline of Frida Pickles, an enterprising florists in the San Gabriel area of LA. It's not just a marketing slogan: from the ground up, Pickles is built around a more considered model than your usual store. "It was founded to support our autistic daughter Sofia on her journey in life and ensure she is included in work and community, as all people should be," says owner Susan Sanchez. The company works with local agencies and colleges to employ differently abled people in above-minimum wage paid positions, and tailors the workplace around them with support such as shorter shifts, lower lighting and skills development. "We are more than a

florists," says Sanchez. "Our shop is a place where, like flowers, everyone is different and encouraged to thrive." They also run botany classes that are open to anyone, regardless of ability.

Frida Pickles' top tip

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"Tulips will continue to grow in the vase when cut. To help prevent drooping, you can prick the top of the stem just beneath the flower and also add a penny to the vase. Tulips love to drink so keep the vase full of water."

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For a masterclass in sustainability ELECTRIC DAISY FLOWER FARM, LONDON

THIS NORTH LONDON boutique was handpicked by the community it serves after Highgate residents campaigned against a faceless redevelopment and won the privilege of choosing the indie shops they wanted to see on the high street. "It's wonderful to have been chosen and be so tied in with the community," says founder Fiona Haser Bizony. Helping people to become aware of the environmental cost of intensively farming and importing cut flowers is one of the store's missions, and the community connections mean that they are able to deliver workshops in schools about organic growing, as well as sharing the ethos with customers. "We are the only shop in the UK that supplies all of its own flowers," she says. "It's a totally circular system: the flowers are grown organically on our Somerset farm, they come to the shop, and then any waste and trimmings go back there to be composted." How's that for zero waste?

Electric Daisy is pretty unique: it has its own farm in Somerset, south-west England, that supplies all the shop's blooms; Fiona Haser Bizony, *below*

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For farm life in the city JAFTHA'S FLOWER FARM, CAPE TOWN

THE GLOSSY CAPE TOWN suburb of Constantia is famous for its wine, but tucked away in the verdant Sillery neighbourhood is a much more attractive crop. The Jaftha family have been growing flowers for generations, and today brothers Charles and Malcolm continue the tradition their father began on this site many years ago. But the Jafthas' history isn't all rosy. Like many others, the family were forcibly moved from their farm in 1969 during the dark days of South African apartheid. Today, though, they're back and applying their enormous knowledge to cultivation. Their farm is a beacon of hope and a beautiful reminder of the importance of land and community: every

day locals pick up the freshest blooms straight from the gate.

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For low-mileage blooms TERRA BELLA FLOWERS, SEATTLE

YOU MIGHT NOT want to think about it as you pop a freshly bought bouquet in your favourite vase, but the flower business has a big problem with its carbon footprint. Supplies are often trucked or flown in from a long way off, but in this beautiful Phinney Ridge florist they all come from much closer to home. Founder Melissa Feveyear worked with local farmers to help found the Seattle Wholesale Growers Market Cooperative, a nonprofit marketplace for local and US-grown flowers.

Professionals as well as the public can stop in to pick up clean-conscience stems and Fevevear gets all the materials for her shop there, so her daring bouquets are as beautiful as they are sustainable. 



French starter

Julia Child's love affair with food was inspired in 1948 by a childhood meal in Rouen, France, which she called "an opening up of the spirit and soul".

A mix of masterful training

With her new appetite for cooking, Child studied at legendary cookery school Le Cordon Bleu in Paris and trained with master chefs like Max Bugnard.

One pinch of luck

Simone Beck, who was writing a French cookery book, met Child at a Parisian women's cooking club and commissioned her to make the book appeal to US readers.

✓ A larderful of know In 1951, Child, Beck and Louisette Bertholle began teaching French cooking classes at Child's Paris home.

oupcon of resilience

The first draft of Mastering the Art of French Cooking was rejected for being too tricky, but Alfred P Knopf published the legendary cookery book by Child, Beck and Bertholle in 1961.

Child starred in her own award-winning television series, The French Chef, after demonstrating how to cook an omelette for a Boston audience.

complicated hi

She held unsavoury homophobic views in the 1970s, but became an activist for AIDS research after losing someone close to her to the disease.

Enough for everyone

Child made cooking accessible and enjoyable, helping launch a modern food renaissance. As well as the documentary screening onboard there's to be a show on HBO about her later this year, starring Brit Sarah

Lancashire. Yep, she's flavour of the month.

ROCK 'N' DROLL

JUST WHEN DID rock 'n' roll get so serious? All those stadium-sized bands, belting out earnest choruses. Proclaiming their "sex is on fire" while unironically wearing braces. If the "rock star" isn't a silly concept, I don't know what is.

Luckily, the Brits are here to undercut the pomposity of the guitar band and bring a bit of fun back to proceedings. Take Yard Act, for example – the Leeds upstarts whose angular post-punk guitarwork and pithy lyrics poke fun at just about everything, including what it's like to be a musician. "If you wanna make some decent money from it you'd be better off kicking that d***head singer you've got out the band," drawls James Smith, who is Yard Act's singer and who (at the time of publication at least) has not yet been kicked out of the band. That line comes from *The Overload*, which is the title track of Yard Act's first album – recently released to much hype and acclaim.

Though it comes in waves, bands being low-key funny is nothing new. Ever since the first flames of

the punk movement died down, musicians – especially ones from the north of England – have been taking a more humorous approach to the idea that everything's a bit rubbish. See: The Smiths; Pulp; The Fall. In fact, James Smith's surly halfspoken, half-sung delivery is so much like that of late-great The Fall singer Mark E Smith that it's kind of a joke in itself.

And Yard Act aren't the only Brit band causing this kind of riot. Sleaford Mods, Dry Cleaning, Idles and others all toe the line between hilarious and furious, with lyrics that are equal parts juvenile nonsense and searing polemic. It's a scene summed up by the pleasing German word *Sprechgesang*, meaning "spoken voice".

A post-pandemic, post-punk movement built around not taking anything too seriously... even the serious stuff? It makes sense. Sometimes all you can do is laugh.

NEVER ONE TO do things by halves, the latest album from The Weeknd is an ambitious synth-pop epic that he himself has called a conceptual work describing a state of purgatory, a "journey towards the light at the end of the tunnel". Phew. Onboard for this particular trip are the likes of Jim Carrey, who provides narration, while guest vocals come from Tyler, the Creator and Lil Wayne, and Quincy Jones and Josh Safdie provide spoken-word interludes.

And if all that sounds like terribly hard work and not much fun, the surprise is that it's quite the opposite. Indeed,

critics have hailed it as a sunny, upbeat experience that is as danceable as it is thought-provoking and very possibly the best thing to bear The Weeknd's name to date. Which, as you might imagine, is very, very high praise indeed.
