



PUTTING CINEMA ON THE COUCH

From "gaslighting" to "trigger", therapy speak is all over Hollywood's latest blockbusters - call it "safe space cinema," says Al Horner

► HERE'S SOMETHING TO MEDITATE ON:

have you noticed that the protagonists of your favourite films suddenly sound like they're on the couch at Dr Melfi's office? Call it "safe space cinema" - lately, multiplexes have been inundated with blockbusters that reflect how therapy has become a huge part of moviegoers' lives since the turn of the millennium. It all arguably started with Inside Out in 2015 - a film ahead of the curve in terms of how it portrayed mental health on screen. Centred on a girl named Riley (Kaitlyn Dias), whose actions are controlled by five emotions at a control panel in her mind, the Pixar smash taught a generation of kids (and adults) that it's okay to not be okay - a message that audiences embraced en masse.

Skip forward nine years, and films incorporating the language and ideas of therapy culture like Inside Out are very much in vogue right now. Obviously, there's the inventive and at times heartbreaking Inside Out 2 (available to watch on Vera), which quickly became the highest-grossing animated movie of all time on release this summer, winning over audiences and critics alike. The even grander success of this sequel - now featuring more complex emotions like Anxiety and Ennui as characters - makes sense when you stop to think about it. Mental health is a far bigger consideration in today's society, with a reported 55.8 million Americans currently in therapy compared to 34m a decade ago.

As therapy waiting lists have ballooned, so too have examples of "therapy speak" in movies. Recent horror comedy Renfield saw the titular vampire assistant talking about being in a "codependent relationship" with Dracula. Teen comedies like Booksmart and Bottoms are now full of characters discussing what "triggers" them and the importance of "establishing boundaries". And last year, Jamie Lee Curtis went viral for repeatedly


describing the latest Halloween movie as being about "trauma", a bedrock phrase for psychoanalysts. When knife-wielding horror icon Michael Myers becomes a vessel for mentalhealth awareness, you know we're in new territory.

Not everyone is on board: some critics have accused filmmakers of trivialising mental health in their films, deploying words like "gas-


lighting" in ways that rob the actual phrase of its potency in real life. For others, though, it's a positive development, helping audiences - especially young ones - articulate their own inner emotional states.

Whatever your stance, after the enormous success of Inside Out 2, you can expect more movies that grapple with mental health issues and emotions - like therapy with a side of popcorn, self-care with a super-sized soda.

"Lee Miller is my most inspiring role"

KATE WINSLET tells Jessica Prupas why it took quite so long to bring the photographer's story to screen

right? She can hold her breath for seven minutes and 15 seconds (a skill she learned for underwater shoots on Avatar: The Wav of Water), she can survive out-of-control house fires (like when she lived through a blaze that broke out on Sir Richard Branson's private island estate and helped his 90-year-old mum to safety), and she can wow audiences in every role she plays - from *Titanic*'s Rose to the delightfully bonkers Chancellor Elena Vernham in this year's outrageous political satire, The Regime.

So you'd think, if the Oscar-winning actor wanted to make a film about Lee Miller - the fashion model and Man Rav muse who became a World War II correspondent - it would be a cinch. But it took Winslet almost 10 years to get the film out into the world.

Why? Well, it's partially that Winslet and her creative partner - Antony Penrose, Lee Miller's son and author of The Lives of Lee Miller, on which the film is based - wanted to get it right. "We want to tell her story as a woman." Winslet tells me. "Not through the labels that were slapped on her - the muse. the ex-model, the former cover girl." They also began development before the eruption of #MeToo, which Winslet says "created a platform" for women's stories to be told in new ways. Vera spoke with the megastar about finally putting her passion project out into the world, and what she learned from playing such a "phenomenal" woman.

Lee was very moving, I thought. The Holocaust is very close to my family...

Oh, I'm so sorry. For [costar] Andy Samberg, it was phenomenally hard as a Jewish man. When we filmed that particular section, we were really ruthless with ourselves creatively. We only followed the facts in terms of what Lee and Davey [photographer David Scherman] saw. The thing we had to really remember is that this is a film about a woman. It's a film about her emotional war, with the backdrop being World War II. And the phenomenal courage that she had to be the voice for those voiceless victims. When we shot those Dachau sequences, we were quite sparse in terms of shot sequences, so not over-covering things, not digging too deeply into things that we don't know whether Lee witnessed or not. We tried to be as respectful as we possibly could because Lee lived her life with incredible integrity but also passion, compassion and respect. As a filmmaking group of women, it was important to us that we took her lead.

It struck me that Lee lived the life of a true artist. Do vou think one can still live the kind of artist life Lee did?

I actually know someone who does, but that someone is a man. I certainly think it's a lot harder, because I think that now people's means of business is displaying their work often digitally or through social media in a world that can be quite aggressive sometimes and can be quite critical in a way that I'm not sure is necessarily supportive to art. I stay away from the digital world and social media myself in order to actually protect my own creativity and integrity, and that thing of that negative white noise that can sometimes creep into one's psyche and can make you

question your integrity and your creative truth and intentions. I will say that playing Lee Miller was the most inspiring role by far that I've ever been asked to inhabit. She has left a lasting impression on me in terms of... her acceptance of herself, her celebration of herself and her close personal relationships. And really throwing herself at life full throttle because life is so short.

Why do you think it took this long to tell Lee's story?

[Laughs] I can tell you exactly why. Well. first of all, many people have tried to make films about Lee Miller in the past. Antony Penrose told me very early on, in 2015, "I've read many screenplays. Many people have had a stab at this." And I asked, why weren't those films made? And he said, "Because no one really captured her." And often, from what I gather, people would always start from the period of her life that included Man Ray or Picasso. You know, these significant male figures who, if you put these characters on film and bring them back to life, they can be quite

a dominating presence because they were hugely significant artistic people then and historically are. It took a long time to distil which decade of her life was the one that was the most important. The film is based on The Lives of Lee Miller, and that book is entirely about her life going through the war and the price that she paid to reveal the truth about the atrocities of the Nazi regime, when so much was being covered up.

DIFFERENCE TO HAVE THE WORLD MORE RECEPTIVE TO HEARING FEMALE-DRIVEN STORIES ABOUT **PHENOMENAL WOMEN**



It took you a long time to get this made. Was there ever a point where you were like. I'm giving up?

No, I never had a moment where I wanted to give up. As I became closer and closer to Antony Penrose, I realised just how important it was to him to tell this story. And as time went by, the world around us changed. The #MeToo movement happened while we were still in development stages and suddenly women's voices were being heard in a completely new way. That makes a difference, to have the world more receptive to hearing female-driven stories about phenomenal women who perhaps they didn't know enough about before.

Why do you think Lee never spoke to Antony about her experience in the war when she was alive?

There was a code of silence. Anyone who went through the traumas of World War II, they just wrapped it around everything. They didn't talk about it. She [Lee] had phenomenal PTSD. She had struggled with alcohol because of it. She struggled parenting her only child because of it. Antony, who has spoken at length about his difficulties being raised by Lee, never understood what was wrong with her, or what was wrong with him.

You said you worked with a neuroscientist for The Regime. What was the most surprising thing you learned about the way trauma manifests in the body?

Between the age two and four, if a child is exposed to significant trauma in that age, it can have a lasting impact on speech patterns and the learning of speech. I had no idea about that. I also had no idea that there are some neuroscientists who are able to reverse stammers or speech impediments in some form through a process of brain training. I found all that really fascinating.

You seemed to have a lot of fun playing Chancellor Elena Vernham in The Regime. Is having fun in a role important to you?

[Laughs] No! No! That doesn't usually come into play. But it was certainly refreshing for me to have an opportunity to play someone who is as outrageous and sometimes ridiculous as Flena Vernham.

BRUTALISM'S DETRACTORS SAY THE

architectural style is too harsh, too cold, too rigid. But look closer: there are signs of life growing in the cracks of its concrete buildings. These little corners – where the harsh edges of Brutalism are blunted by plant life – are the subject of a new book from Hoxton Mini Press, *Brutal Plants*.

The book is based on author Oliva Broome's Instagram account of the same name, which she's been running since 2018. Growing up in Switzerland, Broome became a fan of the much-derided, mid-century style pioneered by such British architects as Alison and Peter Smithson, and Ernő Goldfinger. She wanted to show the world Brutalism's softer side and so @brutalistplants was born.

Brutalist Plants compiles the best, most intriguing photography from the Instagram account's six years

of existence, including images of the zigzagged lines of the Geisel Library at UC San Diego, the Le Corbusier-designed Mill Owners' Association Building in western India and, of course, that

sovereign of Brutalism, the Barbican in London. Juxtaposed against the hulking architecture, these plants remind us that most things are only temporary – Brutalism, once all the rage, went out of fashion after two decades. Nowadays, its buildings are "ever-oscillating between being listed and being demolished," writes Broome in the book. Her advice, then, is to

"make the most of all your palaces".

Raw line-caught wild fish at **AVERY**, Edinburgh, from a newly landed American chef is quite the catch

Wages grew up in Kansas. After a long stint in the kitchen at California's celebrated French Laundry he opened his own gaff. named Avery, in San Francisco. Covid wasn't kind to that spot, so flash-forward a few years to a family holiday in Edinburgh, where Wages decided he'd start anew. bringing West Coast savoir-faire to the bountiful larder of seasonal Scottish produce. This all-new Avery does extraordinary things with those local goodies. Game bird "haggis", with pigeon breast, heart and liver on a bed of thistles with whisky sauce and cherry. Foraged gems like rock samphire, scurvy grass (aka "Scottish wasabi"), and Wages' signature tortellini with

mushroom broth, roasted garlic and burnt onion. The pièce de résistance on the handwritten menu? The modestly named "raw fish", linecaught mackerel from off the rugged Caledonian coast, cured in seaweed, seasoned in sauce brewed from its own bones. Truly off the scale.

Manhattan bolthole THE GREENWICH HOTEL doffs its cap to craftmanship with ravishing vintage interiors

➤ THE GREENWICH HOTEL - ONE OF

lower Manhattan's most sought-after stays, in the celeb-dense Tribeca neighbourhood - is all about exquisite taste. Which makes sense, given that one of its owners is Robert De Niro, whose suave, timeless style clearly has an influence here. From top to bottom, it's a love letter to craftsmanship. Behold the Pennsylvania red-brick facade, with doors hewn from reclaimed Civil War-era timber. Or the zen Shibui Spa, crowned with 250-year-old wood and bamboo farmhouse ceilings imported from Japan, Italianate ceramics, Tibetan silk rugs and lofty Parisian ceilings all cinch the globetrotting vibe. Guest rooms, many of which underwent a recent spruce-up, represent the apogee of quiet luxury: heavy walnut desks, Carrara-marble bathrooms. Downstairs, the Drawing Room feels decidedly Old World with its tan leather armchairs. French windows and wood-burning fireplace, Locanda Verde restaurant - a coveted

NYC Italian in its own right. also recently updated - does soulful lamb pappardelle and ravedabout "arandmother's" ravioli. They don't make them like this any more.









NOBU HOTEL, LONDON

The striking timber and glass exterior of this Shoreditch style icon beautifully expresses the lofty mission of this hotel built around the principles of its world-class restaurant, inspired by chef Nobu Matsuhisa's years spent studying Japanese cuisine.



AVALON HOTEL LOS ANGELES



streets of Los Angeles is the thrill of rounding a street corner and walking into a scene straight out of the movies. After a century of filmmaking it's hardly surprising that Hollywood has immortalised so much of its home town on screen - but it can be a pleasant revelation to discover that not only are your heroes' favourite haunts real, they're actually open and serving lunch.

There are few better examples of this phenomenon than the legendary MUSSO & FRANK GRILL, a storied Hollywood restaurant that dates from 1919 and boasts a rich history on and off screen. A favoured hangout dating back to silent era icons Charlie Chaplin and Douglas Fairbanks, it first appeared on screen in Buster Keaton's Cops in 1922. You might also recognise Musso from appearances in Ocean's Eleven, Ed Wood or Marilyn Monroe biopic Blonde, but these days it's probably best known as the venue for Leonardo DiCaprio and Brad Pitt's boozy lunch meeting

with Al Pacino in Once Upon A Time... in Hollywood. In the film, DiCaprio knocks back a whisky sour while Pitt opts for a leafy Bloody Mary, but our hard-earned advice is not to leave without sampling their sublime martinis. While the food won't win awards, retro American classics like crab louie and a serviceable selection of sirloins keep diners well-fed. But it's the time-capsule atmosphere - all red booths and bow-tied waiters - that make it a worthy detour.

There's a similar air of old Hollywood glamour at THE FORMOSA CAFE, a favourite of Frank Sinatra, Humphrey Bogart and John Wayne. The restaurant pairs an Asian-inspired menu with sensational cocktails and makes a memorable appearance in neo-noir thriller LA Confidential, when Guy Pearce's detective Ed Exley gets into an argument over a woman he accuses of having had surgery to look like the pin-up and actress Lana Turner ("She is Lana Turner," comes the reply).

Head over to Koreatown to find THE PRINCE, a one-of-a-kind location that dates back to the 1920s, when it was known as the Windsor, With its wood panels and red leather booths it retains the air of an old-fashioned English gentleman's club but these days serves first-rate Korean food. Jack Nicholson stops here while on the case in Chinatown, and it gained a new generation of fans when it transformed into the sitcom New Girl gang's regular hangout, where Jake Johnson's Nick bartended.

It's also where Ryan Gosling memorably explained his love of "pure jazz" to Emma Stone in La La Land. Stop by today for Sunday brunch with a side of thrilling live music.

If music's your thing, another can't-miss spot is THE DRESDEN in Los Feliz, a favoured hangout of Jon Favreau and Vince Vaughn in Swingers. Whether you're enjoying haute cuisine in the dining room or live entertainment in the lounge, this is a venue that, like the film's stars, is so money, baby. Whatever time

you stumble out it's always time for CANTER'S DELI, which conveniently stays open 24 hours a day and serves the best Reuben sandwiches in town. Those round-the-clock opening hours made it a second home for up-all-night rockers Guns n' Roses, who featured it in several of their music videos. It's also popped up in shows like Curb Your Enthusiasm and Entourage.

When you're ready for breakfast there are few better choices than PAT AND LORRAINE'S COFFEE **SHOP** in Eagle Rock. Don't just take our word for it - this is the diner where the colour-coded criminal gang first meets up in Quentin Tarantino's Reservoir Dogs. Just remember: don't be like Steve Buscemi's Mr Pink, always tip your server.

Even after eating your way across Los Angeles, you should still find time to squeeze in one final stop at RANDY'S DONUTS in Inglewood. You'll

probably recognise the huge doughnut on top of the building from its appearance in *Iron Man* 2. While you sadly won't be allowed to lounge inside it like Tony Stark, you will be able to grab a box for the road.

bed and thought, "I must swim the English Channel"? Neither have I, but it's an incredible example of human achievement that has always fascinated me. I have absolutely no hope of swimming the Channel. But maybe you do.

Gertrude "Trudy" Ederle certainly did. The film Young Woman and the Sea features Daisy Ridley as Ederle, and tells the story of the first woman ever to swim the 21 miles (34km) from England to France in 1926. When Ederle completed the swim in 14 hours, she became the world's fastest Channel swimmer.

If you're thinking that sounds like a long way to swim, you couldn't be more right. But you might still be underestimating just how colossal an achievement it is. Nick Caine, who swam

from England to France in 2009 aged 16, says that the effort ratio between running and swimming is approximately 1:3. A 21-mile swim, in other words, is probably about as tiring as a 63-mile run. Imagine having to run two and a half marathons in one go. "It is exhausting," says Caine, "and I think the hardest part is the mental boredom."

One of the most important things is that you don't just train in a pool; you must train in cold water in order for your body to acclimatise to the temperature of the Channel (which, in summer, is around 17°C). But when Caine says "the right training", he means swimming eight to nine hours every day, and swimming consistently for two years. The challenge has to become your life. On the upside, in order to add the recommended weight, Caine was consuming a pint of ice cream a day.



On top of that time commitment, you need to be able to swim non-stop for six hours, since that is the length of the qualifying swim every swimmer must do before they dip their bodies into the Channel. Clear this hurdle and you can organise the swim – which involves paying in the region of £7,000 (US\$9,170) for the various bits of paperwork. You must swim alongside a power boat, but during the swim you can't touch the boat or wear a wetsuit – either would mean your swim isn't official.

Caine is one of only about 2,000 people to have swum the Channel since the first attempt in 1875.

Matthew Webb, who was the very first, was stung


by a jellyfish – just one of many hazards. As Caine says, you can get hypothermia; you can swallow too much sea water; or you can have a heart attack and drown (this sadly happened to a fireman who took on the challenge for charity last year). When Caine swam, he was essentially swimming without moving for at least two hours – meaning he completed the swim in about 13 hours.

"I think the average person can definitely do it with the right training and the right time," Caine says, optimistically. At the end of the day,

it's expensive, exhausting and dangerous – but then isn't everything that's fun?

VERDICT: I couldn't. But you might be in with a chance.

Sheen is not your average celebrity. On paper, it seems like he should be. He's had roles in big Hollywood franchises, such as Twilight. He has been in beloved Oscar-worthy films (Frost/Nixon, Nocturnal Animals) and hit series (Good Omens, Masters of Sex). He's even partnered a string of A-list women including Kate Beckinsale and Rachel McAdams. Now 55, and with a mop of silvery hair to match his raspy beard, he's definitely in national treasure territory. When our Zoom call finally connects he greets me with a disarmingly warm "How are ya doing?" in his lovely, deep Welsh accent.

It turns out that, in person, Michael Sheen is miraculously down-to-earth. "The list of things I'm good at is so small," he says of his stellar acting career. "If you can make a profession out of it, it seems like you're doing well, but it's more a reflection of how bad I am at doing everything else." He is, frankly, normal. In a remarkable kind of way. He still lives in Port Talbot, where he grew up, and has three children, including two small kids with his current partner, Anna Lundberg. He spends a lot of time role-playing as the character Evil Pea from his daughter's favourite

cartoon, he tells me. Then whatever free time he has left is dedicated to good causes. He helps everyone from girls without access to period products to homeless people who want to play football, and recently set up a charitable foundation, Mab Gwalia, to try to do even more. Again, this is not typical celeb behaviour.

"I started to see my work as an actor, and everything in the entertainment industry, as an engine for being able to do the other stuff that I wanted to do," he says of the 10 or so years since he left behind the glitz of LA and moved his life back to Wales. "I always used to think, when I was growing up, this isn't my real life - that's waiting for me down the road... [but] you have to choose the things in front of you. It's less about big political ideologies and more about what can I do? You have to do what you can, about what you can, while you can."

Today we're due to discuss his latest TV project, A Very Royal Scandal, about the infamous interview between Prince Andrew, the late Queen's third child, and the journalist Emily Maitlis, which aired on the BBC in 2019. Sheen plays Prince Andrew. Though "plays" is perhaps the wrong word - he inhabits the role in a way that makes you forget you're not watching the real person. This is another fascinating thing about Sheen: he's not so good at acting like a famous person in his own life, but is uniquely good at acting like other famous people, having previously

become the politician Tony Blair (in no fewer than three different films), the football manager Brian Clough and the quiz-show host Chris Tarrant.

A Very Royal Scandal is a three-part series revealing the behind-the-scenes drama around the scoop of the decade. If you haven't seen the original interview, it is a toe-curling watch. Sat in Buckingham Palace, the Prince is grilled by Maitlis on his role in the Jeffrey Epstein scandal. Sheen watched it on TV at the time. "I'm no different to anyone else - I thought it was an extraordinary car crash. Like most

people I just couldn't understand how it happened, which obviously our drama looks into."

Put Sheen's performance side-by-side with the original and it's the dramatised version that feels more humanising. How does he do it? "I've probably watched the interview more than anyone else in the world now," he considers. "My job isn't to make excuses, or try to persuade the audience of anything. I'm certainly not trying to make the person's behaviour forgivable. But what I am trying to do is find a way to show that the things the person does are inevitable. As a result of circumstance, the life you've led, the situations you're in."

Does he have sympathy for divisive characters like these? "I think there's a difference between sympathy and empathy," he says, carefully. "It had never really struck me how high Prince Andrew's high was, and how far he had to fall

from there over time... for a man who was seen as being the ultimate eligible bachelor, and the fairy-tale prince, to get old and overweight and no longer attractive in the same way, and to feel like you don't get treated the way you should, and to get into money troubles, and to have - allegedly - your major relationships ended because vou've been told to do that by your family. All of those things were all revelations to me."

Sheen is keen to point out that he's talking about the character, not the person. He's never met the real Prince. But, of course, the whole thing is interesting because it is based on real, albeit murky, events. "We don't know what happened... there was no court case," says Sheen. Though he

has opinions about the Prince's guilt. "I had to make a choice..." Which is? "I'm not going to tell you for a number of reasons. The main one being that it would spoil the experience for people watching."

He's skirting around it, but there's a tension for the actor with this kind of performance. Sheen knows that he can never reveal the truth, but he's still trying to get at some version of it. "I have to try and find connections with characters that I play," he explains. "It doesn't matter who they are or what they do, real or not - the whole point of acting is that you find the points of connection. And some of those points of connection can be hard to accept. Obviously the life of an actor who has some celebrity comes with all kinds of privilege itself. Different kinds of privilege to members of the royal family, but there is some crossover, and there is enough there to be able to take the imaginative leap."

In 2020 Sheen gave back his OBE, or Order of the British Empire (a merit given to him by the Queen), as he felt to keep it would be hypocritical given his criticism of the royal family's continued use of another archaic royal title: Prince of Wales. I sense he is no great fan of the royals, or indeed any family that controls tremendous amounts of wealth and property.

As for his own wealth and property, there's not that much of it, he says. When, in 2019, he got involved in bringing the Homeless World Cup to Cardiff, he ended up having to sell his houses in the US and UK in order to make it happen. It was "a situation that was really tricky and difficult and challenging and potentially devastating," he says. "I had to

find a lot of money very quickly. Which I'm still paying for, which is why it's quite funny when people call me a champagne socialist. I wish!"

And yet, Sheen acknowledges that he does not face the same kind of challenges as the Port Talbot steelworkers he mixes with at home. He is constantly checking his privilege. Does that not get a bit exhausting? "As much as you might feel like you're a victim of other people's privilege, to try and accept what your own is..." he pauses to think. "It's not an acceptance that you're the bad guy, you just have to do it in order to understand how things work," he says. "It's that balance between having the confidence and the self-righteousness. I suppose, to fight against the obstacles in your way, while at the same time realising that you are part of the obstacle for someone else maybe."

Port Talbot, like many Welsh towns, has been badly affected by the decline of British heavy industry. It is a place where many people struggle. Sheen admits that this wasn't always obvious to him, but over one weekend in 2011 he had an epiphany of sorts when he returned to the town to star in and co-direct a performance of The Passion of Christ. Staged in the streets and involving the whole community, the work took place over three days and culminated in the actor screaming in pain as he was nailed to a cross. He came down from it a changed man.

"There were huge amounts of what was going on in my town that I just wasn't aware of," he reflects. "I wanted the story to come out of the town itself, so I needed to hear what people felt about things and what their hopes and fears were. So I'd speak to the mayor, but I'd also speak to someone who was receiving treatment at the alcohol and drug centre. Doing that was revelatory for me. The town of Port Talbot is unique in several ways, but it's also similar to many places across the whole of the UK.

"There is a side to life that is so hard and difficult to deal with that we don't want to know about it until it happens to us," he continues, "And what that means is that people who are going through that experience don't get the kind of support that they should have... In my life and career I get to move through different areas of society, and oftentimes I can be in very, very different places in the space of a day. I can be doing something in Port Talbot in the morning and I can be at some very posh do in London that night. So the discrepancies and the gap of opportunity in different places become very clear. It lit a fire in me to ask why, why is that the case?"

Has he answered his question? And is there any room for optimism that things are improving? "It's very hard to know even what being optimistic or pessimistic means," he says. "We're at a point of big change. And I don't mean from the Tory to the Labour party. I mean the shifting of tectonic plates culturally in all kinds of ways that politics is trying to keep up with... The chances of something really fundamentally massively changing in the way we live our lives - it could happen in the next couple of years. The rise of neo-fascist, far-right agendas, all getting linked up and connected across the West is a real danger."

We've spent most of our time talking in this way, about politics and privilege. He is clearly a good student of tricky conversations, and not just because of his hours spent rewatching Prince Andrew - he recently took part in a BBC special called The Assembly, in which his interviewers were a group of neurodivergent young people, tasked with asking him the most incisive questions they could dream up. For example: "How does it feel to be dating someone who is only five years older than your daughter?" (Sheen's first child is 25 while partner Anna Lundberg is 30.) His answer was typically straightforward: "If you find someone who brings you happiness and they make you happy, you've got to go for that."





What is love magic?

I have a bit of a different take on love magic as I feel that it all starts with self-love. It's not about imposing your will onto someone else - that's a real no-go in my books. What makes someone attractive is that they feel complete as a person. But there are certainly magical tools to help get to that place.

Every witch needs a nice cast-iron cauldron or vessel in which to burn things. If you've had an argument with uour partner, a very simple spell to try is write it on a piece of paper and burn it. It's about releasing and clearing the energy.

My wife and our wedding rings at the end of each day by putting them with a piece of rose It's the go-to stone for witches when it comes to relationships."

"As a couple, we like to use this tarot deck as it's very romantic and there's a lot of sensual imagery such as flowers. It feels . like taking yourself on a date when you use them."



In the spirit of the cuffing season, how can love magic be used to attract or keep a mate?

I'd recommend using rose quartz essence, which has the energetic imprint of rose quartz crystal preserved in water. It's considered a love crystal that connects to self-love and empathy, and can be added to body lotion, a bath or tea.

You are married to a fellow witch. Have you used witchcraft in your own relationship?

My wife and I will do a yearly tarot reading together. We'll pull one card for the overall theme of the year, then a card for each month. We also have a love altar in our bedroom, which is laid out with special mementos from our relationship, and magical things like tarot cards and crystals. But witchcraft can't replace therapy, which is also important for a healthy relationship.

Who is the greatest witch in history?

Singer-songwriter Stevie Nicks gives a great name to witches everywhere.

How do your relationship aura photos work?

We have a booth in the store and visitors can get an individual photo of their aura, followed by a joint photo that shows their combined energy as a couple. We'll sometimes have people who are clearly very sceptical, particularly men who have been roped into it by their partner and literally look like they want nothing to do with it. But when they see the colours of their auras they often cry like babies.

Do you feel that society has recently reconsidered the role of witches?

Absolutely! The witch was historically persecuted because she was wasn't of use - she was poor or too old to procreate. By reclaiming witchcraft, many contemporary women and queer people are saying that power exists outside of the patriarchy. The witch is the ultimate archetype of

Which haunts should a first timer to Salem visit?

The Witch House, which is the last building in Salem still standing with a direct connection to the Witch Trials.

What should people know about modern-day witches?

Anyone can be a witch. Jump in, we're a pretty accepting community.

In the spirit of the cuffing season, how can love magic be used to attract or keep a mate?

Start with some stone magic. Amethyst is good for healing, or malachite for transformations. Once you have your chosen stones, focus on your intention as you shake the stones in your hand to charge them up. A poppet, which is a fabric doll figure filled with herbs such as chamomile, can also help attract the right kind of love. Slip it under the left-hand side of your pillow before you sleep.

You performed a love spell for Katy Perry shortly before she met her partner, Orlando Bloom. Did your spell help her to find love?

Katy arrived in my kitchen, which is where I cast my spells, with these big security men who were getting kind of shifty. I said, "Look, guys, you're in my yard now. Katy is the boss onstage but I'm the boss here." They soon

backed off and I did a love spell for Katy. I also predicted that she was going to star in a major TV show, which came true when she became a judge on *American Idol*. I believe that Katy met her great love, Orlando, because she was ready for it. I just helped her put a direct message out into the universe, asking for precisely what she wanted.

Are there ethical considerations or certain rules that you follow when casting a love spell?

"I have this sphere to honour my chihuahua, who sadly passed on, and I use it to connect to it. People once hung glass spheres in their windows in the 17th century to keep away the evil spirits."



19M 20 METRES UNDER THE ATLANTIC, JUST OFF THE COAST OF BARBADOS.

Below me, the seabed is daubed with acid-green sponges and rust-red rock formations. But I'm too nervous to appreciate its beauty, as I am hot on the tail of an eerie, venomous creature that has spread across these waters like a plague.

Barbados is an island of relaxed beaches, easy-going locals and slow sunsets. You'd hardly expect it to also be the epicentre of one of the planet's most unlikely ecological epidemics. The troublesome marine creature at the centre of it all is the lionfish. a beautiful but invasive species that made its way to the island's waters several decades ago and has been slowly chewing through the coral reefs that protect Bajans from waves and storms. For the people of this small country - an island whose vulnerability is only truly revealed when out at sea, looking in at the gnawed cliff edge - the lionfish invasion is not just an inconvenience, but a threat of existential proportions.

The lionfish is off limits to commercial fisheries due to its rocky habitat, so spearing them by hand is the only effective way of culling numbers. In recent years, aided by government initiatives encouraging the practice, spearfishing has been taken up with enthusiasm by locals and tourists alike - despite the creature's intimidating battery of venomous spines.

Each year the island hosts its now legendary lionfish "hunt" as part of its annual Dive Festival, with a week-long programme including sea turtle surveys, shipwreck check-ups, night dives and, of course, rum-soaked beach parties.

I'm visiting the island at the punishingly hot time of the festival to take part in the hunt, which concludes with a giant bonfire cookout. The prickly fish has become something of an island delicacy, grilled up at local "cutter" (sandwich) shops, or crumbed and pan-fried in the dining rooms of fivestar hotels. Heard about dealing with your problems? Here, they spear and eat them.

A day before the big hunt, I'm out on the glassy, cerulean water for a practice run with local dive master Phil Mahy (whose dive operation Reefers & Wreckers is one of the island's best) and his gang of Bajan employees who,



the moment you crack a smile, beam back at you with a warmth that matches the weather.

It's unclear how the

lionfish, native to the Indo-Pacific, made their way to these warm Caribbean waters, but Phil, with his magnetic Bajan drawl and milky blue eyes, offers up a bit of local legend. "So," he says, anchoring the boat and leaning in with a stillness that belies the choppy waters. "It was the early 00s. An aquarium of lionfish was being transported to the summer home of a wealthy businessman when a storm hit." He pauses for effect, cracking a wry smile. "Some say it was Storm Andrew. It was a big storm and it tipped the

boat. The tanks went in, spilling the lionfish where they did not belong, in the vast Atlantic. And here we are."

The origins of their presence here may be under dispute, but no one can deny that the global spread of lionfish has been prolific. Thanks to rising sea temperatures, the lionfish aren't just a problem in the Caribbean, but in the Mediterranean as well, where temperatures were once too cold for their survival. Though they are still struggling to contain the invasion in parts of the Med, I'm told by marine biologist Nia - who is also with us on



the boat - that lionfish numbers in Barbados are currently "under control" because of grassroots movements such as the annual hunt. "When we first found the lionfish, we reacted like that," she says, snapping her fingers for effect. It's something I've noticed in my short time here: islanders see themselves as stewards of the water that feeds and protects them. For Bajans. matters of the ocean hit close to home.

"There's no backdoor in the ocean," is an old island adage that's repeated to me almost constantly by the islanders I meet. Only that morning, while waiting for Phil's boat, a Bajan fisherman said it to me after having emerged, Bond-like, from the water, holding a ring of freshly caught barracuda. It's a gentle warning - a reminder to treat

the sea with care and the appropriate reverence.

Alas, there is no backdoor for me either. The next day, I'm up and ready for the hunt at 8am, the temperature already cresting 29°C. Up on the dive boat, we're a battalion of 15, both tourists and locals. We're kitted up - tank, mask, buoyancy iacket - and briefed as if we are destined for the surface of some uncharted planet.

"A shot between the eyes is perfect," I'm told by a disarmingly maternal dive instructor, who patiently talks me through spear technique like a primary school teacher telling a child not to run with scissors. "Push your thumb through the elastic strap to the top of the spear, go in close, then release."

Sounds easy enough, I think to myself, as the captain anchors the ship over our site. One trigger happy American cries, "Let's hunt!" We are prepped by the diving instructors like a military operation – breathing regulators are put on like pacifiers; buoyancy jackets drained - and then launched into the bath-warm sea water one by one.

We descend into the deep, dim ocean and hover above the reef, a complex city of dense, interconnected marine life. Diving can be a very monastic activity: all about controlling breath and meditating on the beauty of the ocean - but I'm on high alert for any vibrantly tiger-striped fish. For a while, there's nothing but swaying,

Eventually, cresting a rock, I drift past a leatherback turtle - huge, ancient and not interested in entertaining tourists. Caught in a reverie, I scarcely clock that - as the turtle lifts off in search of some peace - there's a lionfish lurking

right behind it, with all the hubris of an apex predator.

Target acquired: this is it. I ready the spear and shift to line up the shot, moving in as close as I can get without grazing those venomous spines. My weapon yanked back as far as the water pressure will allow, I aim. I take the shot - and miss. The lionfish snaps back under a rock, gone. This hunting thing is harder than it looks.

First dive done, we clamber back aboard the boat. The first thing I see is an instructor splayed out on the deck, hand nursed in a heat pack. having been stung by those perilous spines. This is the sacrifice some pay for a healthy reef

and fresh fish. Suffice to say, as the second dive looms. I'm a little more anxious than before.

Another brief, another descent. This time, blessed by the spirits of the sea, I spot and spear one within minutes. Then

two, three, four, I'm on a roll. By my fifth, it's like I've been doing this my whole life.

Statistic Caribbean, people know how

Nearing sunset, we're back on the beach, where all Bajan roads seem to lead. As dive boats drift in the water beside us, each dive shop presents their haul, over 80 lionfish in total. Our catches are despined, scaled, filleted, grilled up and dished out with a side of charred breadfruit, smothered in garlic butter. All is washed down with ice-cold beer and a tipsy drift in the shallows. It's clear that, in the Caribbean, people know how to make the best of a bad situation.

As the sun turns honey gold and slumps into the horizon, I ask Phil what he makes of the whole lionfish saga. In true Bajan

style, he shrugs and says, "It is what it is, Jonnie. It is what it is." This practical approach to a challenging ecosystem - the damage of recent Hurricane Beryl can still be easily spotted across the island - is typical of the islanders I meet. In place of cynicism, Bajans seem to tackle their problems with an infectious optimism, warmth and good humour. To this end, they're as calm and unfazed as the lionfish they hunt.

Later that night, stumbling home, I get chatting to an elderly lady, a local, on her way to evening church service. She's lived on the island her entire life and so I ask, casually, "What keeps you here?" The woman cackles and throws up her arms. "Who wouldn't want to live in paradise?" she says. For the people of Barbados, one prickly little fish invasion is not going to get in the way of a good time.

Let's look at a few classic scarvmovie tropes and the new horrorcomedies that subvert them with such deadly wit.

Girl meets ghoul Found footage

Horror films have imagined doomed love affairs with ahoulish figures since the 1819 short story The Vampyre, considered the progenitor of vampire romance fiction. Zombies aren't usually the subject of lust, but new film Lisa Frankenstein (2024) breaks the mould in fine style, making the undead star a romantic lead. A zom com, if you will.

Most famously executed on 1999's The Blair Witch Project, the conceit of found footage is that you're watching what really happened through the shaky amateur lens of IRL witnesses. New horror Late Night with the Devil wittily deals with a demonic possession (another trope) at a TV station. Shockumentary, anyone?



A masked killer

From Ghostface in the Scream franchise to Michael Myers in Halloween, the masked murderer is an evergreen slasher staple. Eli Roth's new hit Thanksgiving uses a creepy, seasonally appropriate pilgrim mask to hide the bad guy's identity. Turns out - spoiler - he was a pillar of the community all along. Yes, just like in Scooby Doo.

RACE TO THE TOP



Uju Asika celebrates the inspiring Black sportspeople who have fought their way into history

> AS A PARENTING AUTHOR AND MUM, I'M

always on the lookout for role models. Representation matters, not just for Black kids but for people from all backgrounds. My sons grew up wanting to emulate Ian Wright and, later, Bukayo Saka. To a child, these athletes can seem like gods, but what makes them impressive are their human stories.

South of the River charts the origin stories of players like Jadon Sancho and Reiss Nelson,

who rose from deprived south London neighbourhoods to score big in the Premier League. Executive-produced by Rio Ferdinand (who grew up on a Peckham estate), this three-part series also highlights community sports as one way of keeping local kids from falling through the cracks.

For many, sport can be a refuge and an escape route. Take Sir Mo Farah (real name Hussein Abdi Kahin), whose extraordinary life story is unveiled in *The Real Mo Farah*. Born in war-torn Somaliland, Farah lost his father to gunfire when he was just four. At nine, he was trafficked to the UK and forced into child labour. It was his early athletic prowess that set him on a different path. He went on to win four Olympic gold medals.

Farah's story is a powerful reminder that every human deserves safety, empathy and a fair start. The fact that he had to hide his illegal status for so long should give us all cause to reflect.

Today, Farah is known for his incredible charity work. He's one of many exemplary Black sports heroes using their profiles to affect change —

like Marcus Rashford and his free school meals campaign, or former Lioness Alex Scott and her domestic violence advocacy. Beyond sports, the African Caribbean contribution to Britain is incalculable.

Yet, while 43% of Premier League and 34% of English Football League players were Black in 2020–21, only 4.4% of professional football managers in England were Black. I dream of a day when we're no longer struggling to level the playing field.




