



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

SEQUELS ARE BEING MADE OVER

The formula of pairing familiar actors with fresh faces is being ditched and something new taking its place, says Al Horner

> THIS SUMMER. DISASTER MOVIE

Twisters sent a question blowing through Hollywood: are we witnessing a comeback for standalone sequels? For a long time, that pejorative phrase was used to describe a film set loosely in the same universe as a previous box office smash, but without any of the old cast or characters. Oftentimes they were greenlit by the studio to make an easy buck. Home Alone 3 without Macaulay Culkin; Ace Ventura Jr and Evan Almighty without Jim Carrey... The list goes on.

Now, it's becoming the hot new trend in Hollywood franchise-making. For a decade, the box office has been dominated by so-called "legacy sequels" - spectacles that bring back old characters from classic franchises, played by their original actors and paired with rising stars who appeal to Gen Z. These films' inherent blend of nostalgia and new beginnings has been lucrative - 2015's Star Wars: Episode VII - The Force Awakens and Top Gun: Maverick (2022), rank among the highest-grossing films of all time.

When Twisters - a follow-up to 1996's Twister - was announced in June 2020. many assumed it would be a legacy sequel, with Helen Hunt's Dr Jo Harding surely likely to cameo alongside a cast of storm-chasing young guns. Instead, the film (available on Vera) takes the spirit of the original and charts its own course. Twisters has no characters from the original. In fact, it contains only one nod to the hit that spawned it - a

weather device for measuring tornadoes named Dorothy. When Dorothy is destroyed in the opening scene of the movie, it feels symbolic of a breed of sequels tearing up what came before and doing something new.

Ridley Scott's upcoming Gladiator 2 is said to have little connection to the epic from 2000. Liam Neeson, meanwhile, is soon to star in a standalone sequel to spoof smash The Naked Gun, hot on the heels of A Quiet Place: Day One, itself a

standalone prequel. All this, analysts will tell vou, comes not a moment too soon. Recent legacy sequels have struggled to strike a chord, suggesting that moviegoers are growing weary of nostalgia fests and want original takes on existing IP. This year's

Ghostbusters: Afterlife was a critical misfire, while Indiana Jones and the Dial of Destiny conspired to lose money in 2023.

BEFORE

Legacy sequels aren't totally over vet. of course. Tim Burton's recent Beetlejuice Beetlejuice - which saw original star Michael Keaton rub shoulders with Gen Z fave Jenna Ortega - was a box office hit. But if Twisters is anything to go by, a storm is coming to shake up sequels.

universal, as timeless, as beguiling, as Prince? With his exceptional sense of style and inimitable swagger, the pop idol was catnip to photographers. A new publication from ACC Art Books - simply titled Prince: Icon - looks at the Minnesota-born singer's hypnotic power in front of the lens.

Curated with the help of photographer and longtime Prince confidante Steve Parke, the coffeetable tome features more than 100 pages of candid photos, album covers and backstage snaps taken by the High Priest of Pop's nearest and dearest. There are a lot of private, intimate moments here that give invaluable insight into the man beneath the purple bell bottoms.


Personal essays from the singer's intimates including illustrious artists and photographers like Robert Whitman, Rob Verhorst and Jimmy Left to right: In Detroit on the Purple Rain Tour, 1984; design for the "million button jacket", which Prince wore on tour and in the video for Sexy MF, Paisley Park playground, 1990, and in Paris 1988

Steinfeldt – allow us a further peek into Prince's chaotic, creative world. One golden nugget comes from the singer's longtime costume designer, Stacia Lang, who describes her days working at Paisley Park, Prince's multi-use production facility outside Minneapolis. She remembers how, after spending the morning at her drawing table, she would hear "the wonderful rhythmic clicking of those famous high heels", signalling that her boss had come into work. "Every day, Prince looked impeccable," she writes. "With perfect make-up, coiffed hair and the bespoke clothing that was so expertly executed

in our fully staffed wardrobe workroom, he infused every moment with surreal beauty."

after her friend beefs up her resume in this year's Space Cadet. She's shipped off to Houston - NASA's real-life training facility - where it quickly becomes apparent that hiring her was an astronomical mistake. All the fish-out-of-water hilarity wasn't filmed in Texas, but in Huntsville, Alabama, at the US Space & Rocket Center. This museum opened in 1970, just after the Apollo 12 Moon landing, and displays Apollo-programme rockets and aircraft, as well as a bunch of other fascinating space-exploration artefacts. It's located within the Marshall Space Flight Center, NASA's biggest research site, which you can explore on a decidedly terrestrial vessel: a bus.

"I'm honoured to be called a scream queen"

She made her breakthrough with musical movie In the Heights. Now **MELISSA BARRERA** is killing it as horror's new sovereign

➤ MELISSA BARRERADIDN'T

always seem destined to become this decade's preeminent scream queen. A self-described "musical theatre geek" born and raised in the north-eastern Mexican city of Monterrey, the 34 year old grew up dreaming of the bright lights of Broadway and starred in the film version of Lin-Manuel Miranda's musical *In the Heights* before horror movies came calling.

It was after starring in the successful 2022 reboot of Scream and its sequel Scream VI that Barrera grabbed her chance to join the pantheon of horror greats alongside the likes of Halloween's Jamie Lee Curtis and star of The Exorcist Linda Blair. She's since made a string of thrilling. modern horror classics, including reuniting with Scream directors Tyler Gillett and Matt Bettinelli-Olpin for Abigail, a gory frightfest about a group of criminals who kidnap a young ballet dancer with a sinister secret.

When we speak, Barrera is on her way to get clothes fitted for an appearance at the Venice Film Festival, but from the back of a car speeding across Los Angeles she finds time to tell Vera about

her favourite scary movies, dealing with culture shock in New York and how a teenage crush on Hugh Jackman led her into the monstrous clutches of Abigail.

What are your memories of growing up in Monterrey?

I loved it. It's a beautiful mountain city with lots of things to do in nature. I had the best childhood there. Now that I'm thinking about having a family, I'm like, "Should I go back and try to give them the childhood I had?" There's great food on every corner, so no matter

where you go you're going to have an amazing meal. I still miss it.

You left to study musical theatre at New York's prestigious Tisch School of the Arts. Was the Big Apple everything you expected it to be?

It was a culture shock. It was my biggest dream to go to school in New York because Liust wanted to be on Broadway. When I got there it was overwhelming. During orientation week this dude said to me, "Hey, there's this students of colour meeting we should go to." I had no idea what that meant. That day was when I started to understand who I was in the United States and that people saw me as an other, as a minority. I enjoyed school while we were in class, though. I think that's probably why I like being an actor, that I can escape into another person's life.

How did that experience lead to you being cast in In the Heights?

For me, that was a dream 10 years in the

making. When I was in college In the Heights was on Broadway. I must have seen it like 16 times and I thought, "That's gonna be me one day." Ten years later I had lived an entire new life in Mexico City, doing soaps and theatre. I'd moved to LA and then the announcement for the movie of In the Heights came around. It was such a full-circle moment for me to be able to play that role.

The next year you landed a lead role in the reboot of Scream. Do you like scary movies?

I grew up obsessed with them. I was the friend that forced everyone at the sleepover to watch something really scary. I distinctly remember the Final Destination franchise being our go-to. To this day if I see a truck with logs on the back, I pull over.

What drew you to Abigail?

I love monsters! Vampires. Frankenstein, werewolves, anything related to monsters. I watched Van Helsing every day on repeat when it came out.

I was very much in love with Hugh Jackman, to be fair. I always thought being in a movie with creatures would be fun, so this was a no-brainer.

How do you feel about being called a "scream queen"?

Honoured! I know what that title means and all the iconic actresses that have

come before me. I get a lot of scripts for horror movies and I think it's some of the most fun vou can have as an actor. When else do you get covered in that much blood?

Your next film, *Your Monster*, seems tailor-made for you: a horror movie about musical theatre.

Isn't that crazy? I love musical theatre. I love horror. I love rom coms. There's a creature in it. It's like they put all the things I love in a blender. We shot the whole movie in 20 days and the ambitiousness was insane. There was even a whole musical that we actually shot at the end! It was crazy, but I've never laughed as much making a movie as I did making that one.

What does the future hold for you?

Right now I'm having sleepless nights choosing between a movie and a TV show. It feels like a *Sliding Doors* moment and I don't take it lightly. I hadn't worked all year but when it rains, it pours!

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► HOW DO YOU DEFINE WEIRD? IT'S A

nebulous question I was required to confront while compiling and writing An Opinionated Guide to Weird London, a dinky gazetteer documenting a trove of the strange and shadowy corners of this multifaceted metropolis. Does it evoke the merely quirky? The uncanny? Or something more outright sinister? In the end, I turned to the wisdom of the late cultural theorist Mark Fisher. The weird, he wrote in 2016's The Weird and the Eerie, encompasses "that which does not belong. The weird brings to the familiar something which ordinarily lies beyond it."

It's a sentiment that more than applies to London. Here, in our culturally fertile capital, the weird's roots and tendrils can be found everywhere: from its subterranean bedrock, to the viscous mud of the Thames foreshore, and the lofty eaves and spires of its vertiginous skyline. Layer upon layer of bizarre history, esoteric traditions and irreverent interventions become abundant when you start to notice them.



JEREMY BENTHAM'S AUTO-ICON. **BLOOMSBURY**

Revolutionary philosopher and founder of utilitarianism Jeremy Bentham's radical ideas continued well after dying. He demanded that, when he passed, his corpse be preserved and set on display at University College London. In 1832 he got his wish and

the smartly dressed stiff still sits pretty in a glass case in the Student Centre. Only the head is fake; the original, rendered grotesque by the conservation process, was for many years displayed in its own box above the icon but, after a spate of student thefts, was moved to safety in the archaeological department, where it remains.

AUTOMATION, **HOLBORN**

Engineer, inventor and broadcaster Tim Hunkin's pint-sized paean to the seaside arcades of old is an offbeat work of art. The machines on display are both windows into the man's gloriously fevered mind and, occasionally, vehicles for social commentary. Among the exhibits: a mechanised dash around an Amazonstyle fulfilment centre and a tugof-war on the "divorce simulator".

TOMB OF HANNAH COURTOY, WEST **BROMPTON**

With its austere avenues, weeping angel statues and snake-clad tomb doors, Brompton Cemetery passes as the spookiest of London's Magnificent Seven cemeteries. But the weird apex comes in the form of the tomb of Hannah Courtoy, who died in 1849. This cod-Egyptian

mausoleum is said to house a working time machine created by inventor Samuel Alfred Warner and Egyptologist Joseph Bonomi from mysterious hieroglyphs discovered on a dig (all funded by Courtoy herself). The tomb's imposing stature and mysterious symbols seem to support the theory, though the key is long gone.

A BRIT OF CLASS IN TRIBECA

The kaleidoscopically colourful **WARREN STREET HOTEL** is a love letter to English eccentricity

➤ KIT KEMP IS A PLAYFUL, VIVACIOUS

British designer with a knack for uncanny colour clashes and exquisitely judged eclecticism. New Yorkers, it seems, can't get enough of her. Behold, the Warren Street Hotel, Kemp's third opening in the city. Every surface, every wall, every fascia, inside and out, carries a charismatic, Kempish statement - like the baby blue facade, which stands out a mile in russetcoloured Tribeca; the buttercup-yellow lobby, punctuated with fine art, from skipping-stone tables to vivid Abstract Expressionist canvases; or the well-unholstered drawing room, all whimsical knick-knacks and knockout lampshades. Rooms rock Rococo oversized headboards, floor-to-ceiling windows and retro turntables with vinyl by Bowie and Buena Vista Social Club, best enjoyed marinading in aromatic bath products - pink pepper, cedar wood, patchouli - from Kemp's own cosmetics line. Downstairs, an elegant brasserie doles out NYC classics – steak au poivre, Long Island duck - on fine china, while next door The Orangery serves afternoon tea. Simply spiffing.

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HOUSE OF GODS **EDINBURGH**

Slap bang in the centre of town, this Orient Express-inspired masterpiece of maximalism is a visual feast of mirrorballs. Gucci flamingo wallpaper and flowery four-poster beds with in-built mood lighting.



FREEHAND, NYC


This Lexington Avenue hotel occupies a red-brick gaff that once housed a Prohibition-era bootleg operation. Its design is similarly storied, with Mid-Century furniture and custom pieces from emerging artists dotting every room.



THE MADRONA. **CALIFORNIA**

This historic Sonoma mansion. built in the 1880s, has been tastefully brought up to date by San Fran aesthete Jay Jeffers, with generous high ceilings, original fireplaces and top-tier textiles everywhere.

A HAPPY ACCIDENT IN MIAMI

Tart and sweet, Oops, I Burned the Key Lime Pie at **TORNO SUBITO** is a tongue-in-cheek triumph

Massimo Bottura's calibre - his three-Michelin-starred Osteria Francescana in Modena, Italy, is arguably the best restaurant in the world - are seldom renowned for their sense of humour. But when his pastry chef accidentally fumbled a dessert, Bottura celebrated by launching a deconstructed dish named Oops. I Dropped the Lemon Tart. Such playfulness sets the tone for his new opening. Torno Subito in Miami. Its plum rooftop location is decked out in jocular stripes and cartoonish colours - candy apple-red bar, Minionyellow pizza oven, stripy banquettes and a vibe that cheerfully identifies as "urban circus". The food? Top-tier tortellini with succulent pork and

Parmigiano Reggiano sauce (the stuffed pasta at Osteria Francescana is legendary). Less serious? Oops, I Burned the Key Lime Pie, a playfully overcooked dessert with citrus crumble, foam and lime ice cream, a tribute to blunders, missteps and mishaps of all kinds.

Tomatoes are hitting the sauce



ince chef Molly Baz broke the internet with her tomato martini, bars

around the world have followed suit. Relish a Greenhouse Highball at Seed Library, London, with single-malt whisky, celery, fermented cricket garum (an ancient condiment) and "Technicolor tomato" – tomato infused with

apricot. The Antipasti Dirty Martini at Caruso's Grocery, Washington, DC, mixes Moletto tomato gin with olive brine, mozzarella and basil. And the Heirloom Martini at NYC's Swan Room blends heritage toms, basil eau de vie – brandy, basically – and a generous slug of Grey Goose. Tastes mighty vine.

island is intense, but it has nothing on **SONEVA** FUSHI's glass studio. The furnace hits 1,300°C enough to melt empty bottles from the resort's restaurants into malleable, glowing orange globs, like the one I'm brandishing on the end of a 5ft-long blowpipe. Guided by resident artist Tala Kaalim, I dip the molten glass into a turquoise pigment then exhale through the pipe, making the orb slowly inflate like a white-hot balloon. It's rolled against a wooden block and hollowed out with tweezers until a new, cylindrical form emerges: a tumbler the colour of the Indian Ocean, shaped by my own breath. As souvenirs go, this is pretty special.

Bespoke recycled glassware by more experienced hands than mine can be found decorating Soneva Fushi's villas or displayed for sale in the (blissfully air-conditioned) boutique and art gallerv. Artists are invited to take up residency at this paradisiacal place and produce glassworks

to be sold here - an inspired way to recycle tonnes of waste glass.

Let's be honest, most vacationers haven't historically picked this tropical destination for its buzzing creative scene. But that might be changing. So GLASSCYCLE - the island nation's first and only hot glass studio - is part of a wider art-making movement emerging in Maldives tourism. Resorts have been launching their own gallery spaces and artist residencies. In-between snorkelling and sunbathing, vacationers are picking up paintbrushes or learning to throw

on pottery wheels. **JOALI** led the way, billing itself as the Maldives' first "art immersive" resort when it opened in 2019. Site-specific installations are dotted through its manicured grounds, from Zemer Peled's porcelain coral-inspired forms in the spa to Porky Hefer's woven manta ray installation among the palm trees. THE ART HOUSE offers weekly classes in pottery and painting. Flexing its creative chops further, Joali enlisted Tatiana Gecmen-Waldek, an art consultant for the likes of Armani and Cartier, to curate its inaugural Art Week festival in April last year. Programming included a virtual-reality experience by Jeanne Susplugas and hand-embroidery demonstrations by Maldivian sisters Hajja and Joule. The dates of the next festival are yet to be announced, but keep an eye on their calendar.

Like Joali, **PATINA MALDIVES** has an island-wide art trail - monumental photographic prints, handwoven tapestry and a beachfront installation of Left: Blowing glass at Soneva Fushi



mirrored columns are all part of the mix. There's an impressive line-up of workshop spaces for crafting unique souvenirs, complete with laser-cutting machine, woodworking tools or 3D printer. THE CLAY STUDIO offers wheel-throwing sessions, pot painting or even moulding clay structures to add to the resort's artificial reef as part of coral conservation efforts. FARI ART ATELIER, the resort's creative hub, has a permanent collection plus a show of eco-themed abstract canvases created

by Sassan Behnam-Bakhtiar during his 2024 residency. The Iranian-French artist has turned ground-up shells and corals from the island's shores into natural pigments.

Infusing these tropical islands with artworks not only gives guests something nice to look at during their stay, it can also support the Maldivian creative community in turn. Although capital city Malé has a flourishing arts scene, few visitors experience it on their way to resort stays. Bringing galleries and workshops in-house, then, is a chance to platform local talent and heritage crafts. Take ONE&ONLY REETHI RAH. Its patron, Maldivian painter Kurahaa Rappe, runs an academy in Malé for emerging artists, and handpicks the most promising for stints as Artistic Guides at the resort's studio as well as showcasing their own work in The Gallery.







On top of offering painting classes and exhibitions in its serene lakeside studio, KANDIMA MALDIVES stages one of the country's biggest creative gatherings, KULA Art Festival, each January. THE NAUTILUS has a pop-up beachside gallery planned for the upcoming holiday season, part of its ongoing Art of Bohemia programming. Maldivian artists are creating site-specific eco-themed pieces for VILLA PARK's new art trail, while the resort's Coconut Craft Hut showcases islanders' ingenuity with this abundant natural ingredient. The complimentary craft classes at SUN SIYAM also make use of found objects like palm leaves or driftwood. One thing's for sure, in a destination as naturally beautiful as the Maldives, no aspiring artist is going to be stuck for inspiration.

Could you fake a Moon landing?

How easy would it be to duplicate man stepping on Earth's nearest natural satellite - as in rom com Fly Me to the Moon? asks Ralph Jones

man landed on the Moon? As well being the perfect ice-breaker at weddings, this is a conspiracy theory that has hounded space professionals for decades. Some people think Neil Armstrong didn't step on the Moon in 1969 and that the whole thing was cooked up in a film studio.

In Fly Me to the Moon, Scarlett Johansson plays an ad executive tasked with staging a faked Moon landing in case the real one doesn't go to plan - a scenario that plenty of Moonspiracists believe. But, in tech-savvy 2024, would we be fooled by this ploy? And how could it be accomplished?

Richard Costin, co-founder of VFX company Rumble, is confident that our eyes could certainly be deceived. But the illusion wouldn't be straightforward. "The key, if you genuinely wanted to fool people, would be to try and undersell it," he says. If Costin was hired by NASA to pull the wool over people's eyes, he would make sure the footage was "simple and realistic", rather than shiny and glamorous as it is in the movies. The difference between Hollywood and real life. of course, is that real life is more boring.

Instead of George Clooney, whose face would be hidden beneath a space helmet, it would make more sense to use stunt performers or dancers, Costin says. In order to emulate Moon movement. you would need people who could easily simulate other people's actions. (Costin says he might give Andy Serkis a call, in fact.) The trickiest element would be having the astronauts bounce up and down convincingly. Instead of attempting this digitally - far too much work - Costin thinks they could be on a circus rig and the VFX team would paint out the wires in post-production.

His instinct is to cleave as closely to the original 1969 footage as possible - with some concessions, like the quality of the camera, for example. A team would build a real surface that looked like the Moon; the background would be black, potentially with a tiny Earth visible in the distance; and, when performers stepped on the ground, dust would come off it. One of Costin's VFX jobs would be to

depict this dust coming off the boots in a way that looked consistent with zero gravity, not a studio in Beaconsfield.

Another key element would be having a scientific consultant nearby - not a problem, of course, if NASA is funding the fakery. This would mean that questions about whether stars should be visible (they aren't in the original footage) or whether the American flag should be waving (it is in the original),

could be answered confidently. Without this, any VFX team would be open to being exposed.

So, with Costin's help, you absolutely could make everyone look really silly for believing we landed on the Moon again. As we did land on it the first time. You do know that, right? Right...?

VERDICT: With VFX and a science consultant, anything is possible, baby.







He gives the wounded animal a wide berth and pulls up alongside a sheriff already on the scene, exchanging a few words of concern and expressing brotherly solidarity with the lawman's watchful task. A moment later we pull away, continuing our winding descent from the remote Malibu film ranch where the 56 year old has spent the morning being photographed for the cover of this month's Vera. For the first time in the few hours we've spent together, Brolin falls into a contemplative silence.

The Oscar-nominated star of No Country For Old Men and Avengers: Endgame may have inherited his surname and his good looks from his TV-famous father, James Brolin, but he wasn't born into a movie career. Rather than spending his childhood amid the glitz and sheen of Hollywood, Brolin grew up with dirt under his fingernails on a ranch outside Paso Robles, several hours north up the California coast, where his fierce and unpredictable mother Jane Cameron Agee kept a sort of menagerie. "Whether I was birthing mountain lions, or cleaning wolf cages, or feeding 65 horses at 5.30 in the morning at eight years old... it was a pain in the ass," Brolin tells me with a grin that breaks through his powder-white goatee. "But I look back on it now and I'm happy. Once directed properly, it gave me the ability to face fear in a very productive way... like with writing this book."

The book in question is From Under the Truck, Brolin's new memoir that's about as far from a clichéd celebrity autobiography as you're ever likely to encounter. He calls publishing it "the scariest thing I've ever felt in my life". It's a raw, surprising and deeply affecting work from a man who dreamed of being a writer long before he ever stumbled his way into his father's profession. "It's what I've always loved, number one," he tells me earnestly

about writing. "I've never not done it every day."

From Under the Truck throws out conventions like chronological time to skip back and forth between tales of love and loss, professional victories undone by alcoholism, childhood trauma and drug-fuelled teenage escapades. There are skittering poems, romantic vignettes and keenly observed dialogues that read like kitchen-sink dramas. At the heart of it all there's Jane, a hard-drinking, rabble-rousing, largerthan-life character who preached the gospel of country and western, and raised her son to be an ass-kicker in her own image before driving drunk into a tree and dying at 55. "I had no plan to write a book. I just started writing and then when I finished I realised I was 55," Brolin says softly. "I went, 'Jesus Christ, I thought my mom was old when she died.' I thought she'd lived a good, full life. I realised she was young, super young. There was a whole other life to be lived."

Brolin's own life is proof of the possibility of second acts and even further

reinventions beyond that. At 13 he was dropping acid in the Santa Barbara suburb of Montecito, a member of a punk rock surf crew known as the Cito Rats, watching friends die young and assuming a similar fate awaited him. When his mother predicted he'd follow in his father's footsteps, he pushed back hard. "I don't know if I've ever told anybody this," he says, running a hand through his salt-and-pepper hair. "At one point she said, 'You know you're going to be an actor.' I had no interest in acting. Zero. I didn't care for what my dad did. It made him go away a lot. The fluctuations in money made no sense to me. I hated that she said that. It made me hate it even more."

Things changed when he took a high school improv class. He liked making people laugh by transforming into someone else, liked having to think on his feet. When he was kicked out of home he went to stay on his dad's couch. "I just started going on audition after audition," he remembers. "Maybe the Brolin name made people curious, but I also know people tried to stop me getting jobs because I was Brolin's son. *The Goonies* was like the 300-and-something audition. I went back in six times because they wanted to make sure I was right for that part." He was and a bandana-wearing,

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17-year-old Brolin made his screen debut in the much-loved adventure classic in 1985. "It was a silver platter experience," he says. "It was all downhill after that!"

Almost before he realised it, Brolin's promising future was behind him. He followed *The Goonies* with a string of forgotten films. "What did I do after *Goonies*?" Brolin asks rhetorically. "I was in the business 22 years and nobody cared." In the book, Brolin juxtaposes his memories of *Goonies* with his impressions of landing the lead role in the Coen brothers' Oscar-winning *No Country for Old Men* over two decades later. "Those are the two milestones," he explains.


The role remade his career overnight. "Before *No Country* I wasn't making any money," Brolin says matter-of-factly, explaining he took up day trading to support his two kids from his first marriage to actress Alice Adair. "I was always a numbers person, the geek in school that would ask the

math teacher for extra work, so I was good at it. I realised I was watching fear and greed, and success had everything to do with discipline. I made more money trading than I'd ever made from acting up to that point."

After No Country, he had his pick of roles and specialised in giving masculine archetypes thoughtful dimension. He earned an Oscar nomination in 2009 for rendering the "pathetic" Dan White sympathetic in Gus Van Sant's Milk, and gave vivid life to the frozen-banana-inhaling, hippie-stomping cop "Bigfoot" Bjornsen in Paul

Thomas Anderson's sublime stoner noir *Inherent Vice*. Days before shooting the latter, Brolin and his now-wife Kathryn Boyd were on a drunken night out in Costa Rica when a stranger stabbed him in the gut. Only the fluke that the blade went directly into the thick umbilical ligament around his belly button saved his life. "I'm not going to win the lottery," he says, shaking his head with a laugh at his luck. "I just get to live."

It was one of many moments that convinced Brolin, in 2013, that it was time to get sober. "I'm not proud of a lot of stuff I did," he reflects. "I was pretty crazy back then. I was very reactive when I drank." He recognised the darker sides of his mother's character in himself and realised he didn't want his story to end the way hers had, "Having a mother like Jane was amazing, but it was also awful," he says. "I don't really wish that on anybody." He wanted something different for his own kids. "It wasn't necessarily a conscious choice, but it's about breaking that chain. I think they thought, 'He's a good dude, but he's crazy.' That was the general perception. When I first got sober, [musician] Eddie Vedder said to me, 'Surprise everyone with a happy ending."

So he did. He rose to a new challenge: blockbuster roles such as Thanos – the finger-snapping baddie bent on wiping out half of all life – in the box office-conquering Avengers films. Then

there were meaty collaborations with Denis Villeneuve in tightly wound thriller *Sicario* and both instalments of sci-fi epic *Dune*. More importantly, for Brolin, there was the chance to prove himself the writer he'd always hoped to become. Along with the memoir he's written a play, *A Pig's Nest*, also partly inspired by his wild, wildlife-filled upbringing. Meanwhile, at home, he sees bright flashes of his mother's sense of freedom in his two young daughters, whose toy unicorns and baby dolls are strewn colourfully around inside the truck.

We're finally nearing the base of the mountain. As we hit the layer of fog that lingers above the Pacific Coast Highway, our phones chirrup to life to let us know we've returned to the zone of phone reception. I tell Brolin he can drop me anywhere I can call a car, but he won't hear of it. He's already decided he's driving me home himself, hours out of his way. Maybe because he can't bring himself to leave me stranded on the roadside, like the deer up the mountain. Maybe because he hasn't finished telling me about the surprise of a happy ending.

Right before his mother died in 1995, he was visiting her at home when he found her crying in the kitchen. Not from pain, but from pride. She was developing a TV idea about animal rescues and for the first time in her life felt she was being taken seriously. "Her whole life she had felt like the woman with the beard, the snake with two heads," Brolin explains. "She was just opening up to the fact that maybe she wasn't just a freak... and then she died. For me to live that out and to get past my own reactive Cito Rat mentality... there was survivor's guilt for a while, but now it's up to me to celebrate every moment I get to keep going."



In India, a growing number of music fans are swapping Spotify for turntables and lovingly curated record collections.

Tamara Hinson heads to Mumbai to meet the people at the forefront of the country's record revolution



Mumbaicone shoplar.

Avan Roy carefully drops the needle onto his next record - Pink Floyd's Money. As its heavy bass fills the room, the gaggle of locals seated around the small space nod approvingly, buzzing to dissect that night's selection and swap fresh perspectives with fellow music nerds.

Welcome to Ink 'n' Brew's vinyl listening session, where Mumbai musos gather around a turntable to listen to carefully curated records and share their love of wax (and occasionally tatts - it's also a tattoo parlour). These weekly

summits are popular - attendees are seated cheek-by-jowl when I visit. It makes sense, since a growing number of Indians are ditching streaming services and rediscovering the joys of analogue music. This is most evident in Mumbai, where record shops are opening at pace and vinyl-lover meetups fill the social calendar.

While British cities experienced their own vinyl revivals around a decade ago, fuelled by middle-aged music fans nostalgic for the good old days, many of Mumbai's new vinyl fans are Gen Z. Roy, who is hosting tonight's listening session, is 18 years old, born long after vinvl's first wave. He says his love of the format stems partly from a desire to disconnect from the tech that fills our every waking moment. "It's the physical element," he says. "It's about removing the record from the sleeve, putting it on the turntable and flipping it over. It's about having music in my hands, not on my phone. When I listen to Spotify I'll end up texting someone - it's easier to get distracted."

These listening events provide opportunities to enjoy vinyl without splurging on records and turntables - although more young Indians are

doing just that. For those who want to invest, their first port of call is India Record Co. It's India's first femaleowned independent record store, headed by Nehal Shah. Her west Mumbai office feels like a slick co-working space, complete with leaf-print wallpaper and framed album artwork on the walls.

Records are stored off-site and meetings with clients are by appointment only, almost always soundtracked by a much-loved record spinning on the turntable. Today, she opts for Billy Joel, dropping the needle on 52nd Street and unleashing the guitar riffs of opener Big Shot.

The 35 year old's duties range from sourcing rare cuts for clients to curating music collections and recommending turntables. She refers to her customer base as a community, one whose members connect via the meet-ups she organises and the WhatsApp groups she has created. "Recently, a 17-year-old Swiftie from the group chat sent me a video in which she introduced a 55-year-old member to Taylor

Swift," she says, "He then introduced her to John Coltrane," Nehal's music tastes are similarly diverse. "I'll often listen to hip hop in the morning and jazz in the afternoon," she says, adding that vinyl broadens her tastes. "Before [discovering records], I'd get closed off - I'd listen to Pink Floyd on Spotify and it would suggest similar music. Algorithms decided my favourite music, not me."

As another example of the power of vinyl to expand one's horizons she mentions Hema, a 64-year-old Bangalorean woman who credits Nehal with her newfound love of funk. "Last year her son got in touch because he wanted to buy

her a turntable and some records," says Nehal, who put together a starter vinvl collection of what she refers to as "classics" - such as Abba and Green Day, "She'd never been interested in vinyl and scolded him for spending so much." However, Nehal's carefully curated record selection piqued her interest and Hema now has more than 200 records. It didn't stop there. "She wanted to learn how to mix and persuaded a Bangalore DJ to teach her the basics. Recently, she played a set at one of our events. She says vinyl changed her life."

Nehal also wants more artists to see vinyl as a legitimate format. "Some of my favourite Indian indie artists aren't on vinyl and I want to preserve their music," she says. "The music my grandfather loved is still alive because there was this physical transformation - the music was pressed. If Sinatra's music had only been on Spotify, would we still be listening to it?"

Her one bugbear? She wishes the new generation of vinyl fans treated their records with more TLC. "Much of my time is spent educating my clients about how to clean their records. My




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grandparents' generation would spend one day a month washing their records," says Nehal, who offers cleaning and maintenance services. "[But my clients'] attitude is: 'Take my money and clean my records, I don't have time." She laughs when she imagines her grandfather's reaction. "He'd say, 'There's no

way you're touching my records."

Nehal's love of music was shaped partly by her grandfather, who introduced her to his vinvl collection, including records from old Bollywood stars. The Bollywood record market was a major driver of vinyl sales in the country, produced domestically by The Gramophone Company India (now called Saregama). But when the 90s rolled around and cassette tapes became king, vinyl production ceased almost completely in India.

Now, most of the vinyl sold in India is pressed in Eastern Europe and extras such as import duties explain why records

cost twice as much here. Independent musicians are wary of pressing records that won't sell but Nehal, determined to prove there's an untapped market, recently convinced several artists to let her press their music. The records, pressed in Germany and produced under the Indian Record Co banner, sold in a flash. "Now these artists realise there's a market for vinyl, too."

Pilak Bhatt, a 65-year-old former accountant and current owner of Music Circle, a bijou record shop north of the city, admits vinyl's high price point is an obstacle for some. Nevertheless he tells me he's seeing more and more young customers come into his shop, many of whom have had their interest piqued by vinyl-loving relatives. "One of the reasons vinyl is popular again is

because Indians have a lot of disposable income right now," he says. As we chat, his sari-clad assistant Hemangi flits between ceiling-height shelves, meticulously cataloguing their 25,000 records. "Other countries are in recession, but India's GDP is growing."

Pilak, who sources records from private collectors and record fairs worldwide, says this appetite hasn't gone unnoticed by Indian musicians. "We're seeing more art-

> ists putting out records and Bollywood artists remastering old tracks on vinyl." Does he ever regret swapping suits for Santana T-shirts, like the one he's wearing today? "Absolutely not," he says. "I just love spreading the joy of music."

> His regulars include 31-yearold Kinjal Gosar, who's typical of this new breed of vinyl fans. At her Mumbai apartment, a turntable takes pride of place in the lounge. Kinjal's love of vinyl was nurtured at listening sessions at Adagio, a guitar store and co-working space which hosts regular events for Mumbai's growing army of vinyl devotees. Today, her record collection spans many genres and includes numerous rarities, such as the Christmas compilation album released by now-defunct UK label Ronco Records in 1973. She opens the double-sided sleeve to show me a

spectacularly intricate pop-up landscape depicting snow-dusted cottages and a reindeer-pulled sled.

stop-shop for music lovers. She doesn't have a shopfront because her business is more than a record store - she not only sells records, turntables, speakers and amplifiers, but also sets up sound systems for her clients and helps them choose equipment. Her clients range from veteran vinvl fans searching for rarities such as the collectors' edition of Bob Marley and the Wailers' The Complete Island Recordings - currently listed at £633 on Drocer's website - to teenagers who've decided

to embrace the world

of analogue. For these people, Kinjal acts as a guiding hand, putting together starter-pack record collections and selecting accessible turntables for novices.

Many of her customers fell in love with old LPs during Covid, when they were stuck at home with parents whose record collections had previously gone unnoticed. "They started taking an interest in vinyl," says Kinjal, adding that records offered a tactile experience at a time when many spent enforced lockdowns glued to screens. "When you're listening to Spotify, the music becomes white noise,

Kinjal is determined to make vinyl more accessible, not just through the listening parties she now helps organise at places like record shop Adagio, but by making it more affordable, using her knowledge of hardware to recommend sound systems within her customers' budgets. "I don't want to upsell - I want to help them get whatever they need for the budget they have, and when they come to me, we'll start with a conversation about what they can afford." Despite the higher costs, she feels India's vinyl revival is in safe hands. "Gen Zs love their music and are the people who will carry this on, and they're ready to invest."







> dangerously close. But chasers are often the first to report dangerous weather and help with rescue efforts.

In Twisters they use tech to control storms. Is that real?

Silver iodide for seeding clouds - and launching absorbent materials to tame storms - works in theory. But the sheer scale of supercells, and the logistical challenge of getting enough absorbent material to site, is

far-fetched.





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

True crime podcasts are wildly popular. But do hosts sometimes go too far in pursuit of ratings, asks Hannah Verdier?

> LISTERNERS ARE THIRSTY FOR THEIR NEXT

true crime fix. And here's the rub. Some podcasters, like Emily Nestor, go rogue trying to satisfy demand, recklessly stirring up trauma in pursuit of content. That's the conceit of new documentary *Citizen Sleuth*. Its focus is Nestor, who has no background in forensics, crime or legal journalism. Just buckets of curiosity – and a love of murder stories.

On her podcast *Mile Marker 181*, Nestor was determined to convince listeners a mildly suspicious road accident was in fact a murder. She's not the first podcaster to chance her arm. *Serial* kick-started the true crime boom 10 years ago. Sarah Koenig's sleeper hit pod uncovered fresh evidence in the case of Adnan Syed, who was jailed for the murder of

his girlfriend Hae Min Lee. Serial's fame provoked new interest in Syed's plight and he was freed – though his conviction was eventually reinstated. Distressingly, Lee's family felt it "reopened wounds".

Dabbling in people's personal lives can be damaging for all involved. The hosts of the *Morbid* podcast, Ash Kelley and Alaina Urquhart,

ran into trouble with their discussion of Brittanee Drexel's murder: their gossipy conjecture led to the vague conclusion that the victim's friends were involved, sparking online hate.

Despite the consequences for the victims, there's a big market out there, even for recounting grisly closed cases. That's what another podcast, *My Favourite Murder*, does. They even sell "Stay sexy, don't get murdered" merch. Think that's in poor taste? *Missing in Arizona* uses AI to recreate the voice of a man wanted for killing his wife and children.

In Citizen Sleuth we see Nestor unravel for want of evidence. It's impossible not to get drawn in. She gets a "True Crime" tattoo, and conducts a cringworthy interview with the local sheriff. Maybe some jobs are best left to the professionals after all.


