SERIAL KILLERS ARE IN THEIR FLOP ERA

Serial killers on film used to be suave and cunning – but now they're being taken down a few pegs, finds Al Horner

> WHO DO YOU THINK OF WHEN

you think of a serial killer? Maybe it's Hannibal Lecter - the genius, chiantisipping, human liver-chomping charmer from Silence of the Lambs. Or perhaps it's John Doe - the genius, Brad Pittpunishing Southern gentleman of Se7en. There was a time when these were the sort of movie murderers captivating audiences in crime thrillers - characters who, despite their fondness for blood and gore, often had something likeable about them. Not anymore, though. A wave of recent films has taken a butcher's knife to Hollywood cliches when it comes to shadowy psychopaths.

Woman of the Hour, for example (available to watch on Vera), about a real-life killer who appeared on a major American TV game show during the middle of a murder spree, purposefully shows its killer as, well, a loser. No American Psycho, Patrick Bateman suaveness here; the film's villain, Rodney Alcala (played by Daniel Zovatto), is instead desperate and pathetic.

Same goes for Longlegs, the titular killer in one of 2024's most acclaimed horrors. In interviews, filmmaker Oz Perkins revealed he set out to make a horror-thriller that didn't glamorise the psychopath at its centre, instead making him a washed-up glam-rock fan with nothing going in his life. At least Norman Bates in Alfred Hitchcock's Psycho was nice to his mum (a bit too nice). There's literally nothing redemptive

about Longlegs or Alcala. Or for that matter, The Butcher, the torturer Josh Hartnett plays in M Night Shyamalan's latest thriller, Trap, Unlike classic movie killers who enjoy their cut-throat pastimes, The Butcher is depicted as miserable and perpetually stressed.

Why is this happening? It may very well be a response to the rise in "true crime" - a genre of documentaries, TV


shows and podcasts that's exploded in popularity over the last decade. True crime content has been criticised by women's welfare organisations as exploiting victims and turning real-life violence into salacious content to be consumed. The emergence of a new type of serial killer depiction in Hollywood movies is a course-corrective to that: "Real-life serial killers

are just gross dudes," said Longlegs' Oz Perkins. "There's nothing cool or interesting about them. Historically, Hannibal Lecter, John Doe - they're omniscient, unbeatable forces. What if we show them as pieces of shit, which is what they actually are?"

The movies are just as good as Silence of the Lambs and co - but this time. there's a more responsible depiction of the killers at their core. Isn't that worth raising a nice glass of chianti to?

Hollywood to chase her acting dreams. Katy O'Brian spent seven vears as a police officer in Carmel. Indiana. She still uses some of those skills. "[Being a cop] teaches you how to listen very actively, and I think that's really important," says the 35 year old. "I also got a lot of life experience from it." By that, she means a razor-sharp sense of when someone is trying to pull one over on her. "Honestly, that really helps with the business side of acting," she says, laughing.

After handing in her badge, O'Brian took up competitive bodybuilding around the same time she started going up for acting auditions. Her impressive physique helped her land a string of roles in shows like The Walking Dead and The Mandalorian. but her big break came with a role that could have been written for her: a bodybuilder from the Midwest who shacks up with Kristen Stewart in mesmerising crime thriller Love Lies Bleeding. She's since joined Glen Powell's tornado-wrangling team for blockbuster Twisters and can next be seen in Mission: Impossible - The Final Reckoning. O'Brian tells Vera about zombie makeup, storm chasing and her wild first date with her wife.

Rising star //

"I made a **PowerPoint for** the casting director"

You were born and raised in Indianapolis - would you recommend it?

Only if you like NASCAR, flat land, corn and really cold winters.

What attracted you to bodybuilding?

I wanted to get in really good shape, so I started working with a coach and it kind of just went from there. My first competition was a lot of trial and error, because I did a lot on my own. The next year I started training at Mr Indiana's gym and did another competition where I was less responsible for my own diet,

nutrition, posing and all those things. I wound up placing better that year. but it was a non drugtesting competition. I was up against women who potentially could be on steroids and I was dwarfed by a couple of them. I was iust like, okav, well, I don't want to go that far.

Did you draw on those experiences a lot for Love Lies Bleeding?

It definitely added an extra layer of authenticity. When I first saw the casting call it said, "Queer bodybuilder playing against Kristen Stewart", and then I found out from the breakdown that it was someone from the Midwest moving out West to pursue their dreams. I just thought, "That's me." I made a whole PowerPoint with pictures from my bodybuilding competitions to send to the casting director.

What was your favourite thing about moving to LA?

I love all the really random, obscure things you can do. My first date with my wife was a 20s-themed ballroom dance and pie fight. It was a speakeasy. You had to have a code to get in. They had a costume contest, ballroom dancing, and then, at the end of the night, you throw a tarp on and have a pie fight. Only in LA, right?

What was it like being covered in all that zombie make-up for *The* Walking Dead?

I didn't know that you could just go to the make-up trailer and have it removed. Not just you could, you must! I drove home covered in this zombie goo and blood, and when I showered I realised, "Oh, this is not coming off." I was just scrubbing and scrubbing and scrubbing. I found out later you have to use an alcohol-based remover. You live and learn!

Did you get caught up in any real storms while making Twisters?

Yeah, we were in Oklahoma and we had a lot of weather delays, so we really bonded as a cast and

> crew. One day we had a sudden burst of 90mph (145km/h) winds that just tore our set apart. The crew came in and pieced it together good as new. It was pretty incredible.

You're reuniting with Glen Powell for a new adaptation of The

Running Man. Will it be similar to the Schwarzenegger film from the 80s?

The director, Edgar Wright, is keeping it closer to the book [by Stephen King]. I'm really excited to show my character to the world, because I had way too much fun and I think it's a different side of me people don't usually get to see.


You're also starring in the next Mission: Impossible in May. What can you tell us about The Final Reckoning?

I don't know how much I can say other than that Tom Cruise always knows how to top his last movie, but I don't know how he or anyone else will be able to top what he does in this one. It's completely nuts.

What's next for you?

I've got to get some lead roles under my belt! It's fun to be supporting and dip in and out of projects, but it'd be really cool for someone to to give me a bit more responsibility. I can handle it!

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at Tiffany's and Taxi Driver have in common? They all feature Fifth Avenue, arguably New York's most glamorous and iconic street. It's the subject of a new book from coffee-table-adorners Assouline: called Fifth Avenue: 200 Years of Stories and Legends, it examines the history, cultural impact and enduring mystique of Manhattan's geographic heart.

The street's history stretches back to the early days of the United States: first conceived in 1785 (and then called Middle Road), surveyor and engineer John Randel Jr renamed it Fifth Avenue when he drew up plans for New York's famous grid. Construction only began years later, in 1824, when workers painstakingly paved through fields and marshes, creating a country road a mere seven blocks long.

Now Fifth Avenue is 6.2 miles (10km) long - stretching from Harlem to Washington Square Park - and is home to the Empire State Building, the Tiffany & Co Building (where Holly Golightly famously had break-


shopping.

Then there's the Plaza Hotel, the grande dame of NYC boltholes, where the Beatles stopped on their first hop across the pond, Truman Capote hosted his 1966 Black and White Ball, and countless fictional characters - from Eloise to Kevin McCallister - staved.

The book traces all these moments and more with rare archival photography and sharp narration from journalist Julie Satow. The foreword comes from author Jay McInerney, who writes: "Park Avenue is the most glamorous residential address and Broadway has the raffish hardscrabble charm of

Damon Runyon's hoodlums and the Theater District's showgirls, but no single street encapsulates the glamour and the grandeur of New York City as does Fifth Avenue."

It mostly unfolds over the backdrop of Orkney, an archipelago off Scotland's north-eastern coast known for its blustery conditions and brutal beauty. Ronan's version of Liptrot returns home to an outlying piece of farmland on Orkney's rugged coast after completing an alcohol rehab programme. Its nearempty beaches provide quiet places for self-reflection - like the dramatic Bay of Skaill, with its

There are seven dining concepts - including the seashell-garlanded Lagoon Café, where rotating breakfast options include an addictive coconut cornmeal porridge. But the crowning jewel is the spa on the slope of a palm-covered hill, each room set in a standalone

villa for the ultimate private pamper. Because why share when vou can have vour own?









SANDROURNE SANTA MONICA

Pleasingly whitewashed and and just steps from the pier, this hotel really embodies the LA neighbourhood's boho-chic way of life. Take breaks from the pool with the daily pottery classes offered to guests.



THE ROCKLEY, BARBADOS

Set on Barbados' lively South Coast, this is a laid-back gem of a resort. Its boutique size (just 49 rooms) ensures extra attentive service and the namesake beach - only steps away - is one of the best on the island.



waterfowl - duck to you and me - infused with delicate spices, ground in-house and massaged into tender cylinders for a good roasting in the clay oven, served beside apricot and chilli chutney, pickled fruit and edible flowers. Lovely. Tiya, a new-ish opening in San Francisco from brothers Puian and Suian Sarkar. takes everything you like about Indian food and zhuzhes it up with a cheery blast of West Coast optimism and flawless Cali produce. It's their first proper collab - Suian already has a Michelin star to his name - and the space is all confident Mid-Century swagger: eggshell-blue seats, pops of teal, maximalist wallpaper and sleek mustard banquettes. Sticky pomegranate glazed pork belly and the duck

seekh kebab, seen here, are highflyers from the a la carte menu. Keen to avoid – ahem – a massive bill? Pujan's tasting menu, with scallop, finger lime caviar and gunpowder seabass, is a snip at \$95. Definitely worth a trip across the pond.

round the turn of the century, when fusion was all the rage, a craze


for eccentric martinis took hold. Now, one especially fruity specimen is enjoying a revival. The lychee martini at Verlaine, NYC, keeps it tropical with vodka, lychee and a splash of pineapple. A lychee martini at The Joneses, Toronto, is somewhat more elaborate, with Empress 1908 gin, lemon, egg white and green pea flour. Not extra enough? London's Kolamba East (right) mashes up Mikolasch vodka with a tart apple and ginger foam, plus lychee pureed with modish clover-like herb fenugreek. We are so back.

didn't even have a professional sports team to call its own. Since 2017, the city has amassed an arena, a hockey team, a legacy NFL franchise and stadium, a WNBA team, a spot on the Fl calendar and a Stanley Cup. All the venues around town compete to one-up each other with bigger screens, more luxurious amenities and over-the-top extras. Unveiled in 2023, the YAHOO SPORTSBOOK BY WILLIAM HILL at The Venetian features a massive 46-million-pixel, 1,770ft² (164m2) LED wall that can show 40 events simultaneously. This "book" offers private fan caves boasting 98-inch (2.5m) guest-controlled TVs,

dedicated service and seating for eight to 12.

Experience Las Vegas through the eyes of a local sports fan at one of the neighbourhood casinos off the Strip. Located in the southwest, the 205-seat DURANGO CASINO & RESORT **SPORTSBOOK** shows the main event on six massive screens, with the first-ever double-sided centre-hung LED display, and over-the-counter and kiosk wagering options. The adjacent **GEORGE** SPORTSMEN'S LOUNGE serves breakfast, lunch and dinner, and shows every sporting event imaginable 24/7. True to Las Vegas's reputation for elevated cuisine, 24-hour-braised short ribs and eight-ounce flat iron steak with chimichurri are offered alongside sports bar fare.

Located in Downtown Las Vegas, CIRCA boasts the largest sportsbook in the world. It offers bottles, bars and stadium food from PROJECT BBQ and VICTORY BURGER WINGS & CO. Think of it as a sportsbook with nightclub-style service. Outside, the massive **STADIUM SWIM** is a pool Left: Stadium Swim at Circa Las Vegas

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and viewing party wrapped into one. It's open 365 days a year, with six heated pools, lily pads, day beds and cabanas all positioned in front of a 143ft (44m), 14-million mega-pixel screen.

On Super Bowl Weekend, every bar and restaurant in Las Vegas gets in on the viewing-party action. EATALY LAS VEGAS AT PARK MGM shows the Big Game at the new concept Eataly Bar reserve a table and indulge in drinks and pizza delivered directly from the oven. FLANKER KITCHEN + SPORTS BAR at Mandalay Bay flips the switch on its 30ft x 9ft LED wall and countless TVs. There's even a hidden karaoke room for those who want their viewing (and singing) privacy. BEER PARK, on the rooftop of Paris Las Vegas, features an open bar, endless hors d'oeuvres, a championship food spread and reserved seating.

If you can tear your eyes away from the field, take in the ALLEGIANT STADIUM TOUR. One of the top-grossing stadiums in the world and home to the Las Vegas Raiders, the black and silver "death star", as it's known, offers 75-minute tours that get behind the scenes, including the

Raiders' locker rooms and field.

The action doesn't end at football: THE **COSMOPOLITAN** resort is bringing back its Hoops & Hops college basketball party during the NCAA men's and women's basketball first and second round championship games (20-22 March). Games air on multiple stadium-style, high-definition



projection screens, and you can test your skills at bar games such as Golden Tee and Super Shot, or shoot some hoops on a hardwood court with a regulation basket. Shoot a different kind of shot by

placing a wager at the dedicated sports betting windows or through the BetMGM app.

North on The Strip, one of the city's stateof-the-art concert venues converts into stadium-style tournament viewing as Fontainebleau's **BLEAULIVE THEATER** becomes a college basketball tournament hub with a 70ft-wide LED screen. Whether or not you put down any chips, you can bet you'll have a winning vacation in Vegas this season.

For a break from touristy Las Vegas, visit the 18b Arts District, adjacent to North Las Vegas and East Charleston boulevards. Vintage shops, breweries, coffee roasters, art galleries, restaurants and bars dot the neighbourhood.



RHYOLITE GHOST TOWN GOLDWELL OPEN AIR

About two hours outside Vegas. Rhyolite's ruins include the bank building, jail, train depot and bottle house. Nearby Goldwell Open Air Museum spotlights massive, oddball outdoor art.



LEE CANYON

Lee Canyon, about an hour outside Las Vegas and close to Mount Charleston, offers skiing and snowboarding. The resort averages about 161 inches (4m) of snowfall annually, and features runs suitable for beginners to intermediates.

Are symbiotes real?

Could a foreign organism really take over our brains, as befalls Tom Hardy's Eddie Brock in Venom: The Last Dance, asks Ralph Jones?

DON'T YOU JUST HATE IT WHEN A SYM-

biotic life form from outer space escapes from a lab and takes control of your body, forcing you to help it look for planets where it can kill the locals? This is the premise of Venom. With the franchise now on number three. The Last Dance. Venom and host Eddie Brock (Tom Hardy) are still bound together, fighting off baddies and saving the world.

It may not shock you to learn that the Venom films aren't documentaries. But how scientifically plausible is the idea of a symbiote that is able to take over a human brain and endow it with special powers? In the natural world, symbiotes aren't called symbiotes, which is a term that Marvel coined for its Spiderverse. Instead they are called symbionts. And, yes, they're 100% real.

When real-life symbiosis happens, two organisms attach themselves to one another and operate to some extent like one entity. This can happen inside or outside the host organism. The latter is the case in ectosymbiosis - a kind of relationship, often seen on larger animals, where one symbiont lives outside the host body. Like cleaner fish, who remove dead skin from other types of fish in a mutually beneficial arrangement. Venom's relationship with Brock is a kind of endosymbiosis. Rather than perching on his head, Venom

lives inside Brock's actual cells, just like algae lives inside coral.

When one entity is exerting any kind of unwelcome control over its host, the relationship is defined as parasitic. (If you've seen the film Parasite, you'll know exactly why.) Some parasites attach themselves to their hosts in order to survive: others simply enjoy the ride. Venom is the latter. Indeed, what is different about Venom, and what makes it an unrealistic organism, is that it transfers its superior alien powers into Eddie Brock, making him close to superhuman. While real symbionts might each enjoy life more because of their partner, they aren't stronger than the sum of their parts. A helpful analogy might



be that if someone stands on your shoulders, you are simply twice as tall; you don't suddenly develop special powers because you are gigantic.

What is terrifying about parasites - and "parasite" arguably describes the relationship in Venom most accurately - is that human brains are in fact susceptible to being hijacked by them. Cysticercosis, which seems to have been what

Robert F Kennedy Jr had recently, involves

a tapeworm migrating into the brain and slowly consuming its nutrients.

Because we are our brains, we are therefore at risk of being "controlled" by these organisms like Venom controls Brock. The problem is, we don't get any superpowers - our personalities and behaviour may change drastically, and we become

seriously ill.

So, yes, various kinds of "symbiotes" exist. But in real life, they wouldn't provide great material for a Marvel film.

VERDICT: We're going with yes on this one.



But, as Naomi Pike finds out, this is a multi-hyphenate fixated on the future, set to define Hollywood's next chapter too

hiwetel Ejiofor and I meet deep in the midst of what he calls "Love Actually season". "During the window from the run-up to Christmas until Valentine's Day, people talk to me about the film a lot," he says. His character, Peter, is Keira Knightley's lovelorn husband; there's an iconic moment in the film where, having just wed, he and Knightley walk down the aisle and a gospel choir appears as if by magic. It was a viral moment when that word wasn't much used outside of clinical practices and remains a reference for couples more than 21 years later. "That scene is so brilliant. I remember being in that church and thinking, 'Well, I'm never going to forget this,'" Ejiofor says, flashing a toothsome smile that makes him every bit the big-screen heartthrob.

That smile is as scene-stealing over Zoom as it is in big-screen projects like Kinky Boots and Doctor Strange. We're connecting while the London-based actor is in LA for some reshoots. Dressed in a plain black Under Armour workout T-shirt, he is a passionate conversationalist whose enthusiasm isn't blunted by the pre-9am meeting time. He's especially excited about his next role - another rom com, two decades after Love Actually rocked the culture.

This is no ordinary love-interest role for Ejiofor, however: for his next turn, he takes on something of a rite of passage as a Bridget Jones suitor, following in the footsteps of Hugh Grant, Colin Firth and Patrick Dempsey before him. As the "quite abrasive" (his words) but pleasingly right-side-of-bookish (my words) Mr Wallaker, the school teacher to Bridget's





young son, Ejiofor's acting chops and dreamboat allure unite, a foil to Renée Zellweger's iconically frazzled heroine.

Joining Bridget Jones: Mad About the Boy (out Valentine's Day) was a no-brainer for Ejiofor, an actor who boasts an epic CV that spans practically every genre and medium. "I love Renée, and what she and the rest of the cast have brought to this extraordinary world," he says.

It's been nine years since we last checked in with Bridget and things are looking quite different. Based on the 2013 book of the same name, the film finds her in her fifties, a mother of two young children and - spoiler alert - widowed. Ejiofor's character appears when Bridget

is navigating a new normal.

"There have always been love interests that have circulated her, that we've all fallen in love with, and they all speak to a different aspect of Bridget and her life," he says, unwilling to compare his role to Mark Darcy or Daniel Cleaver. He adds, "Wallaker is regimented and has this sense of the way the world should be. But, in a way this is the story and in the nature of Bridget, and she's able to unintentionally disarm him so completely."

For Ejiofor, much of the charm of the Bridget Jones franchise can be found in its evolution, which has so paralleled our own. "She has gotten older, with different pressures and concerns. and so we can see ourselves

reflected in all of the different places where we might be in our lives - it's comforting in that knowledge that we're not alone. As Bridget's struggles have

> changed, so have ours." But it's not all big, existential concerns, of course - as always, the comedv comes from the characters fumbling their way through life. "There's still the core of who [these characters are], which is the core of the humour and the way that we look at the world. It's a really important part of the appeal and how it feels true."

> Verisimilitude has always been a core concern for Ejiofor. The actor often turns to stories that are based on real-life accounts. His second foray as a director is a case in point: Rob Peace (available to watch onboard) is the cinematic telling of the life of a young Black student who, after graduating from Yale University, returned to his home town and was killed in a drug-related shooting aged just 30.

about Rob Peace's life that felt like it had always been on the tip of my tongue, but I had never really seen it expressed as clearly with this intersection of race, housing, education and the criminal justice system, and how these things kind of combined to derail the experience of this one truly brilliant individual," he says of choosing to take the lead as director. "I was very curious about how to look at that in a cinematic way on film."

In order to bring a sense of authenticity to the work, Ejiofor shot it in Peace's real-life neighbourhood of East Orange, New Jersey. "It was incredibly rewarding. The people who knew Rob really supported the process. It was extraordinary."

"When Rob Peace's story first came out, the narrative was judgmental of his choices to still be connected to that community," Ejiofor says. "I felt that judgment was misplaced because I feel like it is a very specific, indelible and perfectly honourable part of some people's personality to feel that rooted connection and to always want to hold on... I think that the connection of the past - to family, to friendships - are all



of the things that create personality and are extraordinarily important. They are the building blocks of who we are."

Telling the story of Peace is just one of many remarkable explorations of character that fill Ejiofor's brimming CV. The east London-born actor started in the late 90s treading the boards in the West End. He quickly became a critical darling, most notably for his Olivier Award-winning turn in Shakespeare's Othello, directed by Michael Grandage, in 2008.

For the best part of the last decade, though, it's been straight Hollywood for Ejiofor, a pathway that was blazed by his Oscar-nominated role in 2013's 12 Years a Slave. Since then, he's shared the screen with such industry heavyweights as Angelina Jolie, Mark Wahlberg, Charlize Theron and Joaquin Phoenix, to name but a few. His directorial debut came with 2019's The Bou Who Harnessed the Wind, the true story of a Malawian child who built a windmill to save his village from famine.

"I think I'm fascinated by people," he says of his motivation to pursue the stories he chooses to tell. "I've always been interested in what their lives are, the different ways that they interpret the world, respond to the pressures, the traumas, the difficulties, and also the joyful experiences that we all go through. I find that endlessly interesting."

At the start of his career Ejiofor was often found playing Black roles - a freed slave (Amistad) and a Nigerian immi-

grant (Dirty Pretty Things). Now, he's the love interest in the year's biggest mainstream rom com. Does he think his filmography speaks to changing attitudes in Hollywood, where actors are no longer as subject to typecasting as they might have been at the start of the century? "I've always been very fortunate in the work that I've done, and in the people that I've been able to work with," he offers. "I would say there are probably places where things are improving for Black actors, for representation and in gender and sexuality, and then there are other areas which don't seem to change.

"That's the complicated relationship of cinema as an art form," he says of how Hollywood straddles the worlds of art and commerce. "Those two things are often uneasy bedfellows. The way that the world changes reflects the way we artists change, but there isn't a direct line of how things become more and more progressive over time. Not least in the way that the world is being built at the moment, which feels very business-first."

He says he'd like to see "a little bit of room for things that are more esoteric. Those were things that I think I fell in love with when I was growing up. They weren't particularly popular, but they became loved over time."

As Ejiofor's film career marches towards its three-decade anniversary, the actor shows no sign of feeling disparaged or discouraged by what it can offer him, and retains a

level-headed approach to fame and success. "I'm still extremely excited about films. And I think there is an incredible opportunity for change," he says.

"You're never in a completely safe position in this industry, as you're always working and striving for whatever that next thing is, and to make it your best work yet. I think that's still the goal: to look back and think that that is the best I have at this moment. And even if one achieves that, which I don't know if one will, then I think that feeling of 'there it is' would last, if you're lucky, a couple of months, and then you'd be back looking for whatever the next sort of thing is."

Another call time beckons for Ejiofor and, sadly for me, an unrelenting notification reminds me that time is running out on our conversation. We finish up by chatting about how his younger self might think of "all of this" – the journey from Forest Gate to Los Angeles, the National Youth Theatre to the Olivier Awards, supporting role to leading man.

"What's crazy is that my younger self is completely unchanged from when I was about 15 or 16," he says humbly. "I'm constantly surprised that the thrill, the excitement, the energy, the desire to explore this form of work hasn't tired. It's 30 years later, and the years do add up, but whatever that thing is that's inside of me is very young and it feels just the same as it was then."

Deep dive at lesbian bars



shouts a man in the line up as a small wave rolls towards me - I turn my board and paddle, and then I'm up and gilding along a glassy face, the

spray from the turquoise Arabian Gulf in my wake. I've been surfing for years, it's an addictive and familiar thrill, but this is forever a pinch-myself moment - I'm in one of the most unexpected surf spots on Earth, in the mega metropolis of Dubai, in the Arabian Desert. In front of me are skyscrapers so tall they could pierce the clouds and to the right is one of the world's most iconic buildings - the blue sail of the Burj Al Arab. As the wave dissipates, I hear the faint murmur of traffic from the epic and chaotic 14-lane Sheikh Zayed Road, connecting all seven emirates, and as I paddle out again, there's silence and calm until the next wave rolls in.

This unlikely place is now drawing boardriders from around the world, following the pioneering efforts of a group of local surfers and a newly opened artificial wave pool in Abu Dhabi. "Dubai has the reputation that it's all about the skyline and concrete jungle, but true surf actually comes here, and people are like, wow, we didn't know that this community existed in this region," says surfing pioneer Daniel Van Dooren, one of the first people to ever surf in Dubai. Riding waves here is the best antidote to busy big city life. "It's not bling, it's down to earth."

Dan may look like a California implant, with his blond hair and piercing blue eyes, but Dubai has always been his home. He was born in Bahrain and his family moved to Dubai as expats when he was eight months old. He's now the CEO of Surf House Dubai in the quiet beachside residential area of Umm Sugeim – which has become the surfing epicentre of the emirate.

Chicago Beach Village, where the old-style Arab village of Madinat Jumeirah is now located, is where many of Dubai's first surfers lived. Waves would regularly roll in, so Dan and his friends taught themselves to surf. "We used whatever boards we

could find, because there were no surf shops back then. We'd use broken surfboards, anything that would float, and would share everything with each other. We would just run off the pier, jump in, catch waves, and then just run back round and do it again," he says. While the waves are less consistent than other global surf spots, with swell created by strong northerly winds that only come in the winter months (October-April), the surf community has grown over the past two decades,

thanks to the work of Dan and his business partner Scott Chambers. Surf House Dubai has a gear shop, excellent cafe named Single Fin and a surf school, plus a rental

and board repair centre.

There are now thousands of surfers in Dubai, plus countless visitors who come to catch waves when passing through. "Surfers frequently travel and the UAE is a stopping-off point for those travelling east and west," he says. The opening of Surf Abu Dhabi, which holds the





Guinness World Record for the longest man-made wave in the world, the biggest wave pool barrel and the biggest saltwater surfing lagoon, has attracted countless pros in the past few months, surfers who would have never dreamed of riding perfect waves in the Gulf. "It's probably the best wave pool wave in the world," says Dan, "It's good for the industry. It's good for the region, it's good for business."

Twenty years after Surf House Dubai opened, "a lot more Emiratis are surfing", says Dan. Emiratis make up only 12% of the population; the UAE is one of world's the most diverse countries. "For 20 years we didn't have many Emirati surfers there were around five max, and now a lot of the younger kids are looking up to people like Mohammad Sultan Bin Mejren, who has represented his country in surf competitions. He's a leader and a visionary. It's amazing to watch."



"I'm fortunate to have grown up in a family that had a relationship with the sea," explains Mohammad, dressed in national dress - a full white kandura - when we chat at Surf House Dubai's laid-back cafe a few blocks from Sunset Beach. People wander in barefoot and in boardies after their beach sessions before ordering colourful açai bowls. As Jack Johnson plays on the stereo, Mohammad tells me his grandfather was a ship's captain and he spent lots of time on boats and in the water learning to be an accomplished freediver - one of the UAE's oldest sports. Before pearls were mass-produced in Japan, and oil

to the sea, and land-based sports like horse riding and football took centre stage.

Mohammad discovered surfing on a trip to California. "I tried to surf as soon as I came back to the UAE," he remembers, but "everyone laughed at me. They said, 'Your name is not John, you're not blond,

you're not going to learn how to do this sport." Nearly a decade later

and gas were found in the region, pearl diving was the economic backbone of the country. Local families historically enjoyed wave riding, though it didn't look like the surfing we know today, Mohammad explains. "Tribes had names for different types of waves – a wave with wind, a wave that's clean and so on," he says. But over the years some lost their connection

he has the skills to compete for his country. "My goal is to encourage the next generation of surfers," he says.

Essra Aboushahin is from Palestine but grew up in the UAE, and one of many people Mohammad has helped to surf. She spent time in Australia, but never knew it was possible to surf

back home. "I stumbled upon it by accident," she says. "I was walking along, and when I got to Sunset Beach I saw a couple of people surfing – it blew my mind. Even today, I can talk to people who grew up here who have no idea you can surf in Dubai. So I picked up a board and went out surfing by myself."

She returned to the beach again and again. "The community is super welcoming, and being in the sea is so fulfilling and

healing," says Essra. She now volunteers at Surf House Dubai's water-based events. "What Surf House Dubai has done is show what was possible and that there is a market for surfing in the UAE."

The new surf lagoon in Abu Dhabi has legitimised surfing in the region on a competitive front and sparked conversations about creating an Olympic surf team. And there are rumours the UAE is due to get another wave

pool soon – this time in Dubai with Wavegarden Cove technology, so surfers of all abilities can ride waves all year round.

That said, there have been numerous challenges for the local surf community over the years. Massive building projects have blocked off the waves, leaving only two beaches where you can surf in Dubai: Sunset Beach in Umm Suqeim and Nikki Beach further north, although the latter charges an annual surfing fee. Sunset Beach itself was threatened by development, but was saved following a petition. "We

got over 10,000 signatures and, luckily, [the authorities] listened," Dan says. "We could have just accepted it and carried on with some other job but it was our lifestyle, one that we live, love and breathe every day."

The surfing community feels there is more to be done. Instead of adding breakwaters to the coastal areas, which causes erosion on the beach, the authorities could add artificial reefs – which do the same job but also promote marine life. "I've surfed a couple of artificial reefs in Australia and they're fantastic. On the days where there are no waves the reefs become diving spots, creating another attraction for tourists."

I remember Dan's words as I wait patiently for my next wave under the beaming desert sun: "It's not like that Hawaiian vibe where it's very aggressive and everyone's trying to fight for the waves. It's very relaxed, and everyone's out there to have fun and enjoy." Around me, there's laughter and chatter from the other boarders – Dubai not only looks different from other surf spots, but its denizens know how lucky they are to be

able to enjoy the emirate's last remaining free natural surfing beach. Will the addition of fancy new wave pools mean this small desert nation will soon get its own champion surfer? Maybe – until then, Emiratis are keen to just ride it out.

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



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

Real-life Silicon Valley tycoon Jacob Peters is CEO of the Superpower healthcare platform, and is part of an anti-ageing scene within tech hoping to slow ageing and ultimately cheat death.

Hi, Jacob! Will ageing be solved in our lifetimes? It's possible. We'd need about a thousand times the level of investment currently going into solving the problem. But lots of promising developments are happening right now.

Like what?

New compounds - supplements, pharmaceuticals - that counteract the ageing process, reversing molecular and cellular decay. Also new medical

tests that help us understand genetic issues and root problems sooner.

Fancy testing is all very well if you're a tech billionaire, or Demi Moore.

I think the arc of technological progress will soon make quality testing and powerful compounds

available to all. Remember, it wasn't too long ago only a tiny elite had mobile phones, or the internet.

Can't I just eat better and exercise?

Lots of people think you can get everything you need from your diet. But there's declining nutrient density in the modern food system, thanks to intensive farming practices, soil depletion, the genetic modification of crops.

Those hardcore Californian anti-ageing guvs

- visionaries or nutcases?

I can see why people like [anti-ageing guru] Bryan Johnson are polarising. But he's running a pioneering experiment we may all ultimately benefit from.

How soon will we have drugs like The Substance?

I think we'll see powerful anti-ageing optimisers within the next 10 or 20 vears. Movies like *The* Substance are useful. helping us think through the implications of frontier tech. Anybody working in this space, myself included, has to maintain the highest standards of ethics.






