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

MONSTER **MOVIES ARE** LOOKING GOOD

Once crushingly expensive to produce, advances in tech mean the monster genre is in rude health, says Al Horner

him, Godzilla looks great for his age. Like some sort of atomic lizard version of Paul Rudd, the Japanese icon turns 70 this year but is in better shape than ever, with nary a wrinkle on those skyscraper-demolishing scales of his and no signs of checking into a Kaiju retirement home just yet. In fact, quite the contrary. Last year was Godzilla's biggest and busiest vet, teaming up with another iconic movie monster in the ludicrously fun Godzilla x Kong: The New Empire (available on today's in-flight entertainment) and winning an Oscar with Godzilla Minus One, a moody Japanese-language thriller set in post-WWII Tokyo that snagged Best Visual Effects. Sadly the beast himself didn't appear at the ceremony to give an acceptance speech. I guess it's tricky finding a tux that fits when you're 120m tall.

Godzilla is a reptile in remarkably rude health, in part because the monster movie genre as a whole is enjoying a fantastic purple patch. From the megashark of The Meg franchise to the alien of Nope, creature features have been abundant of late, with many more on the way. This summer sees new Quiet Place and Alien extravaganzas smash into cinemas, before next year brings new Wolfman, Cloverfield and Jurassic Park films. The monsters of these films might not quite be Godzilla-sized in stature or icon-status, but they're proof that snarling CGI teeth have never been more in-demand

Monster movies are nothing new in fact, they've always been a fixture at our multiplexes, in part because of their habit of embodying contemporary fears. Godzilla was created as Japan processed the horrors of Hiroshima - a city-flattening metaphor for the destruction wrought by nuclear war.

Cloverfield was an avatar for the atrocities of 9/11. What's different today is both the frequency of monster movies and the size of set-pieces within. It used to be that effects-heavy spectacles were crushingly expensive to make, limiting creature features to a handful a year. Now, thanks to advances in technology, they're much cheaper for directors to dream up and actualise

on-screen: Godzilla x Kong was made on a budget of US\$135 million, roughly half that spent on 1998's Godzilla movie (\$280m adjusted for inflation). Godzilla Minus One, even more impressively. was created on a budget of just \$15m. In 2024, the only limitations when it comes to monster movies are directors' imaginations - which is bad news for CGI skyscrapers but great news for us Kaiju connoisseurs.

"I learned so much from **Jodie Foster**"

True Detective: Night Country was only boxerturned-actor KALI REIS's third acting job and her performance is knockout

to cut an intimidating figure on screen and she isn't just acting tough. The 37 year old from Rhode Island has no fewer than six world championship boxing titles to her name, so whenever she looks like she's about to knock someone out in the gruesome and gripping *True* Detective: Night Country, you can rest assured she definitely could.

Reis may still be a relative newcomer to acting, with the latest instalment of the mystery anthology series representing just her third-ever credit, but you'd never guess that from her intense and compelling performance. Clearly Reis's mother, a medicine woman in the Seaconke Wampanoag tribe, was onto something when she gave her daughter the name "Mequinonoag", meaning "many feathers" or "many talents".

In Night Country, from writerdirector Issa López, Reis is sensational as Evangeline Navarro, a state trooper with divided loyalties who teams up with Jodie Foster's cantankerous police chief Liz Danvers to uncover the truth behind eight

baffling deaths at an Arctic research station. Reis, who's now safely back at home with her French bulldog Quincy Bones, tells Vera about the similarities between boxing and acting, getting in the (metaphorical) ring with a two-time Oscar winner and why for her next trick she just wants to make you laugh.

You grew up in Rhode Island - is it worth a visit?

Definitely. We have the best seafood. I would recommend Iggy's, in Warwick on Oakland Beach. They have the best clam cakes and chowder.

How did you start out in a boxing ring?

I was the youngest of five kids in a single-parent household, but boxing wasn't something my brothers did. I loved *Rocky*. I wanted to be either Rocky or Bruce Lee. I got really interested around 10 or 11. It seemed far-fetched until I got wind that a friend of my mother's used to box and I started bugging him. I was persistent, so eventually he came to my house, showed me some things, and hung up a heavy bag so I could practise.

What's been your proudest achievement as a boxer?

I won my first world title after I got into a bad motorcycle accident in 2012 and was told I shouldn't box any more. Two years after that I fought for the IBA middleweight title in Bermuda against a fighter who was supposed to be a beast. It was during Native American History Month, in a place that had been a slave port for my actual ancestors, the Wampanoag people from the East Coast. So given all that it became like a ceremonial thing, and

I pummelled that girl from pillar to post.

When did you start acting?

I was approached on Instagram! By that point I had three major world titles and I was making some waves in women's boxing. I took it upon myself to talk about and represent the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls movement, which is an issue we don't see in mainstream media. The director, Josef Kubota Wladyka, was just finding out about the subject, so he messaged me and asked if I'd ever thought about acting. We worked on *Catch the Fair One* together. We just wanted to get the story out there, we never thought I'd end up nominated for an Independent Spirit Award.

Are there any lessons from boxing that helped you as an actor?

It's important to be able to take direction, whether that's from a coach or a director. You have to trust that somebody can see something you don't see, and then process that information

and apply it really fast.

What did you think when you first read the *True Detective: Night Country* script?

I was like, "Oh snap, this is good!" It made me want to live in [writer-director] Issa's brain for a day! When she first contacted me, I didn't know it was for *True Detective*. I found out just before the audition. I was such a fan of the previous seasons. After getting to read the pilot episode I was like, "This is dope! Are they ready to send me the next one?"

How was it going toe-to-toe with two-time Oscar winner Jodie Foster?

I learned so much from her, just from being in the presence of someone who's mastered so many different facets of this industry: acting, directing, producing, writing. The biggest thing she taught me was not to take everything so seriously. I'm an athletic-brained Virgo. I have to perfect everything. Her attitude was more like, "Hey, we'll figure it out."

What's next for you?

I've been filming a sci-fi thriller called *Mercy* with Chris Pratt and Rebecca Ferguson. It's a take on what everyday life could look like in the very near future, involving AI, so it's very interesting. Boxing-wise I haven't officially hung up my gloves, but I'm not forcing anything. Acting is definitely number one on the call sheet right now. I want to do a rom com – and my dream is to host *Saturday Night Live*.

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

lady" appear on screen is like seeing an old friend. Just a glimpse of that robed icon and you know you're in for a good couple of hours. What was once a small, low-budget production studio is now the third-largest film company in the world, responsible for such classics as Funny Girl, Men in Black and Ghostbusters.

On Columbia Pictures' 100th anniversary proper, publisher Assouline is celebrating "the little studio that could" with a new coffee-table book, Columbia Pictures: 100 Years of Cinema. Bestselling author Sam Wasson takes readers on an epic, century-long journey that begins in 1918, when the company - then known as CBC - began production on its first, \$20,000 film, More to be Pitied Than Scorned, and explores how Columbia, by shifting focus to screwball comedies in the 1930s, rose from scrappy underdog to one of the "Little Three", competing with the "Big Five"

studios during Hollywood's Golden Age. It was all up from there, as the studio system collapsed and Columbia rose from the ashes. The book examines the role of the studio's controversial founder, Harry Cohn, whose emphasis on speed and simplicity ensured Columbia's longevity.

Movie buffs can marvel over exclusive photography of Columbia's original studio, vintage film posters, and stills of actors and directors larking about on set. Prepare to be left with a newfound appreciation for the scrappy studio that built itself from the ground up, the light of which shows no signs of dimming. Just don't

bother thanking them. In the words of Cohn himself: "The word 'gratitude' isn't part of the Hollywood dictionary."






omantic and gently paced, *Three of Us* is an Indian drama about

Yann Couvreur already has patisseries on multiple continents. For his first proper US opening he chose party-hard, fun-time Miami. Why? "Pleasure," he's fond of saying, is his "only guide". In addition to some agreeably Gallic patisserie staples – coconut framboise raspberry cake, crab mille-feuille whipped up to order tableside - Yann Couvreur Miami is delighting local denizens with a downright formidable brunch. Get a load of his Oeufs à la Coque, soft-boiled eggs with brioche toast and caviar. But if you only get one thing, plump for the Mi-cuit au Chocolat, pictured, "Mi-cuit" means "part cooked" - a chocolate and vanilla caramel confection with a dash of salt judiciously balancing a molten centre. No wonder it's selling like hot cakes.



One of London's favourite chefs, Margot Henderson opens **THE THREE HORSESHOES**, a pub with rooms in a delicious slice of the West Country

restaurants. Kiwi chef Margot Henderson is an icon. She is known for Rochelle Canteen - a Shoreditch landmark beloved for its exquisite. simple dishes – as well as her avuncular presence on the scene. So it's a real boon to the tiny town of Batcombe. Somerset, that the chef has moved in, taking over a 17th-century pub called The Three Horseshoes. It's in a corner of the southwest that's drawn several London chefs in recent vears, including Merlin Labron-Johnson, who heads Osip and The Old Pharmacy down the road in Bruton, It's no wonder the Big Smoke's cooking elite are descending on this idyllic place -Henderson herself has praised the abundance of smallholder farmers in the area, saying "everyone has a Tamworth or a bed of asparagus they want to sell". In the restaurant - with its heavy beams and flagstone floor - Henderson showcases the ingredients she's picked up from neighbouring growers, each hispi cabbage and parsnip treated with her signature stripped-back reverence. The menu is ever-changing, but mainstays like rabbit

pie and treacle tart hint at the strawhatted Britishness at its heart. Upstairs, the five guest rooms are kitted out simply and some look out onto the crabtree-dotted courtyard: a vision of the English countryside that's meant to be sayoured.









THE CULPEPER, LONDON

The snug but stylish rooms in this 1880s-built pub are on the second floor, sandwiched between the excellent first-floor restaurant and the rooftop bar, where you can sup herbal cocktails with a view of the impressive gardens.



WYNN LAS VEGAS, LAS VEGAS

More of a small city than a hotel, this gargantuan tower houses 20 dining experiences, some of them among the best in the city – The Buffet at Wynn Las Vegas, for one, and Japanese fine-diner Mizumi.



JOALI, MALDIVES

There are four distinct dining experiences in this luxury island resort: Saoke's Japanese-Peruvian in an overwater villa; cicchetti and Italian cocktails at Bellinis; pan-Asian on the beach at Vandhoo; and Levantine plates at Tuh'u.



FOR ALL THE ROLLER COASTERS,

costumed characters and virtual-reality adventures on tap in Orlando, the city offers a surprisingly cultured side for those who seek it out. When you're ready to give the family a break from park-hopping, there's surely a gallery, installation, concert or comedy club to make everyone smile here in Florida's third-largest metropolitan area.

"One of the things that surprises people who visit is how global we are," says Jennifer Evins, president and CEO of United Arts of Central Florida, a non-profit organisation that works to champion the arts in Orange County. "We have a huge cultural scene that celebrates cultures from around the world because people from all around the world live here."

Decamp from the theme-park corridor to head just north to downtown Orlando, where the 2.700-seat DR PHILLIPS CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS, the city's main performing arts centre, regularly welcomes touring Broadway and Disney shows

(often before much of the rest of the country gets them, too). JUDSON'S LIVE, an intimate jazz venue with just 150 seats, opened within the centre in early 2024 and has an ongoing live music brunch series that pairs Latin, R&B and soul performers with themed menus for a morning out that locals love. For laughs all can enjoy, SAK COMEDY LAB is a longstanding downtown Orlando favourite where a professional ensemble of improv actors regularly takes the stage.

A few miles north of downtown Orlando, in the 18-hectare, lake-dot-

ted LOCH HAVEN CULTURAL PARK, museums of all sorts and for all ages await - all within a few minutes' walking distance from each other. Kids with a burning curiosity get a kick out of the ORLANDO FIRE MUSEUM, an original 1920s-era red-brick firehouse complete with sliding fire poles and beautifully restored engines. It's staffed by retired volunteer firefighters and free to visit. Stroll five minutes from there to the interactive ORLANDO SCIENCE CENTER, where "Life" - a new \$13.5 million attraction a decade in the making that opened in spring - spotlights conservation stories from swamp, ocean and rainforest environments. Expect squeals of delight elicited by the free-roaming live animals: sloths, sun conure parrots and golden-headed lion tamarins.

Art figures big here, too. THE ORLANDO MUSEUM OF ART celebrates its centennial this year - don't miss its extensive collection of 19th- and 20th-century American and African works. THE MENNELLO MUSEUM OF AMERICAN ART, meanwhile, has an

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impressive permanent collection that includes a large showing from famed American folk artist Earl Cunningham (he spent the last decades of his life in the coastal city of St Augustine).

Just north of downtown Orlando, nearby WINTER PARK's Park Avenue is where you'll find the incredible CHARLES HOSMER MORSE MUSEUM, housing the largest collection of art glass works by Louis Comfort Tiffany (of Tiffany leaded-glass lamp fame), including exquisite jewellery and a chapel interior from the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago.

Three miles (5km) north of there is **EATONVILLE.** the oldest all-Black town in the United States. There you'll find the zora neale hurston national MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS, which pays

tribute through fine artworks by artists of African descent to the author of Their Eyes Were Watching God, who was born here.

On your way back to the land of theme parks, treat the kids to a stop at the LAKE NONA SCULPTURE GARDEN. Its sculptures may be massive - take in Arturo di Modica's mighty Charging Bull - but the grassy setting still has plenty of room to run around. Consider popping into the TITANIC MUSEUM, too, to see more than 300 artefacts from the doomed vessel. You can even opt to sit down for a re-enactment dinner (don't worry, this meal ends with dessert).

As Jennifer Evins says: "You can come here any time and find something going on that really captures the diversity, international flair and talents of the people who live in Orlando."

EVERMORE ORLANDO RESORT

Could Isteal ancient artefacts?

In La Chimera, Josh O'Connor helps himself to priceless artefacts from archaeological sites - but is this a real-life possibility? asks Ralph Jones

of cash and wondered about visiting a site of great historical significance in the hope of stealing an ancient treasure, you're not alone. Archaeological looting - the practice of illegally removing specimens from archaeological sites - is a billion-pound industry.

In La Chimera, Josh O'Connor plays a former archaeological scholar who falls in with a gang of grave robbers to plunder Etruscan antiquities in 1980s Tuscany. The question is - how difficult would this be in real life?

Dr Marta Andriiovych works at the University of Oxford's School of Archaeology. "The topic is super complicated," she says. "Each country has its own laws about heritage and preservation of natural heritage." One national quirk, for example, is that in some US states you own anything you find under the earth on your private property. In numerous other places, the government owns specimens dug up from beneath the ground - making it a crime to knowingly keep them yourself.

Illegally or unethically obtained artefacts often sit in museums until they are successfully repatriated. The Euphronios Krater, a beautiful ancient Italian bowl, is a great example. Looted in 1971 by grave robbers in a way that may well have resembled the find at the heart of La Chimera, the Krater was sold to a couple of art dealers and then to New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art. Despite its illegal provenance, it stayed there for in the British Museum. The British Empire, to its shame, has looted countless prized artefacts from the countries it colonised.

"Nowadays, treasure hunters are smart," says Andriiovych. Because the financial incentives are there for those who think they can sniff something out, criminals can visit specific sites, dig up valuable pieces and leave without a trace.


But stealing archaeological artefacts can be pretty difficult. Looters need to know they have at least some chance of finding something - which is why looting museums during the chaos of war is a much safer bet. Even then, if looters want to sell on the artefacts it can be tricky. A marble statue, for example, can't be melted down like gold. Although the objects may not raise the same suspicions as priceless paintings, thieves can

still be caught on the border if they are trying to smuggle a cheeky vase overseas.

Andriiovych doesn't want to make archaeological looting seem appealingly straightforward and it certainly isn't. You'd need a big shovel, a truck, skewed morals and a hell of a lot of determination. But is it possible? Sadly, yes.

VERDICT: Completely doable. But we don't recommend it.





wonderful British indie flick in which Essiedu plays, you guessed it, a dyed-in-the-wool Londoner. This time he's the boyfriend of Saoirse Ronan's character - an alcoholic who escapes the big city pressure to rebuild her life on the remote Scottish island of Orkney. The pair are completely,



heartrendingly believable as a suffering couple.

"Everyone knows Saoirse Ronan," Essiedu grins. "I'd always felt she was an astonishing actor. She's so instinctive. We hit it off pretty much straightaway and got into a rhythm together."

That rhythm follows the beat of the city: its hectic clubs and pubs, and hot days spent lazing in the park. At one point, Ronan gazes into Essiedu's eves on one such summer day and asks, "What's it like growing up in London?" To which Essiedu replies, "There's always lowkey something going on."

"That line was unscripted," he says. "And so that would have come from me." The film relies on improvisation, allowing Essiedu to be an authentic east London boy a lot of the time. So what did he mean by that line? "There's always an option to do something or there's someone to go for a drink with, but that doesn't necessarily provide you with community or somewhere you feel safe. And then you can end up feeling really lonely.

"London can be an unkind bride," he reflects. How has he made that relationship work? "I think it's different for people who come to London to chase the dream, because then you've got this idea of what it is," he says. "Whereas

I was in London before I even knew I was in London, so I've never really had any removed perspective. I've learned to negotiate it in the same way I've learned to negotiate my entire life. Though, there is something odd about feeling at home on a Tube train that's so packed you've got your face stuffed in somebody's else's armpit."

Today we're chatting over Zoom. He's open, disarming, handsome, funny. He's also clearly very smart and takes the craft of performance seriously something, he says, that comes from "playing catch-up" as an actor. Drama wasn't his first career choice, that was

medicine. His parents came to London from Ghana, and as the high-achieving child of first-generation immigrants, Essiedu drifted towards being a doctor. "I had a place at medical school," he recalls. "I question how much my heart was in it, but I always wanted to do something with people."

Instead he ended up at the Guildhall School of Music of Drama and learned to love the theatre, even if it did seem otherworldly. "I didn't know anyone who was an actor. I didn't really know being an actor was even a career at that point - it was something movie stars did and got rich from. Coming from Walthamstow, all that felt like it might as well be happening on Saturn."



His mother was always supportive of her talented son. She died while he was at drama school, his father already having passed away when he was 14. For Essiedu, negotiating London life became harder than ever. But in the green rooms and wings of London's theatres he found a space to watch and learn and cultivate that elusive sense of community. Guildhall was where he met Michaela Coel, creator of I Mau Destroy You ("Michaela was and is such an important person in my life"). From there he fulfilled the dream of any theatre actor and joined the Royal Shakespeare Company, and at just 25 became the first-ever Black man to play Hamlet for the renowned theatre troupe. The role elevated him to the headlines, not just for his performance but also due to ugly arguments around race and casting. Does that role, and that period, stay with him? I ask.

"Yeah, the character folded around me and into me, and I learned a lot about myself," he says. "There are bits that you keep and bits that it's important to let go of because, you know, it's a brutal play about grief, murder, jealousy, hallucination, mental unrest. These aren't all things that you want to take to bed every night for the rest of your life. Learning how to do that helped with I May Destroy You, for example, which was [also about] needing to be in proximity to intense and extreme feelings and experiences at the right times, but then allowing them to sail away when they're not required."

When I May Destroy You aired four years ago it was an unexpected global hit that elevated Essiedu's profile, while confirming his status as an actor of range and integrity. His character, Kwame, is attempting to negotiate London's queer dating scene, and the show's approach to consent and sexual assault was revolutionary and led to a slew of awards, including BAFTA and Emmy nominations for Essiedu.

"We were happy to be given the opportunity to speak in those ways and on those subjects," he says of the series' legacy. "We weren't trying to get these awards. We weren't thinking about the impacts that it was going to have. We were just really focused on telling the story that had been laid out in front of us. It was so simple. That's something to bear in mind because I think the further up the ladder you get there's a temptation to start thinking about the endgame before you actually do the thing. That's never why you got into it in the first place, you know?"

It's worth pointing out that Essiedu's name has, for sev-

eral years, been mentioned in the same breath as James Bond. Most actors who are being considered for such an illustrious role would be gaming out their next moves, ensuring they do everything possible to turn the heads of producers. But that's not Essiedu's style. His next proiect, he tells me, is about "an outbreak of killer squirrels it's not cute, they start killing people in a wildlife park". His big ambition, he claims, is to "try and protect the integrity of choice in the things I do".

From 15 July he's starring in a revival of the play Death of England: Delroy. Though it's a one-man show, the piece is part of a series that looks at England through the eves of several characters and deals with race and politics with unapologetic bluntness. And, yes, Delroy, is a Londoner.

"I've always been interested in this idea of Englishness, or Britishness, and what



that means to different people," he says. Delroy is a working-class Black man who votes Conservative. "Not just Conservative," Essiedu exclaims. "He voted for Boris Johnson!" I wonder, did the play appeal to him now because of the broader context? This month, the idea of Britishness - still so raw after the divisiveness of Brexit - is tested again by a general election and the Euros football tournament.

> "Football becomes a lens through which we experience national identity," he says, reflecting on the place of the beautiful game in the theatre. Another hit play, Dear England, about England manager Gareth Southgate, is also slated to return. "These footballers, they're the epitome of Englishness above their class or their race or even their gender sometimes... when it's going well. And as soon as it stops going well, Englishness as a protective cloak is stripped away from you. And then the things that remain are the things that are used against you... I've always been fascinated by that.

> "With Delroy, his politics are almost in defiance of what is expected of him. When he talks about voting for Boris, he kind of says: is this not allowed? Am I to be told what I am and am not supposed to do in my own country? He'd

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Essiedu is keen not to mix his personal politics too much with his approach to characters, but it's clear he's channelling some frustration into these roles. "We live in the world," he shrugs. "We know all the f**king s**t that's going down, both domestically and internationally."

And his beloved London, what's the future for the UK's flagship city - with its towering skyscrapers and exorbitant rents?

"I'm literally looking at a high-rise right now being put up. The costs of being a Londoner and engaging with what London purports to offer us is insane. It's completely f**ked, man, and that will definitely take away from what has historically made London one of the greatest cities in the world, which is its diversity and variety of



culture and story and food and music and experience. London has been a Rubik's Cube for centuries, and I feel like... I was about to say the cube's getting solved. It's becoming more one colour.'

It's hard not to equate the experiences of those Black English footballers, so easily put on a pedestal or vilified. with Essiedu's own trajectory. What if he was the first Black Bond? The pressure involved must be immense.

"I'm not in control of the expectations other people have of me," he says, with conviction. "And I'm not hugely interested. But I do have expectation of myself to do what is required to



even make it worth doing this job. As a doctor, you see the impact of the work you do or the value that you have to society. Whereas being an actor, you can get lost down the airy fairy [path of thinking]: what we do makes people happy. And, yeah, sure. But it can be hard to sustain yourself through those moments where you know you're not doing that.

"I've got expectations of myself, and of the work that I do, to have impact," he continues. "Because I remember what it was like going to the theatre for the first time and feeling eyes on you. Feeling unwelcome, or just not being able to get in because the tickets are too expensive. I've got an expectation of myself to try and make it so that the [next] version of me, that is 15 or 18, is feeling those barriers or boundaries less than I was. That's a way of approaching expectation that is way less likely to land me in a nervous breakdown."

Essiedu is a great advocate for London. He represents what is best about the city: its variety and opportunity and freedom of choice. And he's absolutely right, London has to remain the sort of place where anyone can feel at home, even if that means being crammed into a stranger's armpit.

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

Yunnanese food – made by the many ethnic groups native to China's far-flung south-western region - was once an obscure delicacy to city dwellers. Now it's making major waves in Shanghai thanks to a few visionary chefs, finds Laura Martin

As we trek through a sliver of the 19,000-hectare Jingmai mountains, there's a sea of green all around us and my eyes quickly get lost. But Akon - a shaman-trained expert who grew up around these parts and is my guide for the day - retains a laser-like focus. Something catches his eye; he stops to pull a twig from a bush, chopping it off with a machete.

"Try this one!" he says. Normally I'd hesitate to put obscure vegetation in my mouth, but as a child in his home village of Wengwa - not far from where we are now - Akon learned to identify edible plants from just their leaves, stalks and flowers, often from several metres away. This particular one is tubular in shape, and, crunching down into the tart stalk, I get notes of rhubarb and celery. Next, he plucks a dark green, speckled leaf that's reminiscent of cucumber; a few metres further on, I taste sour, date-like brown fruits, and sprigs with a zingy, citrus tang. It's like playing Shazam with my taste buds, and I think to myself: I'm in for one of the most extraordinary lunches of my life.


Akon is the cofounder of Wengwa Rainforest Discovery (WRD), an enterprise that aims to promote the cultural heritage of the rainforest - and the people who have lived there for thousands of years - through food. Currently, they operate out of their two bases, one of which is deep in the Yunnan rainforest found within the Xishuangbanna prefecture, which also hosts visitors at their luxury campsite and restaurant. I'm visiting them at a major milestone, as they get



ready to open a new restaurant in Shanghai called Canopia, which is being billed as a living rainforest in the south-west of the city. It's part of a new wave of restaurants in the city that are focusing on this lesser-understood cuisine from the south-western edge of the vast country, putting the spotlight on ancient flavours and ingredients and serving them up to curious city dwellers.

Akon comes from the Bulang ethnic group, who, alongside other major groups like Dai, Yi, Hani, Zhuang, Bai and Miao, populate the Yunnan province in south-west China. Home to 48.3 million people, the region - popular with Chinese tourists, but rarely those from further afield - is an astonishing part of the country, the landscape spanning snow-capped mountains and cerulean lakes to ancient, sweeping forests in Pu'er (the birthplace of its namesake tea and a UNESCO World Heritage site as of 2023). Today, I'm visiting Yunnan's lush expanse of rainforest at the heart of the Jingmai mountains.

Six years ago, Akon and his French partner, Jean-Charles "JC" Penot, were living in Beijing when they had the idea for

WRD. They decided to move to Wengji village and make it happen, Akon tells me on a bumpy 30-minute Jeep drive from their WRD base in Wengji into the jungle. Their rainforest restaurant, Dae Lae - which means "forest food" in Bulang - is where we'll be dining today. We have a small sampling of the 220 species of edible plants that have been identified by Akon and WRD's botanists for food, which will become ingredients

for our lunch. Some of these plants were newly discovered by the team at WRD, unknown even to the local ethnic groups. It's not necessarily a surprise, since Yunnan province is said to have as much flowering plant diversity as the rest of the Northern Hemisphere put together.

"We wanted to set up a true culinary experience," explains JC when we arrive at Dae Lae. I'm the only diner at the restaurant today, which has been created out of a customised safari tent, perched on the side of a little lake. "And we soon realised the best way to do that was to copy the ecosystem of nature and reflect it in not only the food, but everything we create."

Back in 2013, Greenpeace rang the alarm for Yunnan following the destruction of the area's rainforests, which led to a sharp drop in species diversity. "If measures are not taken promptly, one quarter of Yunnan's species may become extinct within this century," the head of Greenpeace's forest conservation, Wu Hao, warned.

It's something Akon has witnessed as farming in the region

becomes more and more industrialised. "These modern agricultural systems have had a strong negative impact on biodiversity," he says. "Which is why preserving ancient practices not only maintains ancestral knowledge, but also helps with ecosystem preservation."

"For most people, these large forests are just green spaces composed of trees and animals. But for us, the rainforest is our food and medicinal supply. Without

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it, we're lost and powerless. And by losing ancient ingredients, we are also homogenising flavours and culinary heritage."

Settling into the cushioned floor seating, I get to experience their vision through a spectacular eight-course meal. Highlights include surprisingly sweet soft-shell river crabs paired with river moss butter and a salad made with herbs gathered from the forest floor, all cooked in a small pop-up kitchen a few metres from the dining table.

Just 400 people in total have experienced WRD so far - to be expected, since it's a purely word-of-mouth project. "We don't make it easy for people to find us," JC admits of their lack of social media accounts or even a website. "We figure if people take the time and effort to find us, they'll be rewarded!"

Though the opening of Canopia is sure to bag them more fans, the hush-hush business model of WRD will still apply, since the restaurant will host just 12 guests a night. The

lucky diners will also forage for their food, then be guided through a similar tasting menu (14 courses rather than Dae Lae's eight) made up of ingredients sourced directly from their rainforest farm and a greenhouse in the Shanghai restaurant.

But they won't be the only ones flying the flag for Yunnanese food in Shanghai. Take Yunnan Bistro, a hip restaurant in the west of the city, which pairs regional dishes with natural wine. Or the zen. natural wood-washed Huma, where the no-reservations policy means people send couriers to wait in the three-hour queue.

"The culture and food [of Yunnan] are quite similar to Thailand, as geographically they're so close," the chef and restaurant owner of Huma, Niu Yun, known to everyone as NY, tells me when I visit her after I've returned to Shanghai. "So, typically in this region, because of the rainforest, there are lots of different herbs, and fresh chilli and lemons in the dishes." NY comes from Yunnan's capital Kunming and lived there until she was 18. In 2014, she opened her first restaurant in Shanghai



fourth restaurant in the city, Pilipala Dai Barbecue, in the Changning district - in part in homage to her mum, who is Dai. "When I first started out, people wer-

en't that interested in Yunnanese food, but I just loved it and so did my friends," she says. "With so many different ingredients and different flavours from the minority cultures, there's been so much more we can show."

Both Topher and NY tell me that during lockdown, like most countries across the world. Chinese people found themselves unable to travel abroad, meaning they had to visit places in their own homeland instead. Many who were hoping to visit Thailand, Vietnam or Laos chose Yunnan. This newfound interest in the province gave Yunnanese restaurants back in Shanghai a boost. "It's a culture with a lot of stories to tell. It's really quite magical down there," NY savs.

I think back to my time in Wengwa. At WRD, I watch the sun, the same colour as the Chinese flag, set over the smoky mountains with Akon. He tells me his dream - apart from earning a Michelin star - is to leave a legacy of his culture's

> food that can be passed on to the next generation. "This knowledge of plants and cuisine has been known to the Bulang and other ethnic groups for thousands of years," he says. "Our work means we're ensuring this knowledge will be around for years to come."

NY plates up some of her signatures for me: there's a spicy salad that includes a pungent root called houttuynia, or, as NY calls it, "fish-smelling grass". We also dig into a fried tilapia fish with a chilli and lemongrass-infused sauce smeared over the top. It's one of the best meals I have while in Shanghai - simmering with moreish heat.


"Yunnanese food is definitely having a resurgence in this city," Chris Brantley, known as Topher, from UnTour Food Tours,


tells me over a revolving table spread from the super-popular Lotus Eatery, also in the Changning neighbourhood. This old-school institution has been serving some of the more classic dishes from the region since 2009.

Included in the spread: purple sticky rice, some of the 900 varieties of mushrooms unique to Yunnan and rice noodles. Chris tells me that young Shanghainese are enjoying these rice noodles - rather than wheat - which are synonymous with Yunnan. "There's a local chain called InClouds that's gone viral [on social media], because of the rice noodles, but also because of how it's presented, in a bronze bowl."









Breaking

How does it work?

Breaking (or breakdancing) is one of the most explosive and entertaining new sports to be added to the programme for decades. Teams of 16 B-boys and B-girls compete to wow the judges with some literally head-spinning acrobatics.

NEW GOLD DREAMS

Who's the best?

The ever-present USA will have a claim to men's gold thanks to their talisman, Victor Montalvo (aka B-Boy Viktor). The strongest challenge will likely come from the Japanese team.

Where does it happen?

Breaking and B-boy culture was born out of the Bronx in the 1970s. and a pilgrimage to the community centre at 1520 Sedgwick - aka the birthplace of hip hop - is worthwhile for any wanna-B-boy. Legendary crews like Mastermind Rockers, Incredible Breakers, Supreme Beingz and 5 Crew Dynasty (who also teach kids through their Dynasty Breaking NYC programme) are still competing at B-boy events around the city follow on Instagram for updates.

How do I get into it?

Before you attempt to spin like a top for the crowds in Times Square, try a tester breaking class. PMT House of Dance and Brickhouse NYC offer lessons for beginners.

Street skating

How does it work?

Street skating is an expression of freedom. It turns the railings. benches and bollards of the concrete jungle into platforms for out-of-thisworld tricks. Now an Olympic sport, taking place in specially built parks, it still draws on the rolling feel of real streets.

Who's the best?

All eyes will be on Nyjah Huston - a California native regarded as the greatest street skater to ever compete.

Where does it happen?


When street skating began in the 1980s it really did turn cities like LA upside down. Now, most street skaters in LA



How do I get into it?

How does it work?

Where does it happen?



How do I get into it?

Just find an empty court in any city, but we recommend the sundrenched concrete of Miami. especially the Instagram-friendly ViceWave courts at Sparks Park in Hialeah or else the classic shorefront courts at Central Beach in Fort Lauderdale.

How does it work?

Surfing

How does it work?

Competition surfing isn't about just, like, totally going with the flow, dude. Riders compete to impress a panel of five judges with the complexity of their manoeuvers during a roughly half-hour session in the water.

Who's the best?

It's the next generation of surfers from the USA, including top-ranked Griffin Colapinto and Caitlin Simmers, who are expected to make a splash at Paris 2024.

Where does it happen?

The Olympic surfing competition takes place in Tahiti, French Polynesia (to do it actually in Paris would be in Seine, ahem), though the Caribbean is where the surfing scene is booming right now, with the reef breaks of Barbados, in particular, offering totally tubular waves.

How do I get into it?

Cattlewash Beach is the spot to catch easy breakers, while the famous barrels of the Soup Bowl await you just around the bay in Bathsheba. Bodie's School of Surf and Barry's Surf Barbados are top-rated surf schools on the south of the island. The Surfer's Cafe, near the fish market in Oistins, is the spot for rum cocktails, grilled catch of the day and stories of waves that got away.



Haunted how. exactly?

There's an idea called "stone

Some so-called paranormal events are just mould-induced hallucinations or noisy pipes. But so many stories I encounter professionally seem to match, it's unscientific not to investigate.

Are vou ever scared?

Nope. I ain't afraid of no ghost.







I DIG DINOSAUR



Autistic journalist Sarah Kurchak says this new sitcom is a major milestone for neurodivergence on TV

person. I love stories about autism that are realistic. nuanced, heartfelt and entertaining, Dinosaur, the show about Nina (Ashley Storrie), a thirty something autistic paleontologist whose life and treasured routine are disrupted when her sister announces a whirlwind engagement, is somehow all the above.

My love of pop culture is like Nina's love of dinosaurs - a lifelong passion. I remember as a child making my parents play Make 'Em Laugh, the slapstick dance number from Singin' in the Rain, repeatedly. I was obsessed with David Lynch's Dune – long before Dune was cool, which did nothing to help me make friends. Consuming music, films, books and TV helped me understand and connect with people. I dreamed one day pop culture might help others understand people like me.

Dinosaur does a great job of that. Not because it perfectly represents all aspects of autism. Even if that were possible, it would make for a poor dramedy. But because it tells one story about one autistic individual really well. Getting more well-rounded autistic characters on TV won't



fix all of our problems, but every good story makes us feel more seen.

Why is Dinosaur good? Nina is a fully realised character, not just a collection of symptoms, like Rain Man's Raymond. Parts of her story I found tragicomically true to my own life, like the episode where she overextends herself with too many social obligations and winds up screaming into a bush.

Crucially, Dinosaur was co-created and co-written by autistic comedian Ashley Storrie. Far too many popular autism shows, like The Good Doctor, were created by and for non-autistic people. Seeing ourselves behind the camera, telling our own stories, is even more exciting than seeing ourselves on screen.
