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HERE'S A HOLLYWOOD TREND

that's hitting all the right notes with film fans right now: movie adaptations of musicals that began life as movies. And, frankly, it's a trend worth making a song and dance about. For decades now, Broadway has been the Sandy to cinema's Danny Zuko: two media that go together like rama lama lama ka dinga da dinga dong, to quote Grease. From West Side Story and The Sound of Music to Chicago and Mamma Mia!, movie execs have been taking theatre smashes and putting them on the big screen since 1927's The Jazz Singer, the first major movie to feature sound. In return, the boards of Broadway and London's West End have welcomed plenty of movies turned into stage musicals. La La Land. The Lion King. Little Shop of Horrors, Hairspray, Back to the Future, Elf ... the list is longer than

the queue for the ladies' rooms in the intermission at *Hamilton*.

Recently, though, something strange has been happening. Hollywood has been greenlighting cinematic remakes of those movies-turned-musicals. Late last year saw the premiere of The Color Purple, a big-screen version of the Broadway hit based on Steven Spielberg's powerful film drama from 1985. January saw the release of a big-screen adaptation of the musical based on Mean Girls, the iconic teen comedy. And later this year Wicked will hit cinemas - an Ariana Grande-starring spectacle based on the hit stage show, which itself was a spin on one of the best-loved movies of all-time: 1939's The Wizard of Oz.

More are surely on the way. If you were a studio

exec looking for nailed-on hits, why wouldn't you greenlight a movie based on the musical version of Mrs Doubtfire, or Groundhog Day, or even the Tonynominated

Legally Blonde? These remakes offer studios a chance to exhume familiar IP – movie titles that everyone knows and loves – without being accused of cynically cashing in with a straightforward remake. They're different enough to allow audiences to experience a story they love anew (without having to shell out for expensive theatre tickets) – and for theatre lovers, they can experience the stage shows they adored again, now with big-budget movie magic bringing them to life in new and exciting ways.

It used to be that movies sometimes became musicals, and musicals sometimes became movies, and that was the end of that. Now we're in an era of movies based on musicals based on movies. As a girl named Dorothy once told her dog Toto: truly, we're not in Kansas anymore.

Rising star //

Comic **SHERRY COLA** blazed into the mainstream with her hilariously raunchy turn in *Joy Ride* – now she's vowed to keep surprising audiences in her standup and onscreen

named. This is, after all, a performer whose wide-eyed brand of humour fizzes with sugar-rush naughtiness, as fans of 2023 cult comedy smash *Joy Ride* are quick to point out. That film, about four Asian American women journeying through Asia on a mission to understand their heritage, saw the 34-year-old play Lolo, an eccentric slacker who makes sexually explicit art and is all about, in her own words, "inspiring chaos".

The similarities between the Shanghai-born comic and her carbonated beverage namesake don't end there, however. Cola's also refreshing – a one-woman laugh riot who's bottled a brand-new flavour when it comes to Asian representation in Hollywood. Talking to *Vera* from her Los Angeles home, the 34-yearold explains why, whether performing as a stand-up or wowing audiences in TV comedies like *Good Trouble* and indies like *Shortcomings*, she won't stop till she's challenged every stereotype and broken every taboo.

What do you think it is about *Joy Ride* that has connected with audiences so emphatically?



Joy Ride was the first of its kind – you'd never seen a film like this on the big screen: R-rated, Asian faces, so much humour, so much heart, where we were reclaiming our identity. Because for so long [Asian Americans] have been defined through other people's lenses. We've been the punchlines to other people's jokes. This time, it was like, "We'll take it from here!" But I do also think it's such a human story at the end of the day. I think it has cultural specifics, but also a story full of themes that can make anyone feel seen, that anyone can relate to.

You described your *Joy Ride* character as "the most authentic version of myself I've ever played". Where did you end and Lolo begin?

Lolo is just so unapologetically in your face and yet has these insecurities. That's a reflection of the real me that I've never been able to unleash in my craft before. Also, Lolo's parents run a restaurant and my parents have had a restaurant since I was in fifth grade, so that part was very aligned.

What does your success mean to your parents? They must be proud of the barriers you're breaking for your community.

Oh God, yes! My mom keeps telling me to get her more and more *Joy Ride* DVDs so she can give them out to her friends, because for her this is all just ungraspable – not just that it's me up there on billboards, but the fact that Asian storytellers now get to live out our truths and tell the sorts of stories that her generation weren't able to tell. I don't take that lightly – it's really special.

When did you first realise you loved to make people laugh?

I was always acting up when my dad would make home videos. And I was always, always the class clown. On my report cards, it said I was constantly yapping away, surprising a lot of my classmates with the things that came out of my mouth, because it was so unexpected. Society was so used to Asian women being submissive, because that was a definition that they put on us. I always wanted to shatter that stereotype from a young age.

Were there particular entertainers you looked up to, who showed you how to shatter stereotypes through comedy?

Well, when I was a teenager, I felt this need to be on stage, but the idea of actually trying to become [a performer] felt like such a huge



gamble. Lucy Liu existed. Jackie Chan existed. Margaret Cho existed. But there were only a handful of Asian faces on screen signalling that we belonged up there. Which made me hang onto trailblazers like Michelle Yeoh and Sandra Oh even tighter. The big one, though, was Margaret Cho. I remember watching her and thinking, "Wow, everything that comes out of her mouth is provocative. It's unexpected. It's dirty. It's fun - and it's so loud." I was inspired by her to live in a way I want to - the loudest girl in the room - because I want to prove society wrong.

What's the next step in that mission to prove society wrong, after *Joy Ride* introduced even more people to your work?

You know, I would love to do the superhero thing! Or actually, the supervillain thing. Marvel, I'm ready! Call me! To be in the Marvel Cinematic Universe is such a goal, because it plays globally in a way that's unmatched. I've actually got a vision board with people I wanted to work with: Ali Wong, Jordan Peele and Michelle Yeoh, of course. There are options in front of me. I'm writing and developing my own TV show. The future's unwritten. But I know that the sky's the limit and I'm ready.

But look closer: there's a chandelier made up of tiny glass fruits, coat hooks designed as ornate swans, tiger-striped rugs. And with in-house dining from James Beard Award-winning Andrew Carmellini, plus a clandestine wood-panelled drinking den in the form of the Portrait Bar. it's sure to become a high-society hotspot. Cheers to weird.

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

► IN 1970S JAMAICA, SOMETHING BIG WAS

happening. Massive sound systems rumbled through the districts, manned by deejays like Jah Stitch and Risto Benji. They were playing sounds – rooted in reggae, but with faster rhythms made to soundtrack sweaty dances – that were new to the country and to the world. They called it dancehall.

Dancehall: The Rise of Dancehall Culture takes readers there: to the start of a whole new music genre and culture. Featuring the photography of Beth Lesser – who travelled frequently between Canada and Jamaica in the 80s to document the rise of dancehall – its reissued edition also features a new introduction from British-Nigerian fashion designer Duro Olowu. Lesser's subjects come into sharper focus – those MCs and DJs who were evolving dancehall's early sounds and making an indelible mark on music history. Lesser remembers her first encounters with dancehall. She had travelled from Toronto to Kingston with her husband, thinking they would photograph "artists in dreadlocks playing serious, heavy dub music and chanting down Babylon". Instead, they found that people were collecting cassettes of local dancehall sessions. "The cassette scene was huge!" she says. "Sound systems would play through the night, and the next day, 60- and 90-minute cassettes of the dance would be sold and traded in the streets and in record shops. A DJ could become a star without ever selling a record."

Soon she found local sound systems and was introduced to the new music they were playing. "Music pour[ed] out of stores, restaurants, buses, taxis. People heard music from dawn to dawn the next day. [It] was woven into every aspect of Jamaican life."

Not many ventured into these areas with a camera at the time, which gave Lesser unique access to dancehall's early innovators – who, for the first time, properly included women, previously relegated to performing ballads and romantic songs. "They were busting out all over the dancehall scene as DJs, competing directly with the men, performing in sound system clashes," says Lesser.

CLAM ROCK IN SAN FRANCISCO

Sea urchin orecchiette with razor clam and habanada at newly reopened **QUINCE** is a mind-altering mouthful

► GIVEN THAT QUINCE,

the three-Michelin star San Fran spot by chef Michael Tusk, recently celebrated its 20th birthday, you'd be forgiven for thinking. "If it ain't broke - don't fix it." But genius doesn't work that way. Say hello to Quince 2.0 in a newly renovated Jackson Square space, with Mid-Century dining tables. low lighting. and snuggle-friendly sofa seating under a pretty pastoral mural by artist Galatée Martin. The menu is all new, too - plump for the modest four-course supper, or the more pricev 10-course feast with ultra-seasonal, ultra-local northern Californian produce, much of it from Quince's own dedicated farm a short drive upstate. Highlights? Squab pigeon, from legendary Bay Area

birdman Philip Paine. Pitch-perfect wine pairings in elegant designer stemware. And this here sea urchin orecchiette – orecchiette are "little ear"-shaped pasta – with pleasingly piquant habanada and juicy Californian razor clams. Worth shelling out for.

Pizza is hitting the sauce izza flavoured cocktails – it's one way to make a crust. And smart drinking dens everywhere are hopping on the cheesy bandwagon. From the humble Cold Pizza at Double Chicken Please in NYC, with Don Fulano blanco tequila, basil and parmigiano reggiano, to Vegas's high-spirited Pizza

Party at Superfrico (right), with tomato water-infused sweet vermouth and Castelvetrano olives. For an intriguingly accented slice of this mad trend, order an I Say Tomato at Cahoots in London. It has Grey Goose, Quiquiriqui mezcal, fresh lime, spicy San Marzano tomato sauce and Cynar artichoke liqueur. Top that.

MIAMI'S GREAT OUTDOORS

The Florida city may be known for its glitzy nightlife, but it also offers plenty of wholesome al fresco activities for those that way inclined, says local writer Jessica Poitevien



> SOON AFTER ITS 1896 FOUNDING, MIAMI

was nicknamed Magic City as part of a ploy to attract new residents to this humid destination. Today, that magic is real and lives partially in Miami's twinkling skyline (the third tallest in the US), glamorous beaches, Michelin-starred restaurants and raucous, up-all-night bars and clubs.

But there's also magic to be found in the natural beauty that's easily accessible within and around the city. National parks, twisty cycling paths and alligator-filled marshes are just the beginning. For those who know where to look, Miami is teeming with outdoor adventure.

If you've opted for the classic South Florida experience with a hotel stay on the beach, start your open-air explorations with a stroll along the **MIAMI BEACH BOARDWALK**. You can clock in about llkm by foot, bike or skates with beach views on one side and glimpses of the neighbourhood's Art Deco architecture on the other.

Or, if you have access to a car, venture down the

scenic AlA route to **JUNGLE ISLAND**, a lush tropical theme park known for its wildlife encounters that allow guests to interact with wallabies, sloths, lemurs and more. For a bird's-eye-view of Jungle Island – and a major adrenaline rush – strap into the aerial obstacle course at **TREETOP TREKKING MIAMI**. You'll climb ropes, balance on wobbly bridges and whoosh along ziplines, all with a view of Miami's skyline peeking behind the tree canopy.

At nearby **HISTORIC VIRGINIA KEY BEACH PARK**, you can mix history with the great outdoors. Guided tours

tell the story of this barrier island, once the only beach to officially welcome non-white residents during the South's era of segregation. Experienced cyclists who don't mind a roadside bike path can venture to Virginia Key via the **RICKENBACKER TRAIL** and continue south to other popular parks.

Branching out of the city, head north to **OLETA RIVER STATE PARK**, Florida's largest urban park. Rent a kayak or family-friendly canoe and paddle through the mangrove forest and Intracoastal Waterway. Along the way, try spotting hermit crabs, herons and the occasional dolphin before docking on the beach for a swim. Protected by barrier islands, the waves at Oleta are calm and perfect for families.

To experience Miami's truly wild side, head about an hour west of the city to the Shark Valley entrance of **EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK**. Hike, bike, or take the tram on a 24km loop road with a high concentration of wildlife, including alligators, turtles and egrets. At the end, you'll reach an observation tower with 360° views. Left: Everglades National Park is the largest subtropical wilderness in the USA





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RED HOT

Leaving the park, be sure to stop by the **MICCOSUKEE INDIAN VILLAGE** to learn about the customs of the tribe that has inhabited this region for centuries. Tribe members also lead airboat tours for a fast-paced. immersive jaunt into the Everglades' unique environment - gator sightings practically guaranteed.

Continue your explorations by moving south of the city and slowing down at FAIRCHILD TROPICAL BOTANIC GARDEN. This peaceful 34-hectare oasis showcases more than 3.000 species of native and exotic plants, as well as butterflies. Plan your visit around the garden's calendar to catch live music, guided bird walks and more.

Keep this relaxed pace going as you drive deep into South Dade, sometimes

referred to as Miami's countryside thanks to the abundance of farmland and fruit stands. KNAUS **BERRY FARM** is the stuff of local lore, opening seasonally (till mid-April, usually) to offer pickyour-own strawberries and tomatoes.

South Dade is also the gateway to BISCAYNE NATIONAL PARK. The site is 95% covered by water and dotted with multiple islands, so be ready to get wet. Scuba divers flock here for the shipwrecks along the Maritime Heritage Trail, but guided tours combining multiple activities are arguably the best way to explore. Snorkel above the Florida Reef; paddle through a lagoon where you might spot juvenile sharks, stingrays and turtles; or go fishing on a remote island. With so much to see and do in its great outdoors, Miami will have you hooked.

Will we ever grow babies in pods?

How soon till we can all share the load of pregnancy, just like the couple at the heart of new sci-fi rom com *The Pod Generation*? asks Ralph Jones

A LOT OF PEOPLE WILL TELL YOU THAT

pregnancy can be a bit of a drag. Spending nine months with a babe stretching your belly to its limit is, when you think about it, A Little Bit Strange. But what if we could, in the words of Samwise Gamgee, share the load?

In *The Pod Generation*, a near future is imagined in which "carrying" a baby is taken literally, and a couple (Emilia Clarke and Chiwetel Ejiofor) are one of many who share their pregnancy by having their baby gestate in an external egg-shaped pod. Conversations about gender and pregnancy are obviously evolving, but one of the inescapable realities of pregnancy in 2024 is that it happens inside the body. The million-dollar question is: does it have to?

We already succeed at keeping alive babies outside the womb, says Ian Henderson, clinical research fellow at the National Perinatal Epidemiology Unit. We are familiar with this: although premature birth is the leading cause of death in newborn babies, if a baby is born early, it can have its needs met in an incubator. Similarly, conception need not happen inside the human body, thanks to IVF. But the gulf in between conception and birth – that's the land of ectogenesis, ie the growth of an organism in an artificial environment.

Currently it is illegal to grow human embryos outside the womb for longer than 14 days. This legislation would of course need to be overhauled in order for full ectogenesis to occur. But Henderson points out there has been plenty of research.



Pig and sheep foetuses have been developed for several weeks in what was attractively called a Biobag, designed by researchers at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.

If full ectogenesis becomes achievable in animals, it will only be a matter of time before it is possible in humans. It's some way off at the moment but it may not be a long way off. "Some people think it will be sooner than later," Henderson says.

And if ectogenesis is realistic, it could radically change our perceptions of parenting, making the responsibility more equal – in theory. Vincent Straub, a researcher at Oxford Population Health, points out that there is nothing that says a pregnancy

has to occur within a female body. "We know by now that womanhood and pregnancy are not really the same thing," he says. "They're obviously very related but I think it's important to separate them and focus on the importance of parenthood."

Although, as Henderson says, there are numerous complicated adaptations that happen in the body during pregnancy, any environment can be recreated. The

psychological hurdles will be as significant as the technical ones. While some people might consider pod babies dystopian, most developments in this field are met with alarm at first. IVF was one – but it has made millions of people happy. Will ectogenesis do the same? We'll have to see.

VERDICT: Yes – very probably.

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

uPaul is done pandering to others. Calling from Washington, DC – where he's midway through a US book tour to promote his new autobiography, *The House of Hidden Meanings* – he tells me that he's spent his life tamping himself down to make those around him more comfortable. No more. "So often, someone in my position – an outsider – will try to make people feel non-threatened," he muses. "Well, [writing this book] was a way to say, 'Okay, do you know what? Let's move that out of the way and just get real and raw and honest.' A lot of what I've done in my career is try to put people at ease. Through a lot of hard work and deep soul-searching, I've earned the right to just be myself."

By "myself", RuPaul isn't referring to the person he is without the drag, rather the person behind the very public persona. "I've always been an introvert masquerading as an extrovert," he explains. "I learned how to behave in an outwardly way – to be on television and talk – but to be able to do that, I hold certain things close to my heart."

The extrovert everybody knows is the world's most famous drag queen, a 63-year-old icon behind one of the most successful competition reality shows of all time, *RuPaul's Drag Race* (now in its 16th season and franchised in numerous territories). Initially finding fame with his 1992 debut single *Supermodel (You Better Work)*, RuPaul was the first drag queen to land a major cosmetics campaign, with MAC in 1994, and has gone on to release multiple records, as well as star in a variety of TV shows and films over the next 30 years.

What RuPaul, the recipient of 14 Primetime Emmy Awards, has achieved – helping to bring a marginalised art form into the cultural conversation – cannot be overstated. *Drag Race*, in which contestants compete over everything from costume design to stand-up, has proved to be a lifeline not only for competitors – many of whom are people of colour as well as queer – but for its young audience too. Apart from helping people feel seen, it has also changed the popular lexicon: words like "fierce" or "shade" – which originally came from drag ball culture – wouldn't be in our daily vocabulary if *Drag Race* hadn't helped popularise them.

So it's a surprise to me that, despite the monstrous success of *Drag Race*, RuPaul tells me he still doesn't think drag has fully penetrated the mainstream. "It's still a revolutionary idea," he says. "People can go, 'Oh, hey! Work it girl!' But to grasp the depth of what [drag] actually means – I don't think that's possible. That would mean a major awakening of our culture. And, if you've read the newspaper, that's not happening!"

He has a philosophical, almost metaphysical view of drag's power. "Drag [helps] people understand that the illusion we call reality is very fragile and very thin. People are invested in these roles that we take on and people will get angry at you if you break the fourth wall."

When RuPaul was coming up in the punk drag scenes of Atlanta and New York, he was committed to breaking that fourth wall and jolting audiences with his confrontational performance style – in one of his earliest shows, for example, he played a slave on a plantation. Mainstream success meant that his more avant-garde tendencies needed to be neutered. The RuPaul we all know is a boundlessly positive,



if slightly unknowable, figure - an avuncular "mama Ru" to the young queens on Drag Race. But in The House of Hidden Meanings he gets into the grit and the glory of his personal history from his tumultuous childhood in San Diego through coming to terms with his sexuality as a teenager, to finding sobriety and true love. Given he has already published three - albeit fluffier - autobiographical books, Lettin' It All Hang Out (1995), Workin' It! RuPaul's Guide to Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of *Style* (2010) and *GuRu* (2018), why is he so keen to tell this version of his story now?

"It's an important time in history to get real," he says. "In this country, we're seemingly on the verge of going into a fascist state." He thinks that, in the face of a hardening reality, younger folk need to harden up too. "There are a lot of young people who watch our television show and a lot of young people who have been coddled in ways that bear no relation to the life they're going to live. So my story is the hard knocks. I felt it was important to give them an honest portrayal of what navigating your own unique story and path really looks like."

So it's tough love for the generation to whom RuPaul is very much a leading light. And there's plenty more where that came from. "Unfortunately there is so much focus on the world hurting your feelings, that I don't think young people have enough fun today, honestly," he sighs.

"There is this focus on purity and moral superiority; making sure that other people treat them correctly. When I was growing up, I didn't put that on other people. My friends and I knew Clockwise from centre: Performing with Elton John in 1994; as Foxy Brown in 1990; with Lady Gaga on Drag Race in 2007; at this year's Emmy's: striking a pose; launching his doll in 2005; the panel of Drag Race UK; performing at a gay rights parade in 1993; photographed in 1979; Club Kids Ru in 1987; with Nirvana at the MTV awards in 1993 there was darkness in the world and we knew there were people who were very ignorant."

He tells me he's always lived by the principles of Hanlon's razor – a philosophical adage that states "it's more likely people will do something out of a lack of awareness than out of an intentional desire to cause harm," he says, reading the definition off his laptop screen. "The point of all of this is – there are a lot of things in the world that could make you feel a certain way but I didn't let that stop me. I didn't put a lot of focus on it. And it allowed me to freely move throughout my life."

RUOLINGO

A GUIDE TO THE MOST SICKENING* TERMS POPULARISED ON DRAG RACE

Charisma, uniqueness, nerve and talent [noun]: The four qualities that RuPaul's next drag superstar must possess. The acronym is implied but – crucially – is never said out loud.

Tea

[noun]: Gossip, preferably of the salty variety. When tea is shared freely, it is said to be "spilled". And when a queen says "no tea, no shade", she means that she is speaking without disrespect.

Sashay away

[verb]! RuPaul's command to the queen who is about to take one last strut down the runway.

Good Judy

[noun]: A trusted friend, named in honour of gay icon Judy Garland.

*Sickening

[adjective]: A lofty compliment only given to something or someone truly flawless.

Beat

[verb]: To blend one's make-up. A queen can be "beat to the gods".

Shade

[noun]: A cutting insult, spoken either to a queen's face or behind her back. Shade is always "thrown" - ie dispatched and a consistently rude queen is branded "shady".



Not that life has been easy. RuPaul speaks in a measured, therapised way about his early years – the clear result of many years on the couch, and many "years of sobriety and soul-searching". It was only through the clarity achieved from 12-step programmes (he's been sober since 1999) that RuPaul, who was the third of four children and the only boy, felt able to revisit what he calls "the emotional scene of the crime".

He now understands, for instance, that a significant incident, involving his mother pouring gasoline over his philandering father's car and threatening to light a match, isn't merely a traumatic memory – it was the birth of his "dissociative self" and the catalyst for him anaesthetising himself with drugs and alcohol for the next 30 years. "I've learned through sobriety that vulnerability is power," he explains.

Nowadays, RuPaul's vices are more comestible. After spending a stretch of time in the UK filming the British version of Drag Race, he's discovered the joys of supermarket Sainsbury's (he puts the emphasis on the second syllable, pronouncing it like "berry"). "[They] have this cookie called Border and it's a dark chocolate-covered ginger cookie. I went online in LA and bought a bunch, and had them shipped to my house in LA. They're so good!" And, like most Brits, he's crazy about a certain Portuguese-chicken chain. "This morning, on my walk, I passed what I think is the only Nando's in the US. Here in DC I go to Nando's all the time. They're very kind to me, they gave me a black card which allows me to have Nando's whenever I want at no cost.'

When it's time to burn off the peri peri chicken, RuPaul likes to roller skate. He tells me he always keeps a pair of skates in his trunk and, when the mood hits, he'll find an empty car park to "roller skate around". "It's beautiful," he tells me.

Today, RuPaul and his husband, Georges LeBar, who have been together since meeting in a New York nightclub in 1994, divide their time between a RuPaul and hi husband George LeBar attend RuPaul star ceremony on th Hollywood Walk

house in Los Angeles and a ranch in Wyoming. RuPaul's conversation is peppered with references to his "inner child" (a psychological term for an individual's childlike aspect), "the universe" and gratitude ("Writing a gratitude list will really give you an idea of what your power is") and he practises meditation daily. So far, so LA – but this part of RuPaul has become more than just a lifestyle; it's become his purpose and an extension of his brand.

A fan of self-help books since the 1970s (his favourites are *Toxic Parents* by Dr Susan Forward and *A New Earth* by Eckhart Tolle), he recently co-founded an "all-inclusive" online book store called Allstora. It was

maybe a bit too inclusive – the venture ran up against early controversy when customers spotted several eyebrow-raising books for sale, including several purportedly anti-LGBTQ+ titles (Allstora has since issued an apology and pulled many of these books from the platform). But, having faced controversy before, RuPaul soldiers on sanguinely. "I've always been a seeker and when I was growing up I loved books," he explains. "It really is a lifelong mission of mine to bring that presence, knowledge and experience to people who are seekers. It's pretty brilliant that we're bringing all these books to young people who are looking for those answers."

Maybe RuPaul has more in common with young people than he previously suggested. Certainly, this multihyphenate has the stamina of someone in their twenties. "Retiring is a 20th-century concept. There is no such thing," he says. "I love the fact that my drag career has allowed me to become a writer, a DJ, a TV host, a designer – you name it, I've been able to do it."

Or maybe I spoke too soon. "Here's the thing," he says, when the zeitgeist comes up again. "Generation after generation thinks they invented everything. The ego makes you think you're super unique and no one has ever gone through what you've gone through before. But the truth is, we're the exact same as we've always been – with smartphones." Keeping it real. RuPaul just can't help himself.

THE QUEEN OF DRAG RUPAUL'S OV

BORN

RuPaul Andre Charles was the third of four children born in San Diego to Ernestine "Toni" and Irving Andrew Charles, an electrician, on 17 November 1960.

EDUCATION

RuPaul was a student at Patrick Henry High School in San Diego. When he was 15, he moved to Atlanta to live with his sister, Renetta. and enrolled at the Northside School of Performing Arts. He appeared in drag for the first time onstage in the **Tennessee Williams** play Camino Real.

FUN FACT

Before he was born, a fortune teller told RuPaul's mother that her baby would be famous. Ernestine even introduced him to his aunts with the words, "His name is RuPaul and he's going to be a star."

KEY WORK Supermodel of the World (1993)

RuPaul has released 15 studio albums; his first featured arguably his catchiest song, *Supermodel (You Better Work)*.

RuPaul's Drag Race (2009–)

The search for "America's next drag superstar" now spans 16 seasons, several spin-offs, plus numerous international franchises. The formula – drag queens competing in challenges such as lip-synching – is simple; the result is heartwarming and hilarious.

RuPaul: What's the Tee? (2014)

RuPaul teamed up with his fellow *Drag Race* host Michelle Visage for a comedy podcast which also served as the behind-thescenes scoop on the hugely popular reality show. Celebrity guests included Lady Gaga and Marc Jacobs.

Mumbai's Parsi cafés – set up by Zoroastrian refugees in the 19th century – are windows onto the city's past. Today, there are only a handful left. Tamara Hinson meets the local people safeguarding these beloved establishments



IT'S A SWELTERING DAY IN MUMBAI.

Leaden celling fans, struggling to stir the sticky air, flutter the Union Jack flag hanging on the wall behind me. To my right, an elderly tuk-tuk driver sips his drink - an electric-pink raspberry soda. The morning rush is well underway and moments after he takes a bite of his bun maska - a bread roll slathered with butter - a Ray-Ban-sporting businessman asks if he can share the driver's rickety wooden table. A bow-tied waiter delivers the businessman's order - a jam puff served on a pastel-pink plate - and after a hurried meal over small talk with the tuk-tuk driver, he scoops up his Gucci briefcase from the dusty floor and dashes out the door.

I'm seated in Britannia & Co, the city's oldest Parsi café. Most of these Mumbai institutions were founded in the early 1900s by Parsis - descendants of Zoroastrians who arrived in India after fleeing religious persecution in Muslim-majority Iran in the eighth and ninth centuries. Regarded as excellent bakers and restaurateurs, they provided fellow immigrants with a taste of home and introduced Mumbaikars to dishes that quickly became staples of their diet. In the 1960s there were hundreds of Parsi cafés dotting the streets of Mumbai - but now there are only a handful and they are dwindling still.

Britannia & Co's current owner is Afshin Kohinoor. His grandfather started the business in 1923; now the 72-year-old spends most of his time presiding over Opening pages: Britannia & Co, Mumbai's oldest Parsi café

his kingdom from a raised counter near the entrance. Earlier, I'd deigned to ask which dish he recommends. He responds by pointing to the "Do not disturb" sign at his elbow. Thankfully a woman sitting nearby comes to my rescue. "Try the berry pulao," she suggests. "It's a ricebased dish common in Iran, but it wasn't popular here until my grandmother added it to the menu. It's made with Iranian cranberries.'



This is Diana, Afshin's daughter. She's next in line to take over Britannia & Co – a rare female boss in the male-dominated world of Parsi cafés, and a rare third-generation café owner. One of the main reasons for the slow disappearance of Parsi cafés is that their young scions are reluctant to take over the family business, instead choosing to pursue university courses and other careers. But Diana felt an irresistible call to her father's trade. "This is my second home. I feel very sentimental about it. Our customers come here to experience a slower pace of life and for the reminders of a different time."

For any Parsi café owner, keeping their family businesses relevant while retaining their timeless lures – a homely, welcoming vibe and cheap homecooked food – is a tall



task. The low price point means profit margins are slim, so they need to rely on volume to keep afloat. But the food is so delicious, and so unlike anything else you'll find in Mumbai, that it keeps people coming back in droves. The most popular items are baked goods like the tuk-tuk driver's piping bun maska and curry biscuits made with cinnamon and semolina, as well as a cardamom custard pudding that riffs on the creamy dessert brought over by the British. Other staples of Parsi cafés include peeling walls, antique



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grandfather clocks and ornate Iranian floor tiles.

At nearby Kyani & Co, a café close to Mumbai's UNESCO-listed Chhatrapati Shivaji Terminus train station, I meet Farokh Shokri. A Mumbai-born Zoroastrian whose parents were born

in Iran, Shokri admits that running a Parsi café is hard work, but he wouldn't have it any other way. Whether it's the wood-panelled walls or faded photos of Iran, little has changed since it was founded in 1904 (Farokh's family took over in 1959). "All of the furniture is original," he says, proudly. "Take the chairs - they're teak and don't break easily. And when they do, we call the carpenter."



Customers like all the creaks and cracks – any swanky refurb could actually hurt business. "The cafés have this huge sense of nostalgia," I'm told by a Mumbai-born businesswoman I meet at B Merwan & Co, another Parsi café outside Grant Road Station. She lives in Florida now, but always stops by to

Another Parsi café shibboleth? The strict rules that govern customers' behaviour, which have become a cherished part of the Parsi café experience. At Britannia & Co, the framed rules remind customers that banned behaviours include – alongside spitting, fighting and bringing in beef – phone use and talking to cashiers. Farokh, who enforces similar rules at Kyani & Co, explains that a ban on laptop and phones not only allows customers to retreat from the outside world, it also keeps the till chiming. "We've got to make a profit, but rely on turnover, not price increases." Customers dawdling over spreadsheets

simply wouldn't work, especially when the average bun maska served in a Parsi café costs around 24 rupees (23p). "Prices are low because we want as many people as possible to experience Parsi culture – rich, poor, Zoroastrian and non-Zoroastrian. Everyone's welcome."

His inclusive attitude is shared by Mumbai-born Zyros Zend, co-owner of

Yazdani Bakery, tucked into a dilapidated, powder-blue heritage building in South Mumbai. It's easy to miss the faded sign bearing the bakery's name hangs lopsidedly beneath a dust-caked semicircle of stained glass typical of Mumbai's neglected Art Deco buildings. Yazdani was founded by Zyros's Iran-born grandfather and it's his second home. "I'd come here after school and eat cake dough and nothing has changed - although we now have a fridge." The small café is temporarily closed, but queues still regularly snake down the street (bestsellers include Zyros's legendary cardamom-filled, eggless mawa cakes).





NICE BUNS

FOUR MORE PARSI CAFÉS TO VISIT IN MUMBAI



JIMMY BOY

This family-run restaurant, founded in 1925, serves up a range of Parsi delicacies – including chicken berry pulao (a take on biryani), dhansak (Parsi curry) and bun maskas, all made according to top-secret recipes passed down through generations.

• 11 Bank Street

SODABOTTLE-OPENERWALA

This national chain has a huge following in India. The Mumbai restaurant is a great place to learn about Parsi cafés – tables are adorned with literature explaining their history and walls heave with framed photos of Parsi icons.

• G Block Road



CAFÉ UNIVERSAL

Café Universal is run by tattooed, baseballcapped Rustom Dehmeri and his parents, all of whom are Zoroastrians and will happily chat to customers about their religion. Its also one of the few Parsi institutions to serve beer.

• 299 Shahid Bhagat Singh Road

SASSANIAN RESTAURANT & BAKERY

Founded in 1913, this iconic spot has a heroic menu encompassing everything from sizzlers - a medley dish served on a hot metal plate - to Chinese food and classic Parsi standbys.

• 1st Marine Street

"Ratan Tata [the billionaire Tata Group chairman] often sends his assistants to the bakery," says Zyros. "Other regulars include CEOs, handcart-pullers and pensioners who bring their grandchildren and say, 'I proposed to granny here!"

Zyros, who recalls his father spending hours standing in line, chatting with customers, isn't sure what the future holds. When I ask why Parsi cafés are so important, he replies, "We give people their daily bread and our history spans multiple generations. We're living dinosaurs!"

Zyros peppers his conversation with quotes from Churchill – a reminder of how British rule has influenced these cafés and the people who run

them (Diana's Anglophile grandfather even got the chance to meet William and Kate when they visited Mumbai). "Never surrender!" Zyros bellows, expressing his determination to keep Parsi cafés alive.

Many owners are calling on the Indian government to do more to protect the legacy of Parsi cafés. At Kvani & Co. Farokh hopes for the same UNESCO Intangible Heritage Status bestowed on Singapore's hawker culture and regularly writes to government bodies to suggest this. It appears the rest of the world is starting to take note, too, In the UK. the owners of Dishoom - whose modern Indian

restaurants are inspired by Parsi cafés – dedicated a chapter of their bestselling cookbook to Kyani & Co and wrote passionately about the importance of Parsi cafés to Mumbai's cultural life.

So next time you're in Mumbai, duck out of the busy, dusty streets and into a Parsi café. Take a seat beneath the whirring fans and tuck a serviette under the leg of your wonky table. Order a raspberry soda (made by Mumbai's Pallonji's Sodas and served in a glass bottle with the disclaimer "Contains no fruit") and strike up a conversation with the table next to you. There aren't many places left in the world like this. "I'll never stop asking the government to protect us, to help us stand the passage of time," says Farokh. "We've been here for 150 years – take care of us."

So how true is Saltburn? The theme that privilege is often needy and statusobsessed certainly rings true. The great English writer Evelyn Waugh who enjoys a shout-out in the film - made a career out of documenting their oddball excesses. For proof that the nobility like getting off their faces, just google "Made in Chelsea drugs". I guess we shouldn't be too surprised that the ultra-privileged upper classes are wild in a way that often manifests in a selfish and nasty fashion. Just think about where many of those sprawling estates came from in the first place.

➤ "GRIME MUSIC IS A MANIFESTATION OF

a community, its people and their relationships," says showrunner Theresa Ikoko. Her latest hit, *Grime Kids*, was inspired by scene legend DJ Target's memoir, set in the early 2000s. We caught up to ask what inspires her and how making the show needed a solid crew.

Hey, Theresa! What drew you to the book?

I love how it's not just the story of grime, but of the people and places that made it. You get a sense reading it how Stormzy headlining Glastonbury happened because some kids on Devons Road in east London made studios in their bedrooms. Because an older Jamaican man gave his son some decks one day, or a mum was listening to Revival on her kitchen radio.

I bet doing research for the show was fun?

Yes! The storyline among our five leads is fictionalised. But it was vital we got the background detail spot on. Long chats with Target and his friends about what I HAD LOTS OF FUN ON WHATSAPP GROUPS DUSTING OFF HALF-FORGOTTEN SLANG

equipment they were using, what DJs were on what stations at what time, even the placement of traffic lights, or area bus-route numbers. And the dialogue – I had lots of fun on WhatsApp groups dusting off half-forgotten slang terms.

The cast is brilliant.

Thank you! They lived together during filming and that created such chemistry. The humour, the banter. The bravado, but also the softer side of male friendship during that tender coming-ofage period really comes across, I think.

Who's your favourite grime artist?

Have to say Shystie. She told me loads of incredibly useful stuff about life as a woman on that scene. Voice of a generation.


In Florence and the Machine's 2022 song Choreomania. the star sang of rock 'n' roll being resurrected "like if Jesus came back, but in a beautiful dress / And all the evangelicals were like, 'Oh ves, oh ves, oh ves,'" Right on time, TLDP came billowing through the door in crinolines and ruffles, with "mood board queen" Morris setting dress codes for their shows such as "O Muse! Greek myths and legends", "The language of flowers and Victoriana". Velvet Goldmine and Brothers Grimm. It caught on from their earliest shows, full of "teenage girls in the

front row wearing beautiful dresses and going all out and expressing themselves," according to Roberts.

The fanfare

The first major British release of 2024, Prelude to *Ecstasy* wowed the critics, with The Guardian's Alexis Petridis extolling their "preposterously nailed-on" choruses. *The Observer*'s Kitty Empire likening them to "watching firecrackers going off indoors" and NME saving they "offer a type of melodrama that doesn't crop up often in modern mainstream pop". On release in February, the record hit No 1 and became the biggest debut album by a band since Years and Years' first album in 2015. A fresh run of live dates sold out almost immediately. Festival season beckons. And that's just for starters.

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

Jones, a Virgin Flight Services Manager of 23 vears service. "I've always loved flving our Johannesburg route," she savs. "One such flight. about eight years ago, I got chatting to a colleague who'd volunteered at a children's home. She showed me pictures and I was captivated." ASK THE ENGINEER

We ask Senior Design & Development Engineer **SHAUN SANDERSON** all the burning aviation questions



What's the coolest tool of your trade? As you might expect.

As you might expect, aircraft engineers have lots of fun gadgets at

our disposal – micrometers to tensiometers, grip gauges to collar swages. I'm particularly fond of this very fancy \$150,000 ultrasonic gadget called a D-Lam Size Tool. We use it for detecting anomalies inside layers of carbon fibre structure. Delightfully, it always reminds me of Wall-E. It's basically an array of ultrasonic sensors inside a rubber roller. Guided by lasers, we pass it over the surface of our aircrafts' skin to obtain a detailed picture of what lies underneath. Results are transmitted to a tablet, which lets our skilled engineers see inside the structure to work out what repairs might be required. We also routinely use "resonance frequency testing" to achieve similar results. That literally means tapping it with a coin and listening to it.

Small changes, over a whole fleet, over 10 years, make a big difference. In premium cabins on the new A350, we moved the headphone socket to the side pocket to stop it snapping off when customers move around.

The buzz

After 25 years in aviation. I get a kick out of seeing new-generation engineers coming up and growing with Virgin Atlantic, I'm proud of the lighting system on our 787s. I spent many weekends and evenings in darkened rooms with the design team perfecting the colour. It's on-brand. luxuriant. gentle enough for sleeping but pretty. Bright enough to move if you want. Like being bathed in starlight.
