As he prepares to become a grand-

father, Keaton's character strives to reconnect with a daughter he wasn't around for growing up - too busy working, his attention always elsewhere. What follows is a moving tale from a filmmaker with her own, very public experience of a so-called broken home: Hallie Meyers-Shyer is the daughter of rom-com queen Nancy Meyers (It's

Complicated, What Women Want) and fellow filmmaker Charles Shyer, who separated in 1999.

That film has company when it comes to recent captivating movies about dad-daughter relations. Netflix awards contender His Three Daughters broke hearts with its portrait of a trio of estranged sisters, with complicated feelings about their dying dad. Poor Things tells the tale of a mad scientist who has to learn to let his female Frankensteinian creation go - an odd father-daughter story but a father-daughter story nonetheless. And M Night Shyamalan's latest film,

Trap, is about a serial killer who risks it all to take his daughter to see her favourite pop star - pretty touching really, if you ignore all the kidnapping and murder.


All of this marks a shift. Sure, stories have always existed about complicated families, featuring dads and daughters who need to reconnect: Interstellar, Contact, To Kill a Mockingbird, the list

goes on. But of late, these relationships have been foregrounded like never before. Charlotte Welles's Aftersun, 2023's most moving film, didn't need the fate of the world or society on the line to make audiences care. One question was enough to keep viewers gripped to the end: "Can this father and daughter patch things up?"

Maybe it's a reaction to the saturation of the superhero era. After endless films in which world destruction looms and all character emotion is lost in a blizzard of CG spectacle, the films that are truly connecting with audiences are the ones where the stakes are smaller. more intimate, more relatable. Because everyone has a family, and no family is free of conflict and chaos and the occasional bust-up. Unless you're one of the Waltons, of course.

Psych student-turned-actor WILLA FITZGERALD brings an inquisitive approach to her roles, including in grisly thriller Strange Darling

have been a therapist. Instead, the former psychology student now specialises in movies and TV shows that leave you needing therapy after watching. This year's Strange Darling saw the Nashville-born star as a woman on the run from an apparently deranged male aggressor, in a Tarantino-esque thriller full of adrenaline-rush action and unexpected turns. Flsewhere on the emerging star's recent list of hits is Netflix horror The Fall of the House of *Usher* – a Mike Flanagan adaptation of collected Edgar Allen Poe stories, that was basically Succession with murderous chimpanzees and supernatural cats. Both traumatising; both brilliantly humane.

"I've been very lucky in my career to get to play a lot of really complicated characters," the 33 year old grins from an LA hotel room. "I really love playing characters that people could, in theory, write off as evil or amoral. That's the most fertile ground to dig around in, because every quote-unquote 'bad person' had something happen to them that led them to the choices that they've made." But what about the choices that Fitzgerald has to make now, after the runaway success of Strange

Darling - a film lauded by everyone from Stephen King to JJ Abrams? The future's wide open, the TV supporting actress turned Hollywood leading lady tells Vera.

Strange Darling has one of the best movie twists in recent memory. On a scale of one to 10 - 10 being Strange Darling levels of violence - what's the correct punishment for someone who spoils twists for other people? Oh man! I'm probably a bad person to talk to, because I ruined the end of Anna Karenina for my friend while she was reading that novel,

so I would unfortunately be high on the execution list [laughs]. What I will say is. it's been amazing to see how protective people have already been of the film's surprises. Audiences have really been amazing in not spoiling it for other people and letting people discover it for themselves, which is a really sweet thing.

Did the twist stun you in the way same that it's been surprising viewers, the first time you read the script?

I had a very similar experience reading it as you did watching it! I really didn't know where it was going when I started the script. Then it just blew my mind [laughs]. I think I, like everyone, had a lot of preconceived notions and biases that were overturned as the story starts to unfold. And I loved that.

You studied psychology for three years before turning to acting. How big a help is that background when it comes to understanding the psyches of the complicated characters you play?

You know, it's a funny thing, it's not like I'm taking out the DSM [Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders] while I'm preparing a part, but I certainly think that my interest in psychology is connected to my interest in acting. They're both explorations of the human condition, right? Why does that person think the way they think and act? How can I understand that and what framework can Luse to understand that? I think that as an actor. I probably do look at my work in a sort of academic way, researching whatever weird things feel appropriate to help with what I'm trying to tunnel into in these characters. It leads me down some strange Google searches [laughs].

Your parents were both musicians. Was there ever a moment you considered that path instead of acting?

I played piano a lot growing up and I still love playing piano, but music was never really something I considered as a possible career path. I think mainly because you have to have some way of rebelling against your parents - but

my parents are super cool, so instead I was like, I'm going to be a nerd! My way of rebelling against my parents was to study all day. I wanted to be an archaeologist, and then a forensic scientist, and then a psychologist. But the first time I ever [acted], I distinctly remember getting off the little stage in my elementary maths classroom and telling my mum I felt like I was flying. That was really the beginning of me ending up here today.

What's next after the success of Strange Darling?

I'm in a very lucky position right now to be a little picky and to take my time finding something that feels really special and really singular. And that is a real gift, knowing when the right thing comes along, I'll be ready for it. I know I want to keep playing characters who challenge viewers to feel empathy. Because, honestly, if more people allowed themselves to exercise empathy, I think the world would probably be a much better place.

baking, with a new wave of flour-dusted talents obsessing over lamination and levain, geeking out over ethically sourced heritage grains, and reimagining classic croissants and challahs using avant-garde ingredients. For my book, I had the

enviable task of tasting my way around the country in search of all things baked, buttery and delicious. Here are five of my favourite finds.



• Britain's Best Bakeries is published by Hoxton Mini Press

PUMP STREET BAKERY, SUFFOLK

The dusty pink facade of this specialty bakery has become almost as iconic as the creations sold inside.

Father-and-daughter team Chris and Joanna Brennan also run a celebrated chocolate company - both in the charming village of Orford - so you can expect their choc chip cookies and dipped flapjacks to be a cut above.

HAMBLIN, OXFORD

Hamblin proudly sources all its stoneground flour from organic wheat and rye grown within 80km of



the bakery. These sustainable grains are the foundation for sweet and savoury options to satisfy any craving - whether that's hearty sausage rolls and pizzas, perfectly plaited cinnamon buns or melt-in-themouth cookies.

On a corner of the St Paul's district, Farro opts for traditional loaves and viennoiserie, sometimes adding a modern twist. Expect a roll call of continental sweet treats in its daily displays: ultrabuttery Breton kouign-amanns, silky Portuguese pasteis de nata and dainty canelés with caramelised crusts.

TOAD, LONDON

A tiny, unassuming takeaway spot for addictive bakes on Camberwell's hipsterfied high street in south-east London. Will it be a savoury croissant stuffed with pork belly, red cabbage and cheddar, or a sweet yuzu, orange and almond Jaffa cake? The charismatic counter staff will help guide you.

When Lannan opened in the Scottish capital last summer, it was an instant success; fans queue down the road every morning in anticipation of glossy maple-pecan plaits and custard slices topped with berry icing. Owner and (self-taught) head baker Darcie Maher's attention to detail shines in everything from the beautiful, raspberries-and-cream coloured shopfront to the bespoke handmade coffee cups.

MAXIMAL MINIMALISM IN DOWNTOWN LA

New hotel **KODŌ** takes its cues from Japanese design for a delightfully monastic retreat on the West Coast

> WELL-DESIGNED HOTELS ARE OFTEN

described as "zen", but at kodō hotel zen is a more literal pursuit. Slated as a first-of-its-type Japanese minimalist hotel in Los Angeles, it infuses every element of its design with the East Asian philosophy. It has only eight rooms and each one is meticulously designed - like the Izumi Superior King suite, which is inspired by the "essence of a serene rock garden". Consider its thoughtful details, like the suspended LED mirror perched above a hand-carved stone washbasin. Concrete accents lend the space a calming feng shui-Brutalist vibe, while the waterfall shower - in the middle of the room evokes the feeling of bathing al fresco. And the in-house dining options already have the venue tipped as a local hotspot. In the daytime head downstairs to kodo cafe, perfect for frothed matcha, yuzu pastries and a miso olive oil cake that's to die for. Or visit their evening restaurant for an authentic nigiri and sashimi, wood-fired ribs and oyster mushrooms, or a melt-on-yourtongue Basque cheesecake. Set as it is within DTLA's Arts District, it's a stone's throw from

cultural institutions like Soho Warehouse. H I orenzo Archive and Hauser & Wirth Gallery - all very LA, even if your hotel is more Tokyo.









INNESS, NEW YORK

This upstate getaway in Accord is perfect for switching off. Choose between a cabin or farmhouse room - both with a stripped-back, rustic design - or explore all 90 hectares of the resort's hilly grounds, complete with 650m² spa.



THE PRINCE AKATOKI, LONDON

This central spot blends luxe with Japanese design, all wood panelling, cherry blossoms and taupe walls. The in-room amenities also keep to theme, including a traditional tea set for your own tea ceremony.



57 NORD, SCOTLAND

Two boutique cabins make up this serene getaway on Scotland's East Coast - Hill House and Sky House. Inspired by both Scandinavian and Scottish design, both offer total immersion in nature via panoramic windows.

VEGGING OUT IN LONDON

This isn't your nonna's lasagne – London restaurant **PLATES** turns plants into something sublime

Great British Menu will know Kirk Haworth well. The son of Northcote chef Nigel Haworth, Kirk first competed in 2021 and made a triumphant return this year with his A Taste of Unity dessert. Made in homage to the Olympics, ingredients in the raw cacao gateaux represent five continents. The twist? It's totally plant based, as is the rest of the menu at his new Shoreditch restaurant, Plates, Settling into a serene, stylish space after starting life as an itinerant pop-up, the concept - an all-vegan tasting menu - is a hit with diners, who have booked it out well into next year. Haworth turned to a vegetable-forward diet after being diagnosed with Lyme disease and threw himself into understanding plants. The flavours here - creative and almost postmodern in the way they deconstruct each ingredient are a result of the chef's journey of enlightenment. Take the deceivingly named lasagne: a delicate parcel of mung and urad beans with a creamy miso and chive sauce, flanked by a single Tokyo turnip and cucumber. Or the house-laminated sourdough. shaped into a flaky, kouign-amannlike muffin and served with mintgreen spirulina butter. They all add up to the feeling that something great has taken root.

spresso martinis are all well and good. But leading mixologists

agree they can't hold a candle to chai for sheer spicy complexity or saucy textural intrigue. Take the Chai Whisky Whisper at Bar Serene, Toronto, with JP Wiser's 10-year-old whisky, egg white and lemon. The Kulcha (right),

at Soma in London's Soho, blends 12-year-old Aberfeldy and Stauning rye whisky with clarified chai and Indian spices. The Chai Pani at Bungalow in NYC has full-fat milk. Old Monk Indian rum. ginger and cardamom. The name literally means "tea water". Perfect for getting in your cups.

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

five brand-new fully themed worlds, a new 500room hotel with special park access and 50 new experiences for guests. When UNIVERSAL EPIC UNIVERSE opens at UNIVERSAL ORLANDO on 22 May, it will more than double the amusement park's footprint and mark the company's fourth theme park to open in Orlando since 1999.

Anyone who's ever got lost in Universal Orlando's existing theme parks - those include UNIVERSAL STUDIOS FLORIDA, UNIVERSAL ISLANDS OF ADVENTURE and UNIVERSAL VOLCANO BAY - will certainly want a navigation aid in this new 300-hectare park that's the biggest of them all and expected to draw more than six million visitors in its first 12 months. Among Universal Epic Universe's brand-new worlds are THE WIZARDING WORLD OF HARRY POTTER: MINISTRY OF MAGIC, HOW TO TRAIN YOUR DRAGON - ISLE OF BERK, complete with water ride and family roller coaster, and SUPER NINTENDO WORLD, where you can cosplay as Mario

in an augmented reality dark ride, MARIO KART: BOWSER'S CHALLENGE.

All of these worlds and more are easily reachable via the UNIVERSAL **HELIOS GRAND HOTEL**, a Loews Hotel. The 500-room property anchors the park, offering direct access exclusively for guests, and will be proceeded by two other Universal hotel openings early this year. All this comes on the heels of the autumn 2024 unveiling of the immersive WICKED: THE **EXPERIENCE** at Universal Studios Florida and 2023's debut of MINION **LAND** at the same park.

And while Epic Universe is certainly expected to give Orlando's other parks a run for their money and crowds, competitors have hardly been slouching when it comes to new attractions. In late 2024, Disney's Imagineers debuted TIANA'S BAYOU ADVENTURE, a log flume-like ride that replaced Magic Kingdom's Splash Mountain and has a 15m drop; it's great for a scorching Florida day, as getting soaked is an inevitability. TRON LIGHTCYCLE RUN, which opened at Magic Kingdom in 2023, is still that park's biggest rush and one of the fastest coasters of any Disney theme park. It propels riders, positioned as if on a motorcycle, at speeds up to 95km/h along 914m of twisting and turning indoor/outdoor track.

SEAWORLD ORLANDO's latest debut, PENGUIN TREK, fills a gap in the family coaster niche (the height requirement is just one metre) within the park's Antarctica realm. Opened last year, it has kids face a snowmobile-themed rollick that

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includes a dark stretch and two launches at speeds of up to 70km/h. PIPELINE: THE SURF COASTER opened at SeaWorld

in 2023 and was designed to give riders the feel of catching a massive wave if that wave propelled you at 96km/h and some 34m in the air. And AQUATICA. SeaWorld's waterpark offering, upgraded its original kid's area at the park in 2023 with TURI'S KID COVE.

where little ones can run wild among tipping buckets and spraying jets.

Look for big things from **LEGOLAND** FLORIDA RESORT in 2025, too, with the inauguration of the SEA LIFE FLORIDA aquarium, the park's biggest opening since 2022's PEPPA PIG WORLD.

The immersive experience is being touted as a "theme park under the

sea" and has a reef-inspired Ferris wheel, coral palace and invertebrate touch pool. Some 25 exhibits will replicate watery habitats that include Florida's as well as Pacific, Indian and Southern Ocean environments. An underwater tunnel allows marine life to swim around visitors and ogle right back. But more low-key attractions are designed to captivate, too, like a seahorse gallery where you can watch the magical little creatures motor around with their miniscule fins. After all, the wow moments come big and small in Orlando.

Are fight clubs real?

Do we just not know about the sort of brutal bashes featured in Dev Patel's *Monkey Man*, thanks to those famous first two rules, asks Ralph Jones?

► IN 1999, FIGHT CLUB INVENTED FIGHTING.

Before the film (Brad Pitt, Edward Norton, you're probably familiar), people existed in sweet harmony with one another and fighting was a foreign concept. When the film came out, people realised that their fists were capable of punching other people, and that's exactly what they started doing.

While this might not be strictly true, the film was seminal in introducing the concept of underground fight clubs to the world – and real fight clubs sprung up in its wake. Dev Patel's *Monkey Man* is the latest movie to take pleasure in the conceit, with Patel's character, Kid, who works in an underground fight club, desperate to get revenge on a man who killed his mother.

But what you're wondering is: are underground fight clubs real? Do these sweaty dens of bare-knuckle iniquity exist in real life?

The answer is a resounding yes. Whether inspired by Fight Club or not, people love the idea of trying to beat up strangers, preferably with an audience. It goes back hundreds of years. Until 1743, boxing matches were basically unregulated street fights. What happened in 1743? Bare-knuckle boxer Jack Broughton implemented rules because he'd killed a man two years earlier and didn't want the same thing happening again.

Generally, the illegal element of fight clubs is the money changing hands. Very broadly speaking, it is in fact technically legal to run a fight club if no one is paying to watch and fighters aren't being paid. Some fight clubs are branded "underground" in a bid to look edgy. While there are plenty of these examples – King of the Streets in Sweden; Rumble in the Bronx in New York – real underground fight clubs abide by the first and second rules of Fight Club, which, to



paraphrase, means not putting your fights up on YouTube (and binning your boxing gloves).

More legitimate – or less legitimate, if you see what I mean – was a secretive San Francisco operation run by someone called Bloody Knuckles. This was a bona fide fight club in the early 2000s; like Fight Club, there was no crowd, only fellow fighters. And, in the late 90s, while the still-

fringe Mixed Martial Arts league in New York existed in a shady legal grey area,

places like Underground Combat League thrived, with chaotic fights happening in a different location every time.

Since then, fighting has become a colossal industry, with UFC and MMA going mainstream and "fight clubs" picking up millions of views online. These comparatively safe operations mean the spotlight isn't shining on the real fight clubs run in basements and warehouses. They also

tell us that the desire for people to gather and punch is probably an impossible one to supress. Chances are there's an underground fight club in your hometown – you just haven't been invited yet.

VERDICT: Yes, but they're not on Instagram.

'Bel Can-do'

ACKIE

is a phenomenally talented actor. This might seem an obvious statement to make about one of Hollywood's brightest rising stars, but it bears repeating - she's really that good.

As wannabe-murderer Bonnie in ultra-dark comedy The End of the F***ing World, she plumbed the depths of pain and desperation. As Alicia, in the third season of Aziz Ansari's Master of None, she revealed the torments and triumphs of undergoing IVF treatment. And as Hazel in Education (part of director Steve McQueen's anthology film series, Small Axe) she radiated goodness in the bleak landscape of the 70s British school system.

These are stand-out performances that might have catapulted other actors to global fame. But Naomi Ackie is not (yet) a household name. "Fame - blah, blah, blah. Not interested," she says, over Zoom. "Sometimes I'm like, 'I need bigger things, I need to get paid more.' But that's a really normal human thing... My baseline is, can I afford to pay my bills? Can I go on a nice holiday? And I'm privileged enough to say I can do all of those things. Like, I've managed to make a living out of acting, which is insane to me."

This humility goes some way to explaining why Ackie isn't the face of some giant film franchise. She's almost been cast in a Marvel movie, twice, but it didn't work out -"Thank goodness, because I wouldn't have been able to do the work that I've done... I don't want to do those [sorts of





roles] until I'm satisfied with what I'm capable of, and I'm never satisfied with what I'm capable of." Instead she has chosen to appear in films and TV series that are deliberately wonky - playing with convention and expectation in exciting and often moving ways, even if they end up being cult classics rather than mainstream hits. "I'm such a big fan of films that aren't predictable," she says. "Of an audience being taken for a ride."

Next up for Ackie in that line is Mickey 17 - a twisty sci-fi from Parasite director Bong Joon-ho in which she plays opposite Robert Pattinson and his many clones. "I can't give

anything away," she says with a big laugh. The film is a refreshingly bonkers take on a classic sci-fi trope. It is unlike anything else you've seen in the cinema and Ackie is, of course, fantastic in it. Not that she would agree. "I never really come away from watching a performance being like, 'F***ing hell, Nav. vou are one talented actress." How would she feel if she met her clone. I wonder? "I'd be like, 'Oh, that's how people see me.' Because the way we see ourselves is not how people see us.

"As an actor, you're faced with your face a lot," she continues. "The truth is, sometimes I see my face on things and I'm like, 'Oh f***, oh I look shit.' And then sometimes I see my face and I'm like, 'Oh my



God, Nay, you're a hottie!" She thinks some more. "I've always wondered what it feels like to be celebrated as one of these 'it girls'. I'm not an 'it girl', I will never be an 'it girl'. I am just an actor. Sometimes I have aspirations. But also, you know, I wake up to myself every morning - I know the truth."

This is how Ackie speaks - she's self-reflexive, frequently plays down her looks or talent, howls with laughter

> at the end of most sentences and doesn't seem to take anything too seriously. "It's only acting - it's what my mum used to say. It's only acting, mate, you're not saving any lives!" Cue another fit of giggles.

> She's speaking to me from Atlanta, where she's filming yet another project that she describes as a "mind bender", and arrives on the call fresh from a workout. The gym is one of her safe places - physical strength has become a way of dealing with the industry. "It's like my body is trained to hold this amount of stress and unpredictability," she says. "A lot of it is problematic."

> Ackie's big break was supposed to have arrived in 2022, when she took on the perhaps insurmountable challenge of playing Whitney Houston in the biopic *I Wanna* Dance with Somebody. At the time, pop biopics were big business for Hollywood, not to mention

obvious Oscar bait. But, unfortunately for Ackie, her moment arrived after the trend had crested. She was lauded for her performance, but the film fell flat.

"It was a bumpy ride," she grimaces. "I just remember a lot of anxiety around that film."

What made it so difficult? "The big part of it was the fact that I was hungry. I lost 30 pounds for the role. So, you know, when you don't eat a lot of food you don't feel very good. There was the real pressure of: this is the first lead role I've had in a film, the fan base is huge, if this goes wrong I could destroy my career... [I felt] full of fear and doubt and hunger. I laugh about it, but I was so hungry dude! Like, I'm not naturally skinny at all; my muscles wasted away. I can really say that I will never push my body to that degree ever again."

Ackie was born in London and grew up in Walthamstow in the east of the





city. Her mother, who worked for the NHS, died suddenly aged just 49 almost the same age as Whitney. That tragedy inspired Ackie to summon the spirit of the late singer. Yet, somehow, it was not the right role, or perhaps not the right time.

A better fit was her follow up, Blink Twice - the directorial debut of Zoë Kravitz. Ackie plays Frida, a young woman who finds herself trapped in paradise with an enigmatic

billionaire. It's a horror-comedy in the style of Get Out that subverts expectations around female victimhood, and also a rare film with a Black female lead that is not about race - not explicitly, at least.

"There are layers and shades of being a Black woman within that context that are different to being a white woman, without making it about race per se," she says. Does she prefer roles that aren't embroiled in racial politics? "I have no control most of the time. Because of what I look like, the jobs I do will be politicised in one way or another, and that is sometimes f***ing difficult. I just want to tell a f***ing story, can we not make this about race?

"My new pet peeve is people using the word 'woke' instead of being like: oh, there's a Black person or an Asian person in this film and I'm not happy about it," she continues. "I get really irate about that because I'm not woke, I'm just Black. I see things differently to how you see them because our worlds are different - it doesn't make yours untrue, it doesn't make mine untrue. It's just different and if you don't have the space for it just don't f***ing watch it! This is why I'll never be a big old movie star!" She breaks out into another roar of infectious laughter.

We chat some more about Zoë Kravitz - daughter of singer Lenny Kravitz and actor Lisa Bonet - who Ackie admires tremendously for her perseverance in getting the project made. I ask her what she makes of the "nepo baby" label. "People get a bit butt-hurt about it, but also I think maybe we're looking at the wrong thing," she considers. "If one day, when I have kids, one of them turns to me and goes, 'Mum, I really want to be an actor,' I'm going

to pull out all the stops to make sure that happens. In the same way that if that same child said, 'I want to be a gardener,' I'd want to make that happen. I don't think it's that controversial, really.

"I think what we're really talking about is privilege. The gatekeepers of the industry - whoever



they are, faceless as they are - have put such a pin on allowing a variety of voices to tell their stories."

Ackie can trace this to her own experience. "I grew up in Walthamstow, I'm the child of children of immigrants. it's kind of a miracle that I'm where I am. How long does it take to do that? It takes a long time when you have no access. It's ultimately about realising we are all under the thumb of someone else and someone else's decisions and we spend a lot of time looking horizontally and we should really be looking up there."

Ackie looks skyward. She's been through a lot and knows she'll probably have to go through a lot more. Her faith in what she's doing is "tested constantly," she says. "The self-doubt is a constant buzz in my head: am I doing this right? Did I say yes to the right thing? How are people going to receive this? I've almost gotten used to it.'

But she is strong, no doubt about it. Physically and mentally. I would love to see her clamber to the top of the pile in Hollywood, but it would also be great if she made a few more mind-bending movies before that.





Laughter is the best medicine, so the adage goes. But a bunch of performers, therapists and activists want us to take humour's healing power more literally, finds Estella Shardlow

Belly laughs booming out of yoga studios, psychologists prescribing circus arts to burnt-out patients and therapy-themed stand-up sets - comedy and self-care are cosying up in a host of unexpected new ways. It's all part of growing, global awareness around levity's ability to boost our wellbeing, whether it's the physical act of laughter or the catharsis of poking fun at even our most serious problems. Could comedy be the collective exhalation we all need this year? It's looking like yukking it up is set to be 2025's hottest pursuit - here's how to titter your way into



optimal health.



CLOWNS ARE NO LONGER confined to the Big Top but treading the boards of highbrow theatres. These nextgen performers aren't of the creepy, red-nosed Pennywise variety. Estonian-born, UK-based JULIA MASLI is

a posterchild for clowning's new cool. Her surreal agony-aunt routine Ha ha ha ha ha ha won rave reviews in New York last year before transferring to London's Soho Theatre (until 11 January). "There's a healing element to the archetype of the trickster," says Masli. "By embracing failure, clowns allow us to accept that we're imperfect as humans." A skilled mime artist - at times wielding a mannequin's leg for an arm - she sidles up to audience members and coos "Problem?", then sets out to tackle their woes with a skilful blend of silliness and sensitivity.

Another next-gen jester is VIGGO **VENN** (left), whose hi-vis jacket and electric-shock hair may be familiar from Britain's Got Talent (he won the 2023 edition). Touring the UK in February, his madcap antics don't delve into matters of mental health per se, but he's also worked as a hospital clown in his native Norway, cheering up poorly kids. Going to even greater lengths to heal through humour, the charity Clowns Without Borders sends performers into conflict zones and crisis-hit communities.



SOMETIMES YOGA CLASSES CAN feel a little po-faced and perfectionist - a silent studio full of impossibly bendy, Lululemon-clad limbs. Not so with laughter yoga. Instead of your usual downward dogs or warrior poses, this playful practice blends pranayama breathwork (Lion's Breath is a classic: open your mouth wide, stick out your tongue and release a loud "ha") and physical exercises like chanting, clapping and mime that get groups in a lighthearted, childlike mood. The merriment might be forced at first, but watching equally goofy-looking classmates (eye contact is encouraged) soon makes you get the giggles for real. Spreading far beyond its Mumbai birthplace - where it was created by Dr Madan Kataria in 1995 - more than 5,000 laughter yoga clubs have sprung up worldwide, from Toronto to California. 



Laughing meditation is an accessible form of self-care that falls into two halves: first, laughter, followed by silent reflection. Let the laughter reverberate, "focusing on sending the sound inward, to the throat, abdomen, heart, lungs," says American multi-instrumentalist **LARAAJI** (right), who has delivered his seriously playful laughter meditation workshops everywhere from Sydney to LA. a single spot in the undergrowth, no more than a couple of metres from where we are standing, having left our 4x4 at the end of a narrow track some distance away. Butterflies delight in the sun's warmth despite the early hour, while heavy droplets of water crash through the tree canopy, falling irregularly onto wide leaves with the slap of a drumstick striking a tom-tom. Nearby, a scratching sound catches our attention and I put down my telephoto lens to admire the quartet of sharp, curved claws gripping at the bark of the nearest tree. Knowing eyes lock with our own, before an explosive burst of birdsong confirms our quarry's presence.

We're not on an African safari, but in the Caribbean, on St Lucia, an island known in conservation circles for its endemic species - creatures found nowhere else. The animal we're seeking isn't a member of the Big Five - Africa's most iconic large mammals - but the endemic St Lucia black finch, one of the island's newly established Small Six.

"The island is too young for big game," concedes life-

long conservationist Adams Toussaint, the brainchild behind the Small Six list, as we cut along a sheer-sided mountain ridge created by the same volcanic eruptions that formed the island nation long after the North American continent had come into being.

However, that doesn't mean wildlife fans should head back to their beachside sun loungers disappointed. "As a biodiversity hot-

spot people can come and appreciate how biodiverse it is, and what a high level of endemics there is. We're still discovering new endemism." Toussaint continues.

With a characteristically wide smile surrounded by a lightly greying goatee, and a monoscope attached to a tripod slung over his left shoulder, Toussaint is clearly in his element, even when we reach the uneven stones of the Des Cartiers Trail. Deep within Quilesse Forest Reserve - one of eight such protected areas on the 616km2 long lenses on

island - the trail forms part of a two centuries-old roadway constructed under French rule to connect its south and west by way of its crumpled and forested interior.

Remarkably, 70% of St Lucia remains forested and so the Small Six reflects this, including six species - three birds and three reptiles – that reside in areas like Quilesse. This list is not yet final, the array of possible species making Toussaint's ultimate decision all the harder, but when I visit it includes the black finch, Amazon (jacquot) parrot, oriole, whiptail lizard, threadsnake and pygmy gecko.

I nervously ask about the chance of seeing the rainbow-hued jacquot, a notoriously shy parrot, only for Toussaint to reply matter-of-factly, "In Des Cartiers you're guaranteed to see them." And he should know, having been born and brought up in the small rural community of Fond Assau nearby. Even so, it wasn't until the devastating effects of 1980's Hurricane Allen, 45 years ago this year, that Toussaint considered a career in conservation.

"I was just out of school and a lot of the island was in recovery. I was hired to manage the chainsaw clean-up crew. I did that for one year, then I got the opportunity to do some more study, in forestry." Thus began a career that took him from forest ranger to the government's chief forestry officer.







On retiring from his government job in 2018 at 55, he decided to commit full time to his passion for wildlife and photography, setting up a tour company – St Lucia

Birding and Wildlife Ambassadors – to lead visitors away from the beaches and into the island's forest reserves. "It's always a pleasure to guide, so I'm looking forward to this new safari challenge and the chance to show more visitors around our beautiful island," he says.

Our conversation is cut short by a loud fluttering from a nearby tree hollow, the preferred nesting spot for jacquots. "There, there, I just saw one." He points out a jacquot taking flight to a pip-pip backing track of tree frogs. Following the direction of its flight path, we move as silently as possible up the trail's muddy track to a natural break in the tree cover, providing a window over the valley below. Setting down his tripod, he points to a gently swaying branch cluttered with leaves, where a jacquot busies itself preening a mate, before they take to the air in tandem, echoing each other's moves without any apparent effort.

Hurricane Allen was also a life-changing – or perhaps lifesaving – moment for the jacquot. Already in significant

decline in the 1970s due to a combination of habitat loss, hunting and the international pet trade, the further decline caused by the hurricane's sustained wind speeds of 305km/h – still the strongest ever recorded in the Atlantic – triggered a campaign to save the island's national bird. Today, there are upwards of

2,000 - sometimes difficult to find - adults. "I'm sure they're sitting there, but unless they move, they blend in; their shape is the same as the leaf," says Toussaint, as we pause beneath the strong tall form of a 40-year-old

in orchids.

Their Technicolor feathers – jungle green, with impressionistic daubs of blue and red – are striking, but their beauty wasn't enough to get the jacquot onto Toussaint's

magnolia tree spotted

Small Six shortlist, which was chosen for each species' character, alongside its endemism and scarcity. The rarest of all, however, is the threadsnake.

"It's something I bump into sometimes," Toussaint says nonchalantly, scuffing at the damp leaf litter, the threadsnake's usual habitat, with a boot. He grabs a fallen stick and sorts through soft yellow roots and thread-like fungal hyphae of pure white, but turns up only an earthworm. The wriggling

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invertebrate looks like the small, slender reptile but, alas, we won't be seeing the elusive serpent today.

"We used to think it was the black finch that was rarest. but now we've learned more about their habits." Toussaint says of the goth-like, jet-black bird. He tells me that the black finch is monospecific - in other words, the only species in its genus. It's a biologist's

way of saying that not only is the black finch very rare, but unusual too, being unrelated to any other bird on the island. "It's an evolutionary mystery."

"Very rare" is a phrase Toussaint uses throughout our two-day safari experience. Over the course of our trek, I get to know why the wildlife of St Lucia is so inimitable, whether that's glimpsing the pygmy gecko's striped back before it disappears into a tiny burrow, finally catching sight of the wasp-like colouration of the St Lucia oriole after hours of searching, or jumping from a small speedboat into the shallows around Praslin Island - as warm as bathwater and as clear as glass. This tiny speck of land on St Lucia's east coast - struck by a succession of low Atlantic breakers peeling away from

an offshore reef - is the only place it's currently possible to encounter the whiptail, locally known as the zandoli tè, a lizard growing to a length of 35cm.

Saved from the brink of extinction after decades of predation by non-endemic species such as mongoose brought to St Lucia from southeast Asia during British rule, the whiptail was limited to an area of just nine hectares before 10 pairs were transferred to the predator-free island in 2000.

Twenty-five years on, their future is as bright as the cerulean hue that covers the slender tails of mature males. Around 200 individuals are now thought to bask on Praslin's warm rocks, and it's only a few seconds after stepping onto

> the island that we encounter these strange-looking reptiles, the largest the length of my forearm, with mismatched markings of spotted flanks and soft yellow bellies.

> into the Serengeti National Park in Tanzania 24 times over might not seem like the obvious place for a safari. But, as Toussaint says as another brightly coloured male pauses for our admiration, "We have so many unique species - the Small Six is supposed to be like a flagship." And so, once the reptile scurries away, we press on – deeper into the dense forest that covers this tiny island like a cloud, to spot more whiptails or just

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



IF YOU'RE GOING to stay in NYC, you may as well do it properly. 




