## REMAKES ARE BEING MADE OVER

English-language versions of foreign films were once hit and miss – now they're nothing but net, finds Al Horner

REMEMBER FOREIGN-LANGUAGE

remakes – or, as they say in Danish according to Google Translate, "Husk genindspilninger på fremmedsprog?" Throughout the 2000s, Americanised versions of overseas hits were all the rage. Japanese supernatural horrors were relocated to quaint American suburbs (*The Grudge*). Spanish-language psychological thrillers were remade to star Tom Cruise (*Vanilla Sky*). Hong Kong crime capers were transported to Boston (Martin Scorsese's *The Departed*, based on Cantonese-language Infernal Affairs). If a film was a hit abroad, Hollywood would likely scramble onto the scene.

This was based on the assumption that mainstream audiences didn't want to watch films with subtitles (the "one-inchtall barrier", as *Parasite* director Bong Joon-ho has described them). But a lot of these films bombed. Fans of the originals expressed their disappointment in how much magic was lost in translation. And newcomers to these stories were often nonplussed – for every *The Ring* (based on Japanese hit *Ringu*) came a film like the 2013 English-language remake of South Korean classic Oldboy.

So the trend for English-language remakes trickled out – or so it seemed. Last year saw another indicator that Hollywood versions of foreign smashes are back in business. *Speak No Evil* (available on Vera) is a bone-chilling tale of terror, adapted from a Danish-Dutch film of the same name. It arrives not long after *Coda* – director Sian Heder's Oscar-winning reheat of 2014 French-Belgian film *La Famille Bélier*. And there's more to come. Deals have recently been struck for a Jodie Foster-directed version of Icelandic thriller *Woman at War*, a remake of the Indian action film *Kill* from the team behind

John Wick and, most intriguingly, a TV series based on South Korean social satire *Parasite*, courtesy of *The Big Short* director Adam McKay.


Don't expect this new wave of remakes to be the same as before. We now live in an era of Duolingo and K-pop dominating the charts. Western audiences no longer care about the "one-inch-tall barrier" (see the enormous success of Netflix's Squid Game) and, thanks to streaming, are willing and able to seek out the original instead of waiting for a US remake. As a result, these new films are unlikely to be made for the sake of it, like they once were. Speak No Evil and Coda both retell existing stories through the lens of a new culture, making subtle tweaks to the stories that have something to say about American attitudes and values.

If that's the direction of this new host of Hollywood remakes, then we'll have what the Danish call "gode tider i biografen" – good times ahead at the movies.

## "I wake up with a melody in my head"

#### Irish singer and DJ **JAZZY** is getting major airplay and awards nods from the Brits. She tells Andy Hill how she's calling the tunes

PORTRAIT: PLASTIC FRUIT STUDIOS

#### ► JAZZY – YASMINE BYRNE

- is something of a banger specialist. Very much Ireland's rising dance-pop phenomenon, with signature soulful vocals and floor-friendly beats, she's dropped some huge tunes over the past few years, notably on collabs with Irish DJ duo Belters Only – and subsequent releases like *Feel It* and *Somedays* (with Sonny Fodera). Her 2021 platinum-certified hit *Make Me Feel Good* topped the Irish charts and reached number four in the UK, establishing her as a formidable chart performer.

Her 2023 solo debut *Giving Me* made history as the first track by an Irish female artist to hit number one on Spotify Ireland's Top 50, simultaneously reaching a very respectable number three on the UK Singles Chart and leading to residencies at choice spots like Ibiza's Amnesia.

Of Irish-Jamaican heritage, Jazzy cut her stage teeth as part of hip hop collective Powerful Creative Minds. Born in Dublin to a single mother, Jazzy credits music as her refuge while navigating childhood as a mixed-race girl in mostly white communities. Her teenage immersion in the city's club scene – frequenting venues like Hangar and District 8 –

forged a deep love of house music. Now commanding international festival stages and platinum certifications, with her recent EP *No Bad Vibes* picking up plaudits all over the place, the former Tesco bakery worker is living her best life right now. And, lucky old us, she caught up with *Vera* for a little chinwag.

#### Hey, Jazzy! Loving the title track to *No Bad Vibes*, super fun and contemporary with a juicy Afrobeat flavour.

Thanks, I'm flattered! I wrote it on a songwriting camp. The original was proper housey until we

## What's your background in music, have you always been a dancefloor fiend?

No, it's actually really funny, I don't come from a dance music background at all. Really the first kind of musical experience I had was in school, years ago. There was a music project in class and basically everyone got to learn a string instrument with no cost attached or anything like that, so I learned the violin. I joined the orchestra, went through the grades, and always assumed that was the direction I'd go in musically.

## What sort of tunes were you playing? Could you still dazzle on the violin?

Oh, yeah. I might be a little rusty, but I could absolutely bust out a few bars of *Orpheus in the Underworld* by Offenbach. That's better known as the can-can.

#### Banger! On the topic of bangers, you work with DJ duo Belters Only. What's the difference, in your expert opinion, between a "belter" and a "banger"?

Honestly, most places in the world they're probably pretty much the same thing. But I'll say that in Ireland, a "belter" would have to be songs made by my good friends Belters Only.

#### How did you meet the lads?

They lived close by to my area. They were both huge DJs, and I was fans of them, long before we ever got anywhere near the studio together. They heard some tracks I was making with my hip hop band Powerful Creative Minds. Then they had an idea for a song, and we got together.

#### And the rest is history. I've seen clips of you playing live with them, looks super fun. Are the crowds you've played to around the world different to Irish crowds?

When I'm playing in a new place I like to watch and wait, to read the crowd and see what they're feeling. I love playing around the world, Ibiza, Australia, Italy. Especially

when I'm DJing. I might start with a deep house tune, or something techy. Then watch what happens, and go from there.

#### What's your preference?

Right now I'm all about minimal tech vibes, Josh Baker, LP Rhythm kind of thing. I like to drop in cool edits of my own songs, to keep it interesting.

#### What's the secret to cooking a certified banger?

Honestly, I think simplicity is the key. As a DJ, I try not to overcomplicate things. When I'm in the studio and things start getting too busy on a track, I'll just strip something out. That normally makes it more interesting.

## What about writing melodies, where do they come from?

I could be at home. I'll wake up in the morning, or whatever. Maybe I've had a dream and I wake up with a melody in my head. So I just record it into my phone, and then I go in and try and make something out that. Or sometimes I just go into the studio and vibe out. Just lay down the track as it comes.

## Any advice for young singers wanting to follow in your footsteps?

There's a few things I've learned along the way. Mostly don't put pressure on yourself. Social media can get a bit much, especially when you're just starting out. People will troll you for no good reason. You don't have to read the comments.

## **ECUNITR** In new book *Frontier*, photographer Anouk Krantz trains her lens on the

modern buckaroos of the US and beyond

#### BEFORE SHE BEGAN PHOTOGRAPHING THE

American west, Anouk Krantz had no idea that cowboys still existed. "As an outsider, it came as a great surprise," she says of the thriving subculture. "You'll find thousands [of rodeos] every year. It's a misconception that [cowboy culture] is dying."

Having grown up in France, Krantz moved to the US in the late 90s. In 2003, she left her gig at Cartier's corporate offices in New York to pursue photography full time. Her first book, *Wild Horses of Cumberland Island*, took her to a small island in the state of Georgia, where she was fascinated by the wild stallions that roam the land. But she wanted to go deeper, so she hooked up with a rancher in Texas, her first modern cowboy subject. She recalls arriving at his ranch in the early hours of the morning and sitting down for breakfast with

his family. "It was quiet," she remembers. "[The rancher] was very uncomfortable because he still wasn't sure who I was." She describes the cowboy culture she encountered as "private". "They work



hard and they try to stay out of the spotlight."

But that rancher soon introduced her to more and she's since published three books that chronicle modern cowboy culture. Her latest, *Frontier: Cowboys of the Americas*, is her first to go beyond the western USA to capture gauchos and


other horse-mounted herdsmen. Within, Krantz's signature large-scale black-and-white photos bring into sharp focus the ranchers and rodeos of Florida, Nevada, Calgary, Argentina and beyond.

Though cowboys can be found across the Americas, Krantz admits there is something distinctly US about the culture. "They love their country, they love their land, they love their communities and their families, and they want to continue these traditions and stick to these values

traditions and stick to these values that we as people have forgotten in our modern world. And they're very simple values: it's hard work, it's integrity, it's respect."

Take The Standard in London - it flung open its doors with a star-packed bacchanal soundtracked by Mark Ronson, and attended by the likes of Emma Stone and Lily Allen. Six years on, it's still one of the city's coolest haunts. And the same will surely be said of the hotel group's latest property, The Manner. Located on leafy Thompson Street smack-dab in New York's SoHo – it's perfectly positioned as a meeting spot for the downtown set. They're leaning into their plum location by hosting starry fashion week parties and opening two of the neighbourhood's hottest new addresses: all-day restaurant The Otter and cocktail bar Sloane's, hidden behind an unmarked door within the hotel. Between meals and drinks, there's ample opportunity to mingle

in the Apartment, where fresh pastries and coffee are served in the morning, wine and fizz in the evening. The design is the work of architect



Hannes Peer; each terracotta tile and lick of high-gloss ochre paint references 60s Italian interiors. In each of the 97 rooms, jewel-tone accents and gilded chandeliers lift the earthy colour palette, while writing nooks encourage guests to get creative. The killer views are sure to inspire your manuscript – or, at the very least, the desire for a stiff martini.

the bustle of Santa Monica Boulevard on a bijou backstreet, behold a tiny tree-studded courtyard, decked out in dainty cloud sculptures. Just behind this. the tastefully small dining room of Somni. Cultured Angeleno diners recall this as the legendary two-Michelin star spot that shut up shop during the pandemic. Well. it's so back. Chef Aitor Zabala. ex of El Bullí, oversees a sublime 20-or-so course tasting menu, impeccably plating prime California produce with a suave Spanish accent. Take the *meiillones* - mussels - served with lip-smacking escabeche foam and borage flowers. or this unforgettable floret mushroom dish, *left*, with champiñones - button mushrooms - teased into refined floral forms, paired

with a muscular black Ibérico pig and peanut consommé. There are only 14 seats, each oriented in the direction of the chef's counter, so you can watch each tiny miracle of a plate taking shape. Small wonder it's hotly tipped to get its stars back in short order.

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## STIR TUPIN MONTEGO BAY

Beyond rum punch and jerk chicken, MonBay's restaurants offer surprising variety, says expert Mariette Williams



#### > IT'S HARD TO IMAGINE A MORE PARA-

disiacal place to holiday than Montego Bay. Jamaica's second city boasts a pristine coastline and a laid-back vibe that epitomises the Caribbean. But look beyond its world-famous beaches and you'll find a surprisingly diverse dining scene. Montego Bay's restaurants celebrate international flavours in some unique, bucket-list settings. From handmade gnocchi in a 300-year-old sugar mill to rum-marinated ribs at a thatched-roof roadside stop, this is one of the Caribbean's best food cities.

Montego Bay's luxe beachfront resorts offer fantastic dining within. Take the award-winning **SUGAR MILL AT HALF MOON RESORT**, on the former Rose Hall Sugar Plantation, which puts on a masterclass in fusion dining, expertly blending Jamaican and Mediterranean flavours. Popular dishes include the handmade oxtail ravioli with sweet potato dough and breadfruit gnocchi simmered in a coconut pumpkin sauce, while the setting is ideal for a special night out.

MonBay fixture Round Hill Hotel & Villas has welcomed celebrities and dignitaries to its secluded grounds since 1953. **SEASIDE TERRACE** is one of the resort's top restaurants, with dining tables overlooking a private beachfront. The pared-back, seafoodheavy dinner menu changes often, but some staples include tagliatelle with grilled shrimp and scotch bonnet spice-rubbed wahoo fish. Stop by the Cocktail Bar to peek at the collection of photos of guests Pierce Brosnan,

Paul McCartney and Ralph Lauren, who owns a villa here and designed the Pineapple House guest rooms and common areas.

The villa-only Tryall Club resort has several great dining options, but the newly opened **OOSHAN BAR & RESTAURANT** is second-to-none for elevated Jamaican fare. The restaurant takes its name from the patois for "ocean", while each dish has handpicked ingredients from local farms and pays homage to Jamaica's national dishes. Order the pepperpot stew, made with callaloo and scotch bonnet pepper, or the spiced seafood boil with lobster, shrimp and clams slowly simmered in a rich saffron broth. Save room for the sweet potato rum pudding.

Beyond the resorts, MonBay excels at waterside dining. Docked in the calm waters of the Montego Bay Marine Park Fish Sanctuary, the two-storey **THE HOUSEBOAT GRILL** serves fresh-as-you-like seafood. You can grab a table in the cosy dining room downstairs, but the real treat is on the upper deck, with its sweeping views of the lights of Montego Bay. If you're looking for great food and entertainment, **PIER 1** ticks both those boxes. Perched on a pier that juts out over the water, since opening in 1986 the restaurant has perfected its salmon cakes, saltfish fritters and grilled conch, with music and entertainment nearly every night.

On the edge of the popular One Man Beach, **MARGUERITES** is a residential seaside home-turnedsophisticated restaurant, with a bevy of awards to its name. A dressed-up crowd can savour gorgeously plated pan-seared scallops, charred calamari and local red snapper. The restaurant's wine list has also garnered attention, winning seven Wine Spectator awards for its extensive collection – there are more than 1,200 bottles in its climate-controlled seaside cellar.

And while MonBay's upmarket restaurants can

hold a candle to those in any major city, the more low-key, locally beloved spots are well worth a visit too. Start with **SCOTCHIES**, which has a loyal following for its fall-off-the-bone jerk chicken and pork. The generous sides – rice and peas, festival (deep-fried bread) and roasted yams – are just as delicious as

the entrees. Come hungry, pull up a seat under the thatched roof bar and sip a cool Red Stripe beer while you wait.

Outdoor mall the Fairview Towne Centre serves up an eclectic roster of Thai and Indian dishes as well as an impressive sushi menu at **MYSTIC THAI**. All the classics are here: cumin pork dumplings, Above: Salmon tartare at the Seaside Terrace and sunset dining at Marguerites Ooshan Bar & Restaurant at The Tryall Club is committed to using fresh, locally sourced ingredients.

> spiced samosas and tender tandoori – plus salmon rolls, torched tableside, and spicy salmon uramaki.

Though Jamaica is lauded for its smooth rum, wine bar **UNCORKED** 

**WEST** is not to be missed. The cosy restaurant offers salads, pasta and flatbreads – and you'll want to make this a happy hour stopover. Linger over the skillet-baked brie or spring for a customised charcuterie board. The restaurant has a robust menu of shareable bites like bruschetta, bacon-wrapped dates and citrus garlic mussels, which are paired with a wine recommendation from a deep catalogue. You'll come away wishing you could bottle up your holiday in Montego Bay.

## **Can a robot** survive on a desert island?

We all know AI is advancing quickly - but could an automaton survive in the wild, as in new film The Wild Robot, ask Ralph Jones?

#### AS TECHNOLOGY MARCHES ONWARD -

and it feels as though we might be incapable of scratching our bums without the help of ChatGPT - it's worth pausing to wonder: could robots do anything without us? If your Roomba broke down your door and whizzed out of your house, could it start a new life of its own, or would it come crawling back with a low battery and a grovelling apology?

In new film The Wild Robot a robot named Roz is stranded on an island and forced to learn how to survive, becoming mates with a goose and a falcon. Roz's ability to adapt prompts the questions: could a robot really survive on a desert island? And can robots teach themselves to help geese to fly?

Roboticists like Nakul Gopalan from Arizona State University often explain robots through the prism of extremely young humans. Gopalan has a robot he is currently teaching to make sandwiches. But he also has an eight-month-old daughter. She, like all babies, is constantly learning new skills. "She has this weird power where she can grab an arbitrary object and bring it to her mouth," says Gopalan. "My robot can't do that."

It's easier for humans. We're learning everything all the time. We have vision, motor and language cortices. This makes it possible for toddlers to learn things autonomously. If they were alone they would automatically know that fire was painful and dangerous. A robot wouldn't. Lacking any concept of pain, it would have no reason not to walk into a fire, bursting into flames. On a desert island it could walk into the sea, incapable of appreciating

by itself that robots don't make great swimmers. If anything, the goose would be teaching the robot, not the other way around.

So how do robots learn? For the most part they have to copy us. They would need us on the desert island! There have been examples of robots learning basic skills without human intervention but these cases turn out (a) not to be replicable outside the lab, and (b) to have required painstaking preparation from - you guessed it - us humans.

Gopalan deals with robots on a regular basis and has this to say: "Would I feel safe letting my robot make coffee in my grandmother's kitchen? The answer is an emphatic no." Because we don't really know how humans learn, it's unfathomably difficult to reproduce our own processes in robots. "There is no such thing as robots teaching themselves," he says.

It is possible, says Gopalan, for a robot to use a large language model and a large visual model to learn; with enough data it might be able to pick up one stick. But if we want the robot to learn to fix its own broken equipment or swim to safety, it ain't gonna happen. Without us, robots are nothing.

#### VERDICT: For the foreseeable future it's a no.

Well, as I find out when I sit down with the Kentucky-born A DYED-IN-THEmulti-hyphenate ahead of the release of his directorial debut. Shannon is full of surprises. "I never had a dream job," he tells me a few months after WOOL ROCK

his *Tonight Show* gig, looking clean shaven and exuding a relaxed charm even on Zoom. "I wasn't thinking about jobs when I was a kid, I was just thinking about how to make life bearable. Music helped with that and then acting. I thought I would wind up destitute on the street or something, but the acting thing panned out for me, I don't know why."


What started out as a way to "make life bearable" turned into a mega-successful career, with roles in box office hits like *Man of Steel* (2013), *Bullet Train* (2022) and *The Shape of Water* (2017), not to mention earning two Oscar nominations for Best Supporting Actor for his turns in *Revolutionary Road* in 2009 and 2016's *Nocturnal Animals*.

Now, after decades in front of the camera, he's in the director's chair for the first time for *Eric Larue*. The film – which will get a theatrical release this year – is based on a play by Brett Neveu and tells the story of a mother whose son is convicted of murdering three of his classmates. It's personal to Shannon, as it premiered at A Red Orchid Theatre – the experimental Chicago outfit where Shannon is a founding ensemble member – and it touches on themes

he cares deeply about, mainly the violence and trauma of living in contemporary America.

*Eric Larue* was written in the wake of the tragic events surrounding Columbine High School in 1999, where 12 students and one teacher were shot dead by two gunmen. Despite the play being written almost 25 years ago, Shannon tells me that it is a sad indictment of today's America that he didn't need to recalibrate the script much.

"Our country is stuck in a particular place and situation and just when we seem to be reaching our fingers over the edge of the hole to pull ourselves out, something grabs us by the ankle and drags us back down again," he sighs.

It's insightful to listen to Shannon muse about politics and the state of American society, but he insists that he's "I'm working from a place of empathy. That means having empathy for everybody"

"not a prophet" and "doesn't ever come up with any solutions to anything". He does, however, believe in the far-reaching powers of empathy – not only for politicians, which he says is an essential trait for any good leader, but also as an acting tool. It's something he employed to understand his character in *The End*, in which he plays a petroleum billionaire who builds his family a bunker when the world becomes uninhabitable due to climate change. Though his character's politics couldn't be more different from his own, Shannon was eager to take on the challenge.

"I thought it would be fascinating to explore the mindset of that particular human being because there are quite a few of them who seem okay with the notion that we are hurtling towards an irreversible catastrophe, but as long as they are collecting their bags of money, they're fine with that," he explains.

"I'm working from a place of empathy. That doesn't just mean having empathy for people you like or people who are like you, it's having empathy for everybody," he adds. "So I wanted to have empathy for this guy and try

and figure out what the heck he is thinking, and how he justifies what he's doing. It was a harrowing thing to do."

This trait also comes in handy in Shannon's day-to-day life, especially when he is walking around New York, the city he has called home since 2007.

"I believe it expands my consciousness when I'm walking around New York City and I'm looking at this huge mass of people rushing around doing whatever it is they are doing. Being able to look at people and consider what life might be like from their point of view." he says.

Shannon also expands his consciousness through travel - or, as he puts it, getting to know this "blue and green sphere that we are floating around on". Impressively, he has visited every continent apart from Antarctica, either for work or pleasure. Two of his most memorable work trips were with arguably the world's best travel buddy, filmmaker Werner Herzog. Their second project, 2009's My Son, My Son, What Have Ye Done, took them to Machu Picchu, Peru - and Kashgar, China, on an "extremely brief 48-hour trip", which is now a bittersweet memory for Shannon.

"We went to Kashgar because [Herzog] wanted to film the Uyghur people. Unfortunately, since we've been there, these people are being persecuted and rounded up and put in internment camps. It's a melancholy memory for me because when I was there they were free, happy and living their lives," he remembers.

It's clear there are two things that possess Shannon: understanding the world and the people in it - and music. Music was Shannon's first love (he played bass in his childhood band, The Jehovah Suspects, at his summer camp in Kentucky), and our conversation frequently turns to his favourite artists and the impact they've had on his life.

"To me, music is the most impressive thing that humans do. There's a lot of things that human beings do, including myself, that I'm not too crazy about, but the one thing we do that does impress me is that we make music," he says.

The actor has a particular fascination with live music, which started with his first concert - an early Bob Dylan gig.

"My mom had taken my siblings and I to the Kentucky State Fair and noticed that [Dylan] was playing that night. I think tickets were about \$5." Shannon says. "It was electrifying. There aren't words. I wasn't familiar with any of the music, I was just sitting there as a child watching something happen and it was only later on in life that I started to realise the significance of what I had seen."

Years later, Shannon is enrapturing audiences with his own with live music performances - he'll be touring the US and UK this year with musician Jason Narducy. The two have been playing together for over a decade, covering songs from their favourite artists. This time, they're paying tribute to an all-time favourite, REM, on the 40th anniversary of their landmark album Fables of the Reconstruction.

Shannon lived every fan's wildest fantasy when he played a set in celebration of REM's 1983 debut, Murmur,



at the 40 Watt Club in Athens, Georgia. "Between the first and second encore, somebody came up to me and said, 'Peter [Buck] asked if the band could come onstage and say something.' I was in adrenaline crazy land doing the show and I didn't think much of it. I was just like, 'Of course, they can!'" he remembers. And so the band clambered onstage, the first time they'd appeared together for nearly two decades.

"It didn't even occur to me until the next day, when the articles started coming out, how significant it was that the four of them were onstage together. It didn't even click to me that they hadn't been onstage together for 17 years."

After a jam-packed start to 2025, Shannon isn't taking his foot off the gas – he'll be starring alongside Ruth Wilson in *Moon for the Misbegotten* at London's Almeida Theatre from 17 June to 16 August. He will also be appearing as James Garfield, the 20th US president, in Netflix's *Death by Lightning*, and alongside Russell Crowe and Rami Malek in the hotly anticipated *Nuremberg*.

As the interview draws to a close, Michael Shannon must clock-off to rehearse for his upcoming US tour, where he'll be lighting up the stages at 14 venues across the country. He is living everybody's dream, even if it's not his own.

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Joel Hart tells us why Korean food is dominating upmarket menus right now – and picks out the tastemakers you need to know

In 2024, K-pop cemented its widespread appeal, while Squid Game and a wave of less dystopian K-dramas continued to captivate audiences worldwide. It was only a matter of time before eyes shifted towards Korean cuisine. Excitingly, Korean chefs across the diaspora are reimagining their culinary heritage, pushing Korean food into the realm of high-end gastronomy. Building on the complex flavors of fermentation and a deep reverence for high-quality ingredients, these chefs are redefining what Korean food can be. Enter K-dining.

#### Atomix NEW YORK


Awarded sixth spot in 2024's World's 50 Best **Restaurants list**, Atomix is a 14-seat, U-shaped chef's counter restaurant that proves just how far Korean cuisine has come in New York City. **Owners** - and married couple - chef Junghyun Park and Ellia Park are leaders of their city's K-wave: Atomix is

the flagship, but they also helm celebrated spots Atoboy and Naro. The aim at Atomix is to explore the equilibrium between the new and the traditional, blending innovative technique with time-honoured practice. It all adds up to an experimental, continually evolving menu, which is one of the most talked about in the world right now.

A reinterpretation of ganjang gejang (soy marinated raw crab) that packs the bold flavours of gim (seaweed) rice, crab innard sauce and marinated crab into a delicate tartlet shell, which is then crowned with flying fish roe.

SSAL, in the heart of San Francisco, is a modern Californian restaurant rooted in Korean traditions that offers a single nightly tasting menu in its open-kitchen dining room. The menu develops spontaneously, guided by seasonal market availability. Chef Junsoo Bae blends his Korean upbringing and his expertise in French haute cuisine, having worked at such heavy hitters as The French Laundry, Bouley and Gramercy Tavern. Whatever's on offer, it always pushes the limits of Korean cuisine while paying homage to provenance, such as in the hay-smoked Wolfe Ranch quail, a signature dish.

I FLY TO SAN FRANCISCO

#### Bapoo Los angeles

The LA Times Restaurant of the Year winner is a serene, warm space in the city's Downtown district. Chef Kwang Uh's philosophy draws influence from - where else? -René Redzepi of Noma, as well as chef-monk Jeong Kwan's Buddhisminfluenced "temple cuisine". What unites both, as well as Uh's own cooking, is an adherence to traditional fermentation techniques, plus a deep respect for interconnectedness and balance. LA has long been a hotspot for traditional Korean food, but Baroo is leading a revolution in contemporary Korean cuisine in the city. The menu changes regularly but the main dish always comes with a wholesome bowl of rice flavoured with lotus sunchoke gaennip jangajji (perilla leaves), XO sauce and gamtae bugak (fried seaweed with a glutinous rice coating).

#### **\*STAR DISH**

Wild black cod braised in soy until caramel coloured, served with dongchimi (winter radish kimchi), lemongrass, buttermilk and green papaya – adding colour and delicate, precise hits of contrasting flavours.



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Away from the bustle of Borough Market, this tranquil space in London Bridge has been pushing Korean food in new directions since it opened in 2020. Husband-and-wife team Woongchul Park and Bomee Ki have cooked in some of Europe's best kitchens, and their food and patisserie is a marriage of Korean flavours with French technique. The signature daikon tarte tartin and final sweet bite of daechu (jujube) madeleine symbolise the restaurant's playful approach to fusion.

Version three of Sollip's umami-rich beef tartare, where the meat is seasoned with aged gochujang made in-house and encased in a gothic charcoal shell. It's all served alongside cured daikon and truffle cream.

In 2024, Jungsik became the first Korean restaurant in the US to have three Michelin stars. Opened in 2011 by Chef Yim Jung-sik, following the 2009 opening of his two-starred restaurant in Seoul, the accolade reflects his status as a pioneer of modern Korean fine dining. Executive chef Daeik Kim's cooking is meticulous and precise, but that's not to say it's overserious - you can expect a fair few twists throughout the menu, beginning with the opening dish, a brilliant reimagination of banchan. 00000

In South Africa's remote north-western corner, the Kalahari Desert blooms again thanks to a 50-year regeneration project that's seen the return of some of the continent's most endangered wildlife, finds Jessica Prupas

### MOVING

### QUIETLY,

we make our way through the thicket, kicking up terra cotta-coloured dust with each cautious step. The bush's spindly, spiky branches scrape at my skin as we follow our guide in single file. Wordlessly, he motions at us to crouch and stay quiet as we reach a clearing. Soon I see why: just in front of us, partially



obscured by more shrubbery, there is a pack of ravenous African wild dogs chowing down on a warthog carcass. If this – a rare sighting of one of the world's most endangered mammals – was the only sighting on today's game drive, I would have returned to our lodge happy. But soon we hear scampering feet to our left, and another half-dozen wild dogs loom into view. They stop just a few feet from us, ears alert, their Pollock-like spots illuminated by the golden sunrise.

"Welcome to the Kalahari," says our guide.

I'm at Tswalu, South Africa's largest private game reserve. Stretching 114,000 hectares over the country's wild north-western corner, this is the Kalahari Desert at its most untouched. Tswalu is a remarkable story of regeneration: 50 years ago, this was a patchwork of farms where the land looked drastically different to today. A black-and-white photo hanging in our lodge offers a mind-bending glimpse of Tswalu in the early 1970s – nearly barren, dotted sadly with a few scrubby bushes.

But the reserve's resident ecologist, Wendy Panaino, warns against easy narratives. "There are some stories about old farmland being degraded, and it's now being restored," she tells me after that day's game drive. "That's kind of subject to your opinions. In my opinion it gives the farming community a bad name, which is not what we want at all." She concedes that mistakes were made, but many farmers were doing their best with the information they had at the time. Still, she says, Tswalu has had major successes by taking a non-interventionist approach to conservation. "We haven't done a lot in the way of reintroducing vegetation, because nature does that for us. It's a completely intact system."

By mostly standing back and letting native flora regenerate, Panaino says they've created a "nice environment" for endangered animals to thrive. Here is where conservationists in Tswalu get a bit more hands-on: they've

It's a remarkable success story that makes Tswalu a leading voice within the conservation sphere and an example to other reserves across Africa.

Our guide, Juan - a sunburnt, Afrikaans-speaking man with boundless enthusiasm and a garrulous tongue - describes the reserve's unique environment as a "desert with a twist". Trundling along the bumpy dirt roads on the next morning's game drive, I can see what he means: this isn't some lifeless expanse of sand - it is remarkably green. Great swathes of brandy bush and blue bush blur as we drive past, while giant camelthorns shade the animals from the gruelling sun. Juan calls these icons of Africa "mother trees" - they are the lifeblood of the desert, feeding and communicating with all other plant life via vast underground fungal networks. "Every single place in the world will have that thing that makes its heart beat. What makes this place's heart beat is the camelthorn tree."

Indeed, it's under a camelthorn tree that we see our first herd of lions later








that day. Our tracker, Sibongiseni (or Sibo for short), spots some fresh markings and guides our Toyota Land Cruiser into the bush; an acrid smell tells us that the cats are close by and they've bagged themselves some breakfast. We stop so close I could reach my hand out and pet them, which Sibo explicitly warns me against. They surround a mangled kudu carcass, its intestines deposited a few inches away and swarming with flies. The cats – all lionesses of varying ages, the males having long ago departed the herd – growl and bare their teeth as they jostle for the meatiest bits, pulling muscles and gristle from cavernous ribs and chewing greedily.

"There's no prize for second place in the Kalahari," is a refrain Juan frequently comes back to. There certainly were no prizes for that kudu, and any other predator or prey who fails to weather the Kahalari's punishing conditions. It's tough going out here: not a drop of rain falls for three quarters of the year, and competition for food is fierce. Those rare species of predators that have rebounded



thanks to Tswalu's conservation efforts are sometimes numerous enough to cause other problems.

"We started the Cheetah Project because cheetahs were eating us out of house and home," Panaino tells me, referring to a programme they launched to track and manage their cheetah population, led by expert Elizabeth Overton and facilitated by Nelson Mandela University. "We needed to figure out, 'How many cheetahs is sustainable for us?' We pride ourselves on having strong research focus and moving more into that place where research informs management.

On the next morning's drive, we pursue a pack of cheetahs through the reserve's far north-western corner, where rolling, dune-dotted plains scorch in the early morning sun. As the cats skulk deeper into the bush, we hop out of the vehicle and follow them on foot. For a moment. it seems as though we've lost them - until we round a corner, and there they are, mere feet away. My heart thumps as I watch these slender animals whose sinewy bodies are built like spotted race cars - take a much-needed break from their (so far unsuccessful) hunt, panting heavily as they loll about on the patchy grass. Each one of the elegantly speckled cats sports a collar, indicating that their movements and behaviours are being tracked as part of the programme. Tswalu's cheetah and desert black rhino numbers have rebounded so well, the reserve has recently started

distributing some of their population to neighbouring reserves. "It's a huge feather in Tswalu's cap," Panaino says of this particular success. "And I'm not just saying that because I'm wearing the cap."

But the rarest encounter you'll have at Tswalu is with other people. In our three days at the reserve, we only encountered two other safari vans. This is by design: Tswalu's massive land and tightly controlled visitor numbers (a maximum of 40 adults can stay at the reserve at any given time) mean that you really do feel like you're out in some vast, untamed wilderness. Juan calls it "the closest

to the truth of reality", in that you can go miles without seeing another living soul – just how nature intended it. "I think the thing that surprises guests the most here is that you see amazing landscapes, but you hardly see any general game species," says Panaino. "But that's how it's supposed to be. And that's what makes it so special."

Not that our time on Tswalu lacks game sightings: apart from the lions, wild dogs and cheetahs, we also saw rhino (both white and desert black), wildebeest, giraffe, oryx and many more. But the encounters you have with each animal are intimate – there aren't many other places where you can pull up inches from a pack of ravenous lionesses and spend hours observing their kudu-flavoured feast, or hotfoot

after a rhino in a *Fast & Furious*-style chase, swerving branches rather than other vehicles as you make chase.

Nor are there many other reserves which offer such comfort. At the end of each game drive, Loapi camp awaits us – the newest accommodation on Tswalu, its six private, standalone lodges having opened in 2023. Each one is spaced 100m apart and out of sight from the others, giving guests the impression that they're alone for miles in the quiet, infinite-seeming depths of the Kalahari (apart from a private butler and chef, both of whom sleep next to the main lodge).

The cleverly designed structure is mostly steel-buttressed glass, taking in 360-degree sweeps of the Kalahari's epic beauty. Comparing that blackand-white photo, so bleak and lifeless, to what I see from my lodge's viewing deck after a very early morning drive - the sun still low in the cloudless sky, casting a honey glow over burnished horizons and stirring the chirruping, chattering life in the bush - is like night and day. I recall something Juan said earlier: "Nature can recover, you just have to let it sit." And thanks to that philosophy, I can recline here, in the middle of a slowly awakening wilderness, and just take in the view.

profusion of period details – stone fireplaces, mullioned windows, walnut sideboards, clawfoot baths, Madeira decanters – it has 107 acres of grounds to sashay around, with a putting course, tennis court and (naturally) croquet. 

the complete answer – it's posing the question.

## Your song *Oh, Mother* is outstanding.

#### You started out as a drummer – ever tempted to get back behind the kit?

The way I write is rhythmbased and melody-based, and how the two interact. Writing this record, I'd punch out the beats and we'd work from there – and I think that's quite healthy.

#### The record is punchy.

I wanted it to feel like a good mixtape, to feel fun. I wanted it to be this theatrical, character-driven thing – like an Annie Lennox or Grace Jones record.

#### You've been touring for more than a decade now - any neat travel tips?

Always take an eye mask - and eating in the new time zone as soon as you get on the flight.

#### How is your ADHD reflected in your art?


