





oes anyone reading this happen to be in charge of the Olympic Games? If so. can I take this moment to suggest an exciting new event for Paris 2024? It's called the Mid-Blockbuster Toilet Dash

and it's a sport that cinemagoers will be very familiar with. It used to be that films were around 90 minutes in length. Of late, though, movies have been getting longer and longer, making it harder to get through an entire screening without needing to perform a lung-busting sprint to the bathroom and back. Three-hour run-times are increasingly the norm in 2023 - leading to a new generation of cinephile Usain Bolts getting very good at lightning-quick loo trips, determined not to miss an important reveal.

The brilliant Babylon, Tár and The Fabelmans - all available on today's in-flight entertainment – each push the three-hour mark. Ditto such recent releases as James Cameron's box office-conquering Avatar: The Way of Water, Black Panther: Wakanda Forever. Dune. The Batman and No Time to Die. There was a time when Hollywood tried to make films as brief as possible to maximise the number of screenings that cinemas could fit into a day, therefore selling more tickets. Recently, however, studios have been offering more bang for their audiences' bucks, as Tinseltown increasingly finds that the only thing able to draw the crowds into cinemas are bumper-length movies with epic effects.

Long films have always existed - Lawrence of Arabia lasts practically as long as a flight from London to Arabia - but a glance at some of 2023's most anticipated movies shows they've never been in finer fettle. Horror auteur Ari Aster's eagerly awaited new movie Beau Is Afraid was rumoured to be four hours long before a recent trim, with another three-hour-plus odyssey from Martin Scorcese incoming - Killers of the Flower Moon marks his return after 2019's The Irishman, which itself ran for three hours and 29 minutes.

Why's this happening? It could be that prestige TV has given audiences a craving for novelistic stories, where more episodes allow audiences to

to do in life, so I try to make time for it. I have eight or nine rides there that are absolutely necessary – like, you've got to do Splash Mountain. It was made for people to experience joy and that's a really special thing. It's so funny, I was talking with my roommates about Disneyland just this morning – I feel like it's my whole personality now.

How long have you lived in Nashville?

I moved here two years ago. I was wanting to get out of New York because I'd been there for 10 years and during the peak of the pandemic it was just really desolate and changed a lot. I wanted to move to Austin, Texas, but then I met my boyfriend and he lived here. It's been great. I'm really interested in the DIY music scene and the people making indie music here. That community is really growing and it's really exciting to see. My friends' bands are making some of the most special music I've ever heard. There's this band

called Venus & the Flytraps here and I'm their biggest fan.

You act too – is there anything in the pipeline?

I don't love it unless I really love the story. It's just more fun for me to tell my own story. I also think the industry is a little bit too image oriented for me. But if there was a really good play or something, I would love to be a part of that. I like biography – it'd be cool to do a biopic.

Lana Del Rey is a huge influence on the new album. What do you love about her?

She really sticks to her guns, and she's so sure of who she is. Her voice is really, really unwavering. As a writer, I admire that a lot. That's something that I aspire to be able to do. I've never seen her play live though – I think I would die, I don't think I could handle it!

Your work was compared to that of the writer Raymond Carver by NPR – how did that feel?

That was a huge honour. I had just picked up one of his poetry books at the record store the day before I saw that. I'm a big poetry nerd. Maya Angelou is my favourite probably, and Anne Sexton and William Carlos Williams. I write my own poetry and I think that's why I got into songwriting – it's my favourite thing to do, it's what got me through school. I would love to release my own poetry book; I have one that's done, I'm just waiting until I work up the courage to release it.

Gloria Steinem officiated at your parents' wedding - is she a family friend?

She's friends with my mom, so I had the privilege of being around her growing up and getting to learn from her, which is unbelievably special. She's pathologically humble, she won't give advice, but just being adjacent to her is a special feeling. She's very normal and modest.

Honey recently came out to an incredible reaction – what are your plans for album three?

I think I'm already making another one; I've got four new songs. Being on tour is really rejuvenating and has replenished my well of creativity.

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hen Geoff MacCormack met David Robert Jones, they were two music-obsessed eight-year-olds in the London suburb of Bromley, Kent. They bonded over their shared love

of American rock 'n' roll and the R&B-flavoured tunes being played on Radio Luxembourg. A decade later, David Jones became David Bowie – a global sensation and one of the most influential pop artists of all time.

Throughout the rest of Bowie's life, he and MacCormack stayed close. When his friend went on the road, MacCormack followed him – from LA to Japan on a sailboat, and then back to the UK from Japan through Russia on the Trans-Siberian Express, taking candid snaps along the way. Now all those images are being published for the very first time in *David Bowie: Rock 'n' Roll With Me*.

from bad press over the years. Why? For their association with greasy funfairs, probably. And Homer Simpson, Well, now they're having a glow-up thanks to Roladin - an Israeli bakery group known for their decidedly chichi takes on sweet treats. Their new space on London's Charing Cross Road is very glam indeed - from the stripy awning out front to the marbled countertops and brass cake stands within, all wittily spot-lit by lamps shaped like patisserie piping bags. Never mind all that, how are the donuts? Dang fine. Check out the ludicrously indulgent St Honore – named after the French patron saint of pastry chefs – with salted caramel, mascarpone cream and a caramelised vanilla profiterole plonked on top. Or scoff the Pistachio with Chantilly cream, dried raspberry

and almond sable. We promise it'll make you all gooey inside.

Clarified cocktails pack a punch

Full transparency: clarified cocktails are nothing new. Benjamin Franklin was a fan. Just add milk and lemon iuice to a boozy mixture. leave for a few hours, then strain through cheesecloth. Voilà, no imperfections. But "milk punch". as it's also known. is having a moment. Case in point: the new Jelas in NYC (the name is Malay for "clear") serves only lucid drinks. The Milk Punch at London EDITION has a lively slug of brandy, while Blyth & Burrows in Portland, Maine, goes Big In Japan with a vodka cocktail that's clarified with coconut milk. So, vegans, you're in the clear.

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WATCHING PELICANS DIVE-BOMB

a sparkling turquoise cay and hummingbirds frolicking under your balcony as you stand aperitif in hand, you might be forgiven for thinking, "This is lovely, but is it really Soho House?" Most famous as a network of sophisticated urban pieds-à-terre, the hotel and private members group now does barefoot luxury. Soho Beach House is on dinky Canouan island in St Vincent and the Grenadines, a short "puddle jumper" flight from St Lucia. While brand standards are on point - suave bar, pop-up Cowshed spa, Frette linen - it radiates a more laid-back, less busy vibe. There are no TVs in the rooms or desks.

But there is a beach. And hammock seating. And a palapashaded restaurant serving boat-fresh ceviche, roasted breadfruit and

papaya sorbet, which you can scoff on a jetty if you fancy. Every room has a balcony and the WiFi is very good - not that you'll be needing it here.

peeding through the streets of San Francisco - through Potrero Hill up to San Bruno Mountain State Park -Steve McQueen's Ford Mustang set the standard for onscreen car

chases in 1968's Bullitt. It may not have the same movie-making mythos as Los Angeles, but San Fran has formed the backdrop for many iconic film moments - so much so that even a casual stroll around the city reveals cinematic history on each corner and up every hill.

The beloved San Francisco International Film Festival (SFFILM) - running 13-23 April - solidifies SF's reputation as a movie-lover's paradise. Founded in 1957, SFFILM is the longest-running film festival in the Americas, presenting unique stories from around the world. Outside the festival, there are plenty of year-round opportunities to take a cinematic journey through this telegenic city.

The best place to start is at Foreign Cinema (1) - a restaurant in the Mission District that takes the dinner-and-a-movie concept to the next level. Favourites like Young Frankenstein, High Fidelity and *Gypsy* are projected onto a wall in a romantic interior courtyard that feels like it could be the setting for a Fellini film. Instead of popcorn, the James Beard Award-nominated chefs serve dishes like five spice duck breast with roasted garlic Yukon hash and grilled lavender-brined pork chop with warm leek and farro salad.

Or if you'd prefer to dine at an actual celeb's restaurant, then head across town to film director Francis Ford Coppola's own **Cafe Zoetrope**, which deserves an Academy Award for the decor alone. Housed within North Beach's historic Sentinel Building - a copper-patina flatiron structure - it sets the stage for an epic meal with walls adorned with old Hollywood photos (Coppola's production company used to be upstairs). Italian-American dishes populate the menu like spaghetti with beef. pork and veal meatballs. But the house specialty is the Caesar salad, invented in this very building at Caesar's Grill in 1924 and made fresh each day. Scan the extensive wine list and vou'll find exclusive bottles from Coppola's wineries.

One of the best places for film-star sightings is just a few blocks away at Tosca Cafe. This century-old restaurant and watering hole has been a magnet for Hollywood actors passing through and local celebrities stirring up gossip (Sean Penn and Bruce Springsteen have been among its enthusiastic patrons). Order any of the inventive cocktails and you won't be disappointed, but the Tosca Negroni, made with citrusy Amaro. and the vodka-based, warmly spiced Mamma Mia are standouts.

In the heart of the Mission District you'll find one the oldest continuously run cinemas in the USA – and you have no excuse to miss it, that



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glowing neon sign dominates the street. The **Roxie Theater (2)** is a local treasure dating back to 1912 and the interior has barely changed in decades, with vintage film posters and speckled red carpeting in the lobby. It shows hard-to-find films and hosts local festivals, including the San Francisco Documentary Festival and the San Francisco Short Film Festival.

San Franciscans also have a thing for outdoor movie screenings: Dolores Park, the Presidio and Fort Mason double as hugely popular pop-up outdoor cinemas. As of last year, the Bay Area got its very first year-round outdoor theatre: **The Cut**, located in the Transbay neighbourhood. Here, a 7m-wide LED screen brings mainstream hits, cult classics and local film programming to viewers who can relax on bean bags or deckchairs. Concessions are offered from a full bar as well as some excellent nearby food trucks.

The city's museums also offer a fascinating look behind the silver screen. Hidden in the Presidio

National Park, you'll find George Lucas's film studio, Lucasfilm, where series like *Star Wars* and *Indiana Jones* are brought to life. While you can't tour the super-secret studio, the **Lucasfilm lobby** hosts an amazing museum and sculpture garden open to the public featuring props and tributes to Lucas's best work. Just a short walk away, you can also delve into another icon of film history at **The Walt Disney Family Museum (3)**, with hands-on exhibitions and animation workshops for young and old.

For an ideal closing act to your cinematic

voyage, relax at the AMAC Kabuki 8 and the Kabuki Springs & Spa in Japantown. Within this theatre and spa complex, you can indulge in a shiatsu massage at the traditional Japanese-style bathhouse before taking your cinema seat. Don't forget to order a cocktail before

sinking into a comfy lounge chair.

Housed in a flatiron-style

building in the Mid-Market district,

you won't find a more appealing base than **Proper Hotel SF (4)**. It's a favourite celebrity hangout, located amid the dazzling theatres and busy markets of the neighbourhood. Take in camera-ready sweeps of the city from the rooftop bar, then call it a wrap.

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Can I change my identity?

ON THE LAM IN BANDIT. JOSH DUHAMEL ASSUMES A NEW PERSONA. BUT HOW EASY IS IT TO ERASE THE PAST, RALPH JONES WONDERS



ver wanted to make a fresh start? Wanted to grow a shaggy beard, wear sunglasses indoors and be known only as JJ McLegend? Of course you have. You're only human.

Mainly because we are all painfully aware of the mistakes and flaws that make up our imperfect lives, we yearn to wipe that dirty slate clean, conjuring a new persona out of thin air.

In Bandit, Josh Duhamel's motives are a little less honourable: he escapes from prison in Michigan and uses a fake identity to start robbing banks when he arrives in Canada. Though this is literally about as illegal as it's possible to get, is it possible in this age of surveillance? If you wanted to create a new identity for perfectly innocent reasons, would vou be able to?

Private detective Peter Torley warns bluntly: "To get a new identity, you would have to do something illegal, unless you had the cooperation of the state." If you wanted to give yourself a new birth certificate, trying to retrospectively alter the footprint you have left on the world, the government would have to do it for you. But, in practice, they never would. "You

can't change the DNA of who you are," says Torley.

There are plenty of things you can do to minimise your online past. You can opt out from data collection companies. painstakingly delete your old online accounts and even pay companies like DeleteMe to remove your information from the web to

the best of their ability. In the EU and the UK, GDPR Article 7, called the "right to be forgotten", upholds citizens' rights to have their data erased from search engines - though this right isn't absolute (it only applies, somewhat ominously, when the personal data in question "is no longer necessary in relation to the purpose for which it was collected").

You can't vanish but you can make your old self much harder to find.

You can also change your name by deed poll. "I've had many cases where people have changed their name," Torley says. This decision will quickly help you create an entirely new person: you can get a new passport and driving licence, and will begin to leave a paper trail, scattering evidence of

> doesn't mean that your past self will magically disappear. But it does mean that you have legitimately willed a new person into the world - a little like giving birth but without all of the pain.


A whole new persona will make your life more complicated in the short term: you'll need to correct everyone

as they get your name wrong and you'll need to tell your utilities providers all about it. But you'll know if it's the right thing for you. The mess will be worth it. You'll finally be you, free to live as you had always imagined. Pleased to meet you, Mr JJ McLegend, sir.

Watch Bandit



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After a decade lighting up our screens with her candid hilarity, Tiffany Haddish is eyeing up her next big move: becoming a bona fide mogul. She talks to **Al Horner** about striving in Hollywood and turning pain into purpose

Haddish returned with a new job title and a new, very famous best friend. "I'm now Sir Elton John's official gardener!" says the comedian, beaming, the morning after a night spent enjoying the Hollywood awards extravaganza in the company of pop royalty. "I said to him, 'I heard you have the best garden in England. Can we have high tea in your garden? I'll help you pull weeds, I'll do it all.' He was like, 'Err... I have someone to do that for me. But sure. honey!' That's a legally binding invite," says the 43-year-old, who wasn't exactly short of work before adding "horticulturist to the Rocketman" to an already-glimmering CV.

Haddish, you see, is one of America's most in-demand entertainers: an actress, stand-up and author whose promotional appearances on late-night talk shows are funnier than most comics' actual movies. Examples? The time on Jimmy Kimmel Live! when she described making strange sexual advances at Leonardo DiCaprio. Or the time on The Daily Show with Trevor Noah when she described doing something - ahem - incredibly unhygienic in an ex-boyfriend's Nikes after discovering that he'd been cheating. Or the time... well, you get it. Tiffany

Haddish is funny. If she's half as good at tending to plants as she is telling uproarious stories, or inhabiting wild-eyed characters like the ones she played in hit comedies such as Girls Trip, Night School and The Carmichael Show, then Elton's petunias are about to flourish like never before. >





That particular career departure may have to wait, however. Haddish is busy, she tells me, building an empire. How is she going to do that? Well, the first part of her "strategy", as she calls it, is taking on meatier leading roles. She plays a rogue agent opposite Nicolas Cage in The Unbearable Weight of Massive Talent; at the end of April, she returns as wilv crime-fighter Detective Danner for a second season of hilarious whodunnit The Afterparty; and soon she'll appear in Haunted Mansion, Disney's upcoming blockbuster based on the hit theme park attraction.

The next step is giving other would-be filmmakers a leg up. "I want to have my own studio where I can provide a platform for people to tell the stories they think the world should see," she explains. Sure, she's already won a Grammy (Best Comedy Album, for 2019's Black Mitzvah).

And, yes, in 2018, she was named one of Time magazine's 100 most influential people on the planet. But all that was just the beginning. "It feels like I'm sitting in front of a big bonfire with a bunch of s'mores on sticks all cooking in there and I'm trying to make sure none of them melt." The comic grins at her way of describing having a lot of projects in the pipeline, each one another notch in her guest for Hollywood domination.

It's hard to imagine any of the movies she's currently working on, either as an actor or producer, having a story quite as dramatic as her own. Haddish's 2017 memoir *The Last Black* Unicorn detailed how she grew up in a Los Angeles family almost ripped apart by an abusive stepfather, who she alleges tampered with the


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brakes of her mother's car in a deliberate attempt to kill them. The aim, she says, was to collect a life insurance payout. Instead, the resulting crash left Haddish's mother, Leola, with brain damage that made her quick-tempered and violent. Haddish became the primary caregiver to her four siblings; it's uncertain what became of the stepfather.

"If I could [change things] I would, but maybe then I wouldn't be where I'm at now. I wish it all didn't happen the way it happened, but those things did happen and I learned valuable lessons from them," the comedian reflects today. "I think it's really important to make sure I put everything out there and don't hide. Your past, you can never run away from," she continues, explaining her reason for writing the book. "I got all these messages and videos from people saying they could relate, that my story helped them, that it was a blessing to know they weren't the only ones who suffered."

The book's bleak spots don't end there: there's tales of being homeless as Haddish attempted to get her career in comedy off the ground. There are accounts of alleged domestic abuse at the hands

of an ex-husband who she married, divorced and married again. It's remarkable that her comic style is so joyous and upbeat, given the darker sides of humanity that she's been a witness to, I tell her. "You gotta use suffering like fertiliser. You gotta let something grow from it," she replies, sighing. "Any time someone disappoints me, it reminds me I'm not here on this planet to be dependent on other people and their actions. I'm here to do a job that God bestowed upon me. And that job is to bring joy." Haddish looks at it all with a Zen philosophy: if there weren't toxic people in this world, there would be less need for comedy to provide an escape from the storm clouds. She'd be out of a job.

It was at an early age that Haddish learned how laughter could be a tool this way. When she was little, she recalls watching the movie Who Framed Roger Rabbit. One scene in particular stood out, when Bob Hoskins' cranky private eye Eddie Valiant asks the riotous cartoon bunny why everyone is so nice to him. "A laugh can be a very powerful thing. Why, sometimes in life, it's the only weapon we have," Roger replies, lighting a fuse in the young Californian. "I learned from Roger Rabbit that being funny could help me [get other >

people to] do my homework. It could help me keep the bullies back," she says. It even helped her soothe the violent tantrums of her traumatised mother. "Now that I'm much older, I can see that laughter also heals," she says, adding that there's something beautiful about how, decades after a movie about a detective set her on her path towards comedy, she's now playing one in *The* Afterparty. "It's like picking a plum off a plum tree

at the right time, when it's all juicy and mwah! I just love it."

Don't expect the 43-year-old to stick to playing Sherlock-esque investigators forever, though. There's a whole host of different parts Haddish hopes to take on as her new era as a leading lady begins in earnest - action star included. "If I could get 75% of what Tom Cruise gets paid, I'm jumping outta all the planes. Want to throw me off the Empire State Building? If someone promises to take care of my animals [if a stunt goes wrong,] then let's do it. Want me to eat snakes and wrestle rhinos? I'm there!" Haddish, it's worth adding, is currently building the physique of an international super spy. Every morning of late, she's gone to the beach to do callisthenics as part of an exhaustive exercise regime ahead of her starring role in a biopic about pioneering American athlete Florence Griffith Joyner.

That part promises to showcase more of Haddish's dramatic flair and is the kind of left turn we should expect more, she says, as her empire continues to build. The more milestone parts she gets, the more grateful she becomes that



Haddish now is not just a leading light in Hollywood, but a leading light in her community - for the past few years, she's been working towards opening a Black-owned grocery store in South Central Los Angeles that will empower the entire neighbourhood.



And that's what drives Tiffany Haddish on - why, she says, in the upcoming weeks, months and years, she wants to work harder than ever to make this empire happen. 





Sankhala is certain I'll see a tiger. He tells me this as we bump along the dirt roads of Bandhavgarh National Park, India's tiger country - 1,540km² of swaying grassland and tropical forest where the mighty Bengal tiger roams freely. As we drive past gaggles of langur monkeys and slender sal trees scarred with claw marks, I'm getting increasingly desperate. So far on our safari, we've spotted twerking peacocks, a plodding elephant and a herd of snuffling wild boar, but India's most famous cat has eluded us.

Amit isn't stressed, though. "Don't worry," he says, adjusting his Ray-Bans and stretching across the back seat of the open-top Jeep. "You'll get your tiger."

If anyone can promise this, it's him. Amit is a third-generation conservationist - his grandfather, legendary tiger-whisperer Kailash Sankhala, helped shape Project Tiger, a landmark conservation project that's credited with bringing India's Bengal tigers back from the brink of extinction. Now, 50 years after the project began, Amit tells me tiger numbers are flourishing across the country.





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But it's been a long road to get here. It all started in the 1950s, during Kailash's tenure at India's Forest Service, where he issued hunting permits. At the time, shooting tigers was a common blood sport and Kailash's friend goaded him to pick up a rifle.




"He'd never killed a tiger," Amit tells me as we pass a grazing herd of sambar deer. "And when he finally did, he was traumatised."

After that watershed moment, Kailash decided to dedicate his life to protecting India's tigers. What followed was an illustrious career in conservation that was filled with hard-won achievements - like when, in 1969, he convinced Prime Minister Indira Gandhi to ban tiger hunting. After Kailash conducted India's first tiger census and discovered there were only 1,827 tigers left in the country, Gandhi launched Project Tiger and appointed him director. Kailash relocated entire villages to create tiger reserves - a drastic approach that paved the way for the tigers to make their comeback.

"His attitude was different to mine, but the challenges were different," says Amit. "You had to move human-animal conflicts out of places rather than incentivising locals to stay."

After Kailash saved tigers by segregating them from humans, Pradeep - Amit's father, who also

grew up to be a conservationist - had the task of bringing them back together. So, in an effort to reconcile tourism and animal conservation, he opened Kanha Jungle Lodge, India's first eco-lodge, in 1989. The lodge I'm staying at, Bandhavgarh Jungle Lodge, with its cosy brick villas scattered across a jungle clearing, was opened by Pradeep in 1992. Amit recalls childhood holidays here, when he'd explore the park from atop an elephant - which dropped him back at the lodge afterwards.


But today it's a Jeep, not an elephant that returns me to the lodge after a long day without any tiger sightings. I'm dusty and disappointed - but luckily I'll be heading out again at the crack of dawn, my final chance to catch those elusive cats before I head back to Mumbai. I'm comforted by Amit's optimistic

words as I discuss the day's sightings with other quests, surrounded by Sankhala family artefacts like Kailash's beloved binoculars. On a table nearby, we're watched over by a photo of Kailash embracing Jim, a tiger who once lived in his home.

I think about the three-hour journey I took to get here from Jabalpur, the local airport - an epic drive that winds through forested valleys and farming villages shaded by mahua trees. It calls to mind something Amit told me earlier that day. "My father's greatest achievement was creating a sustainable tourism industry in remote places," he said. "Back then, getting here from Delhi involved a 19-hour train ride."

The lodges not only provided locals with employment, but reignited Indians' deep-rooted

Jim Corbett National Park



love of the natural world. "In India, we've always loved our wildlife," Amit told me. "Today, in Bandhavgarh, 90% of visitors are Indians." Their continued presence is a boon for the tiger population – proceeds from lodges help fund Tiger Trust, a conservation-focused NGO founded by Kailash (Amit is a trustee).

Like his father, Amit believes passionately in involving the public in conservation. He's helped launch several community-centric initiatives through

Tiger Trust – including a programme that trains former poachers as park rangers. Tiger Trust also engages communities living near national parks, either through educational activities or by offering employment. His personal mantra hints at his holistic approach: "Save the tiger and you'll save everything around it."

Thanks in large part to the Sankhalas, it's locals' voices that are loudest in India – an unusual dynamic in the world of conservation. "Some 90% of Africans haven't been on safari," he tells me. "When they're building a highway through the Serengeti, who's shouting the loudest? Tourists and a bunch of conservationists."

This symbiosis between the Indian government and its people means that India has become a conservation leader. "Almost all the wildlife which existed in India centuries ago still exists," says Amit. "No other country can say that. Yes, there's conflict, but the tigers, sloth bears, snow leopards and elephants? They're still here."

Roaming around
Bandhavgarh, you can see
the impact Amit, Pradeep
and Kailash have had on the
locals. The three men have
all encouraged people to
really listen to the natural
world; today, guides in the
park rely on instinct, not

crackling radios, to find wildlife, and there are no guns. They also hand over phones on entry, which minimises the risk of high-speed dashes to see kills relayed by colleagues.

My safari guide, Sumit, was armed only with a book listing Bandhavgarh's bird species. Without the help of a radio, he frequently asked our driver to stop so he could listen for alarm calls from animals – the most reliable of which came from barking deer, apparently – or examine animal tracks.

As for Amit's promise of a tiger? Well, the next morning, we pile into the Jeep again. Within a few hours, we've racked up sightings of wild boar, mongoose, eagles and plum-headed parakeets, but still no tiger. Then, as our Jeep bounces through a forested area, Amit notices tracks pressed into the red dirt. "There's a tiger ahead," he announces, in the way a passenger in a car might casually warn the driver about a rabbit in the road. And then it happens. We turn a corner to see a tiger plodding slowly down the dusty track. Occasionally he pauses to sniff a tree trunk, curling his lips and exposing fearsome teeth as he inhales scent marks left by other tigers. For several minutes we follow the cat slowly, halting the Jeep when he pauses. He's huge, but his fur's markings, a tiger's equivalent of a human fingerprint, are even more impressive - a beautiful tapestry of dark stripes, swirls and spots.

When he eventually lumbers into the thick forest, I say a silent thank you to the big cat for gracing us with his presence. Then a thought occurs: if this tiger could talk, he'd probably have a few words of thanks for Amit, too.





Leading conductor Alice Farnham gives Vera her notes on the hit new Cate Blanchett movie, Tár



IN THE FILM Tár, Cate Blanchett plays Lydia Tár, a fictional conductor, who also happens to be a bit of a monster. I'm a conductor, but I don't behave like her. I don't like being called Maestro. I don't know many conductors who do, for that

matter. Although a male conductor once told me, "Women can't conduct because their breasts get in the way." That's why for the past 10 years I've been encouraging more women into conducting. There's no shortage of female musicians, after all.

Tár presents conductors as these all-powerful figures on the podium. In reality, that power is an illusion. Conductors don't make a sound. The orchestra is everything - a group of extraordinarily talented individuals, each as well-trained in their

discipline as a doctor or world-class athlete. But they need direction. They could play without me, but it wouldn't be as thrilling. Conductors are a bit like salespeople or cheerleaders: their job is to get us invested, to make us care about the music.

And what music. Mahler's Fifth Symphony, around which Tár revolves, is all drama and romance. I was a trumpeter in my youth and remember inhabiting its opening passages around the time I first fell in love.

Does the movie do a good job of representing my world? Well, I've never punched anybody at the podium. Yet. Cate did her homework incidentally, she skipped Tár's premiere, after the red carpet, to come to my book launch - but the film is fiction, so you don't need to be in the music world to enjoy it. I love courtroom drama without being a lawyer or a murderer. And, for the record, we don't have any female conductors employed at Lydia Tár's world-class level. Yet.



FIVE REASONS... AVENUE 5 IS OUT-OF-

Sci-fi comedy is a notoriously tricky genre to pull off, but this brilliant Armando Iannucci satire is a blast. Andy Hill explores why

The cast is stellar In the near future, a luxury interplanetary cruise liner gets into trouble, turning an eight-week jolly into a multi-year existential nightmare. The raw incompetence of those supposedly in charge - Hugh Laurie as phoney captain Ryan Clark, Josh Gad (Frozen's Olaf) as juvenile billionaire tech bro Herman Judd - set the scene for the ultimate high farce.

It's actually funny As you'd expect from writer Armando lannucci (Veep, The Thick of It, Alan Partridge) the banger lines come thick and fast, from the note-perfect corporate hogwash of Judd "fracking merchandise ideas" to everybody's mounting frustration at their grim near-term prospects "breathing recycled farts". A neat running gag centres around elderly astronaut Spike Martin (born 1996), whose claim to fame is being the first Canadian to walk on Mars.

It's stylish AF HBO didn't scrimp on budget and the future - terrifying premise aside - looks great, all glossy wearable tech and hologram phones. The set will no doubt remind viewers of mid-period Star Trek,

but in truth Avenue 5 is closer in tone to the 90s reboot of Babylon 5. The costumes are on point too, especially the hairstyles - shout out to brittle Mission Control lead Ray Mulcair (Nikki Amuka-Bird) and her gorgeous gravity-defying barnet.

It holds a mirror up to us The best science fiction reflects the foibles of contemporary society back at us. As such, Avenue 5's chief targets are buccaneering tech CEOs riding roughshod over people, the shallow gloss of public relations and the emptiness of the content industry. Customer service culture also gets a kicking, not least from an implacable woman named Karen (Rebecca Front).

It has a message Mild spoiler, but there's an eerily familiar scene where guests decide to flat-out deny reality, with grisly consequences. Back on Earth

- where a scripted reality show about the stricken spaceship is swiftly commissioned and aired - there's a critical lithium shortage. And the food chain is screwed. even as guests onboard fret about the dwindling condiment



supply.




